Morehead in Regional By Olive Hill Win

Drop Finals To Grayson After Tough Battle With Comets In Afternoon

Morehead High School, although they failed to take the district championship Saturday night over their arch-rivals Grayson, undoubtedly were with Olive Hill, tops in the district tournament held in Olive Hill Thursday, Friday and Saturday. The championship game, although it only decided the runner-up, was played Saturday afternoon when the Vikings met Olive Hill. Again it was brother against brother, with Roy Holbrook's team leading by the slim margin of one point, 28-27 as the final whistle blew. And while the Vikings won by that one point from the best other team in the tournament, they were unable to come back for the night session and dropped the decision to Grayson 23-30.

But, what the heck! The Kings are in the Regional which will be held here this week end. And that is the important part of the district.

Grayson was undoubtedly the winner by the breaks. They had only one tough game in the tournament, that against Break bridge on Thursday night. Break came near upsetting them, in the final drive that resulted in a 20 to 24 win for Grayson. The Yellowjackets then coasted, with no game until Saturday afternoon when they met one of the weaker teams with an easy victory. Olive Hill and Morehead, on the other hand played Friday night. Olive Hill defeating Holbrook, while Morehead took Soldier, and then met each other Saturday afternoon in the outstanding match of the tournament.

It was just too much for either of them.

Grayson placed three men on the tournament team: Olive Hill, three; Morehead High, two; Break one. They were Holbrook and Barber, Morehead; Carter, Click and Nichols, Olive Hill; Kibby, McCleave, and Newman, Grayson; Allen, Break and Danner, Holbrook; Bobbie Holbrook was unquestionably the outstanding man of the tournament.

Rowan Gets Share Of Net For Timber Sale

Sales Of Timber Returned To The Counties For Schools And Road Fund

Twenty-five percent of the receipts from Timber Sales, land rentals, etc., in the Cumberland National Forest is returned to the State of Kentucky for roads and schools.

This money, which amounted to \$2,790.00 in the fiscal year 1940 was distributed among the counties within the National Forest in proportion to the National Forest acreage within each county last Thursday, Friday and Saturday.

The net acreage of the National Forest, Powell County 11,303, Lee county 6,325, and Estill 4,711.

Stock Yards Still Going Along Strong

Sales Holding Up In Spite Of Bad Weather; Prices Keep Good Pace

Again the weather proved a handicap to the stock sale held at Morehead Stock yards Thursday of last week. However, in spite of the cold clammy weather that prevailed a considerable amount of cattle, horses, and hogs were on hand.

Prices were considerably higher than the previous week, due to the better grade stock offered. The total amount of the sale exceeded that of the previous week in spite of the smaller amount of animals offered.

The continued popularity of the Morehead Stock Yards which opened on February 20, is indicative of the great amount of interest among the farmers of Rowan county and surrounding counties as well. Three sales have been held and the interest is growing rather than lessening. Naturally the opening sale was the biggest held thus far.

However, the current sales are holding up in a manner more than satisfactory to the management of the yards. Prices have compared very favorably with those of other yards in surrounding towns, and with the short haul for most of the stock grown, is proving advantageous not only to the management, but to the growers and farmers as well.

Mrs. Garland Collins Suffers Serious Injuries In Wreck

Twenty Four Stitches In Head And Face Required To Close Cuts

Mrs. G. S. Collins, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. D. C. Caudill, suffered serious cuts about the head and face, and possible internal injuries, Mr. Collins suffered minor cuts, and severe bruises and other occupants of the car were bruised and shaken when the car in which they were returning from Cincinnati early Saturday morning, skidded on the icy pavement, near Hida, left the highway and over turned in a ditch.

The car was being driven by Mrs. E. T. Greenwade, who with her husband and Mr. and Mrs. Collins were returning to Morehead, after a day spent in Ohio. They were picked up by a state highway truck and brought to the home of Mr. Collins parents in Morehead where medical assistance was hastily called.

Mrs. Collins was found to be the most seriously injured. She had sustained so many cuts about the head and face that it was necessary to take twenty-four stitches to close the wounds. Mr. Collins also suffered cuts about the face, which required about four stitches.

Mrs. Collins also suffered from a serious loss of blood, but, is, according to latest reports showing excellent recovery from her injuries.
