## Fiscal Court Makes Levy For Next Year

The Rowan Fiscal Court met on Tuesday of this week in their quadrennial meeting for the purpose of fixing salaries of officials for the next four years, and of fixing the various levies for court purposes.

Levies fixed by the court are as follows: For Rowan county schools, 1.50 per hundred; for real estate, 1.00 per hundred; for tangible property, 1.00 per hundred; for bank shares, 1.00 per hundred; for Haldean Consolidated school district, 2.00 per hundred; for tangible property for common school, 2.00 per hundred; for all male citizens, 1.00.

Salaries for officials was fixed for the ensuing four years: County Judge, \$1,800 plus \$300 for try the court measure; County Attorney, \$3,000; County Clerk, \$1,800; Junior, \$365.00; Sheriff, \$240.00; Circuit Court stenographer, \$210.00.

Mrs. Stella Crosswhite was re-elected as county treasurer at a salary of \$50.00 per month, for a term of four years.

In addition to the above business, claims for the past month were allowed by the court.

## Rowan County Girls Benefit Of K.C.C.S.

Over 14 Thousand Dollars Spent On Crippled Of Rowan County

In connection with the drive now under way to raise a fund to assist in caring for the Crippled Children of Kentucky, the following letter has been mailed to citizens of Rowan County, explaining the work that has been done by the Kentucky Crippled Children's Society of Kentucky for crippled children from Rowan County. It will be seen from the figures quoted in the letter that the Society has done for Rowan county children, far more effectively than anything we might say.

The work is going forward. Rowan county children still need the attention and care. During the drive now being staged to raise funds to help carry on the work, Rowan County citizens should carefully weigh the need against their ability to contribute and believe they will decide that there is not a man, woman or child in the county who cannot contribute something to this noble cause. In fact, it may be only "the widow's mite."

The letter follows: Dear Friend: You probably know about the splendid work that has been done in Rowan County by the Crippled Children Commission and Society. Last year 75 cases were examined, 54 of these treated, 15 were discharged as corrected and 39 of them are now under active supervision. The Commission estimates the per capita cost of treating a crippled child is \$272.00. At this figure the Commission would have expended \$14,910 to treat the number of cases. This includes only the hospital and medical care and does not include special services furnished by volunteer groups.

## Ky. Crippled Children Plan Is Completed

Committee Of Society Completes Plans For New Members

The Rowan County Committee of the Kentucky Crippled Children's Society has just completed its plans for the annual campaign for membership and financial support. Mrs. W. H. Rice is the local Chairman. Funds raised in this county will be used to send the children to the clinics at Ashland, Louisville and Lexington. This fund is augmented by an appropriation from the State Legislature, which in 1938-9 was \$85,000.

Last year \$138,000 was spent by the Governor's Commission for Kentucky Crippled Children, and only \$100,000 of this amount was received from the fund raised for Infantile Paralysis Fund. The importance of the annual membership drive lies in the fact that the number of members in the State, the greater will be the amount which the Commission will be able to secure from the State Legislature.

The members of the Kentucky Crippled Children's Commission are selected by the Governor and as do all the workers in the Society serve without compensation. Jenkins, President of Kentucky State Teachers College.

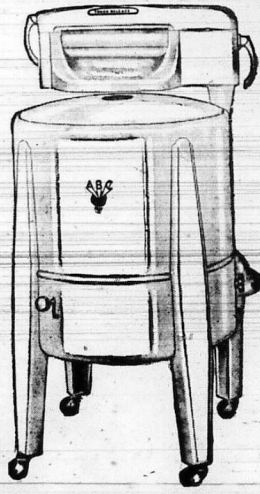

### The UPWARD LOOK

By Rev. B. H. Kaeze

Question—What are the harmful effects of alcohol on the human body?—L. W. M.

Answer—This question has been submitted for some time and I have deferred the answer in order to be accurate in my answer. I have consulted physical reliable encyclopedias. The answer is so broad that I can here make only brief statements which summarize scientific findings.

1. Alcohol, when used in large doses, is a poison. Its use as a preservative of decaying matter is due to its paralyzing power. It is indicated as an antidote in small amounts, as however, in certain physical disorders, where immediate stimulants are needed. But in all cases where large doses are taken, it results in poisonous effect. The possible dose, except in cases of adults, is from 1 dram, to 2 ounces in 24 hours.

2. Alcohol is a dehydrant—that is, it takes water from the body cells, and therefore, produces thirst. Thus, first time drinking is not from thirst, but from social stimulation or other reasons. However, after one has become even a slight, but habitual drinker, thirst calls for more alcohol. Thirst calls for light alcohol, content even with sugar. The subject becomes selfish, irresponsible, and lacks will-power. This is the first stage of excitation. Soon there follows the inevitable depression which drives the subject to seek another drink to bolster up his loss of self respect, and his physical loss of energy.

One of the most harmful effects of this situation in modern society is the danger to others. Drunk men are out of control. But the half drunk man is more dangerous. He will drive a car, while the drunk man will not. He will completely drunk person is "out", but the half drunk tries to go on normally, while he is by no means normal or safe.

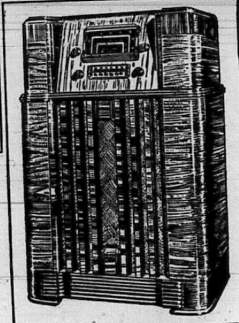
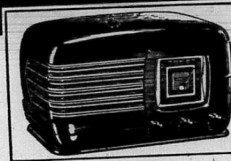

TOBACCO DISEASES GIVES CONTROL OF Extension Folder A12, published by the Kentucky College of Agriculture, is called "Recommendations for the Control of Wildfire and Blackfly of Dark Tobacco." Control measures discussed are: Time to apply and method of applying bluestone and lime to the plant bed. Management and fertilization of tobacco soil. Topping as related to control of wildfire.

Dried fruit and dried beans and peas which have been soaked for several hours or overnight need less cooking. They should be cooked in the water in which they are soaked.

Paints containing spar varnish are used on porches, floors and steps where there is much traffic. These same paints are good for farm machinery, since they

are hard and water resistant.

Many poultry raisers prefer a commercial starting mash until chicks are about four weeks old. If the feed is not wasted, a pound per chick will be sufficient for this time. Chicks may be fed as soon as they are hatched and it is never advisable to wait longer than 48 hours.
