Cincinnati prices were paid in Morehead at the Morehead Stock Yards on Thursday of last week when prices soared to a new high. The quality and amount of stock on hand for the sale was excellent, the receipts exceeding those of previous weeks.
HOGS—Packers brought a high of \$8.50 per hundred. Mediums ranged from \$8.00 to \$8.50 per hundred. Shoats returned the owners from \$7.00 to \$8.00 per hundred, while sows and pigs brought \$26.75 cents, to establish the highest market for the local yards.
CATTLE—Steers sold at from \$6.75 to \$8.70 per hundred. Sturgeon now under-

WHY RODE BY RAIL
Last January, the railroads gave a superb example of the efficiency of their service. This example wasn't a prepared stunt. It was made in the ordinary course of business.
During that month, the railroads transported 207,000 members of our military forces with out the slightest difficulty or interference with other traffic. More than 132,000 of these men were transported on 385 special trains. The remainder rode on regular trains.
To handle this unusual passenger traffic required 633 route-riders. These were made by the individual railroads involved in cooperation with the Military Transportation Section of the Association of American Railroads. This Section was created last August to maintain close liaison between the military forces and the railroads of the country. Not only does it direct the movement of military personnel, but it also supervises the movement of supplies and mater-ial for the huge military construction projects now under-

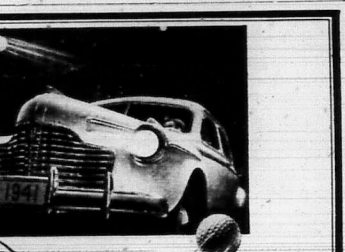

EGGS COOKED IN LIVE STEAM TIMED BY A WHISTLE.
Now the whistling egg cooker. The eggs are cooked wholly by steam generated from a very small amount of water, and in a very short time. The cooker whistles when the steam increases the whistle stops until the eggs are cooked. When the pressure releases the whistle again starts, warning "turn off the gas." The amount of time used varies with the degree of hardness desired. Poached or steam cooked eggs are cooked in a similar manner.

Training For Defense

FREE shifting of workers from one job to another so that they can acquire new skills and handle several different jobs in one plant if necessary. Is called "up-grading." Experienced personnel managers say this system keeps men from going stale, improves morale, increases skilled labor for all operations, and frequently produces other top production jobs. Short intensive study courses are being used increasingly to hurry train men and women for industrial jobs. Many such courses, supplied by various institutions are financed by the government. Other study courses are financed in part or entirely by employers. The 47 hr. for skilled men, and the supply is far too short in some industries now engaged in national defense projects. Some educators are confident that plenty of skilled labor can be trained for the defense program if employers will realize that they can no longer hang out a "help wanted" sign, but must arrange their operations to utilize specialized skills and then take the time and trouble to train new workers for these skills. We have stepped almost overnight from a surplus of workers to a shortage of workers, especially skilled and semi-skilled workers. Recently one of the nation's foremost educational authorities said, "We will have the task of convincing parents and children that a high school education may, and probably should, lead to a machine shop rather than a desk."
