An Ordinance

An Ordinance prescribing the type of building that may be hereafter constructed on certain streets and regulating the issuance of building permits, and providing penalties for violating any of the provisions of said ordinance.

Be It Ordained By The City Council of the City of Morehead, Rowan County, Kentucky:

Section I. That hereafter all construction of new buildings within the following described territory:

Of the City of Morehead, Rowan County, Kentucky, Beginning at the intersection of Bridge Street with Main Street on the West side of said Bridge Street and extending Westward with Main Street to Harts Avenue. The territory included being 125 feet South of said Main Street, which territory extends between the two interchanges above mentioned, that is, Bridge Street and Harts Avenue; that also there shall be in North side of Main Street, excluded in this territory the territory from Harts Avenue to a point on the curb just opposite the West side of Bridge Street, at its intersection with Main Street. This territory shall include a strip 125 feet in depth extending from the aforesaid point on Main Street opposite Bridge Street to Harts Avenue.

Shall be either of brick, stone or concrete, or other fire proof material to be approved by the City Council, and no construction of any building structure on premises shall be lawful within the boundary above described, except such as may be authorized by this ordinance.

Section II. The above ordinance applies to buildings that border on the street and no building shall be erected anywhere within the above blocks of any material except as above stated, which contains a floor space more than one hundred feet.

Section III. That it shall be unlawful to repair any wood structure unless the structure now is standing within the limits of this prescribed fire zone.

Section IV. That it shall be unlawful for any person, persons, firms or corporations to make repairs on any wood structure that is standing or erected within the above prescribed boundary, the cost of which repairs exceeds the sum of \$100.00 exclusive of painting and decorating.

Section V. That it shall be the duty of any person, persons, firms or corporations, before the erection of any building anywhere within the corporate limits of the City of Morehead, to first secure a permit from the City Council and before any such permit shall be issued by said officer, who is authorized to issue same, that the person, persons, firms or corporations proposing to erect such building shall file with the City Council a statement in writing containing a brief description of said building, giving the height and dimensions as well as the material of which it proposes to erect said building.

Section VI. Any person, persons, firms or corporations who or which shall be found guilty of any violation or disregard of any section or sections of this

ordinance, or who shall obstruct or disobey any officer in the discharge of his duty imposed by this ordinance on any day or days shall be fined not less than \$10.00 nor more than \$25.00 for each offense, and each twenty-four hours of maintenance of prohibited condition or persistence in prohibited conduct, shall be and constitute a separate offense.

Section VII. The provisions of this ordinance are severable, and if any of its provisions or any penalty provided by this ordinance shall be held unconstitutional or invalid such provision or penalty shall be held null and void and the decisions of the courts shall not affect or impair the remaining provisions of this ordinance or any of the other penalties anywhere in this ordinance provided.

Section VIII. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are to the extent of such conflict, hereby repealed by law.

This ordinance shall take effect and be in force after its passage and publication as required by law.

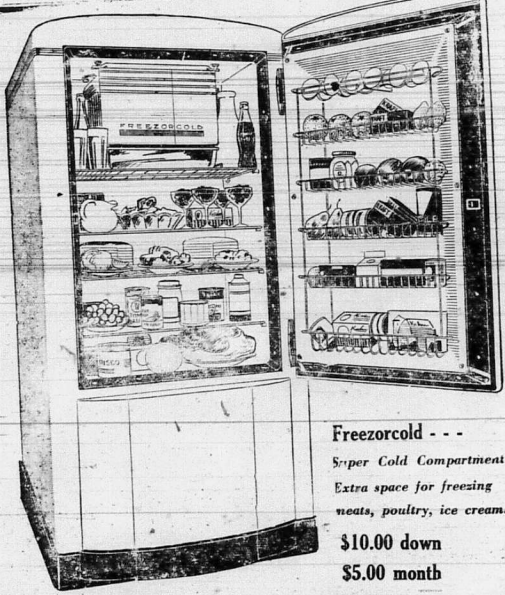
