

ON TO ROWAN.

A Detail of the Legion to Leave For the Mountains To-Morrow Morning.

List of Those Who Will Go— Preparations For the Trip.

The detail of troops to go to Rowan county has been completed, and on yesterday morning Col. Castleman had posted at Legion Headquarters an order from Gov. Knott, calling out the corps subject to further orders from the officers of the regiment. The boys were all ready and anxious to go, and much activity was shown around the armory yesterday afternoon, when the following moving order was posted:

TROOPS ORDERED TO REPORT.

Military Officers Confer at Lexington

—Wm. Barker Shot From Ambush—

Green Manning Held For Trial.

LEXINGTON, July 30.—[Special.]—Adjut.

Williams and Dr. Duvall received instructions to report to Maj. L. W. McKee on

Monday at 12 o'clock for active service. It

could not be ascertained here to-night what

companies would be sent. It is known that

the Lexington company will not be ordered,

on account of its having done more active

service than any other company in the State

Guard.

Late this afternoon William Barker, while

building a fence in Morehead, was shot from

ambush by some unknown party, the ball

taking effect in the left hand, making a very

ugly and serious wound. It is generally be-

lieved that the would-be-assassin is a mem-

ber of the Tolliver gang.

Green Manning, who was arrested a few

days ago for conspiring to kill the Logan

boys on the 7th of June, was tried before

Judge Cooper, at Mt. Sterling, who held him

in \$2,500 bail to appear at the Circuit Court

in Morehead, Wednesday.

Everything is quiet at Morehead to-night,

and no trouble is anticipated until the Cir-

cuit Court convenes on Tuesday, when a red-

hot time is expected. Parties who claim to

be posted say the stories which have been

freely circulated to the effect that the Toll-

iverites were lying in ambush around More-

head was a scheme planned and executed by

Taylor Young and his faction to induce the

Governor to order out troops.

Gov. Knott, Major L. W. McKee and

Judge Cole held a long consultation at the

Phoenix Hotel last night, the conference last-

ing until considerably after midnight, the

result of which they refused to make known,

either last night or this morning. Judge

Cole was met at the Ashland House to-day

reading the telegraphic statements that

troops had been ordered out, and to which

he replied that the reports were incorrect.

To-night, however, the guard has been in-

creased and now numbers about one hundred.
