Eagles Defeat  
Western 53-49

By virtue of their 53-49 victory over the Hilltoppers of Western Kentucky Saturday night, the Morehead College Eagles closed their regular season with eleven wins and eight losses.

The Eagles won third row in the Kentucky Intercollegiate Athletic Conference race with a 9-4 mark. Morehead showed all of the teams in the conference, except Eastern and Louisville. They clinched six victories over Georgetown twice, 60-35 and 61-44.

Three times 57-37 and 56-43, Western twice 57-31 and 53-44, Murray 49-44 and Union 74-40. In the conference were to Louisville 49-44 and 50-47; Hart, 41-45 and 62-53 in an overtime period, and Western 40-42.

Oakdale, K. I. A. C. play, Morehead has recorded two triumphs and two setbacks. In the Ohio Valley Tournament at the opening of the season, the Eagles turned back Georgetown 61-31, but lost in the second round to Louisville 41-24. Marshall, another loop foe, had at Morehead 41-49 in an overtime period, but gained revenge at Huntington in a 53-48 conquest.

Bobby Laughlin, able member of the Breckinridge Training School, Eagles, plotted the Eagles through their first five games, before Ellis Johnson returned from the Navy.

Carroll Howarth, junior from Canton, Indiana, and Jack Pobst, sophomore from Georgetown, Ohio, have been the only two boys on the squad to play in every game. Bill Miller, 6'4", center missed one game with an injured hand, while Park Prater was out half the season with a knee ache.

The Eagles have hit conference all season long, averaging 50.6 points in 19 games for an average of 50. The opposition has averaged 40.9, 101.5 points or 47.4 a contest.

Howarth, Pobst, and Miller led the Morehead attack with 126, 118, and 213 points respectively, with game averages of 14, 11, and

**Lay Those**  
**Pennies Down**

If you see a bunch of boys sitting around on the campus these days, you know they are doing one of three things. They are either talking about girls, shooting craps, or playing two-up. Since everyone knows how they talk about girls and shoot craps, we will tell you about the little game which is immediately known as two-up.

This game is the Australian equivalent of the American "paling dominos." It is played with two Aussie pennies which are placed on the back of the hand and tossed into the air. If you head them, that is, flip two heads, you win, but lose to the poor soul who shows two tails, for when you do this, you must part with some of your hard earned shekels.

"Down Under," this game is played on the same high scale as our American boxing. It is played in a ring similar to the boxing large game. There are small games and large games.

Let's go to a big game—the stakes are more comfortable and there is more excitement. The ring keeper, who is in charge of the game, stands in the ring and calls for a spinner. A player comes into the ring and takes the pennies.

He may want to spin for five dollars or fifty dollars — the crowd doesn't care what he spins for, as most of the betting is done on the side.

This is how it is done in Australia. The M.C. is in charge of a much smaller manner. Usually a bunch of boys in the Grill or Thompson Hall get together and flip the pennies among themselves, not for bets of from five to fifty dollars but for wagers from five to fifty cents.

Oh, I forgot to tell you two-up is illegal, especially if Mr. Maxy catches you playing in Thompson Hall. See 'ya at the game sometime.
