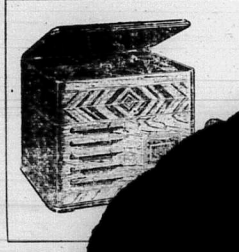

(Continued From Page One) \$18.76 in ten years, this bond will be worth \$20.00. This is an increase of 33 1/3 per cent, equal to an annual interest return of 2.9 per cent, compounded semi-annually.

To spread investments widely among all the people in America, a limit of \$5,000 has been set on the amount of these bonds to be bought by any one person in one year.

For larger investors who can afford to purchase up to \$50,000 worth of bonds a year, the Treasury Department has issued two additional kinds of Defense Savings Bonds.

### DOUBLE OBLIGATION

In completing this State-wide registration, the Commission's Employment Service has a double obligation," explained Acting Executive Director Horsley. "To serve the best interests of Kentucky, we want to see that every skilled unemployed Kentucky worker is in line for a defense job as these jobs open up. And it is our duty to the Nation to make sure that every qualified worker in the State can be located quickly when needed."

All unemployed workers and all workers with skills required in defense industries, who are not using those skills in their present jobs, are urged to register at once with the Commission's office nearest their home. The skills most needed at present are chiefly in trades used in machine manufacturing industries, machine shops, airplane manufacturing and shipbuilding.

Registration does not assume anyone of an immediate job, but it does greatly increase his chance of getting one either in a defense industry or in other lines, Hensley explained.
