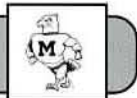

Best wishes for success in every area of your life.

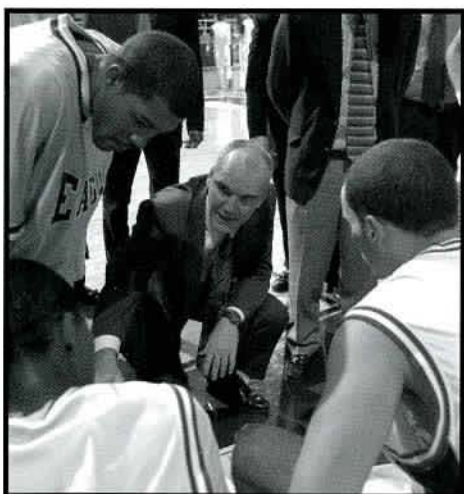

MSU Basketball History

Morehead State University has fielded an intercollegiate basketball team since its infancy, and Eagle teams have won more than 850 games and more than 20 conference or tournament championships and have participated in five NCAA National Basketball Championships.

MSU basketball began to earn regional and national prominence in the late 1930's when Ellis Johnson, a native of Ashland, Ky., and a multi-sport standout at the University of Kentucky, became the Eagle coach. Johnson coached the Eagles for 15 seasons, missing the 1943-44 and 1944-45 seasons due to military commitments during World War II. He remains the University's all-time winningest coach with 196 victories.

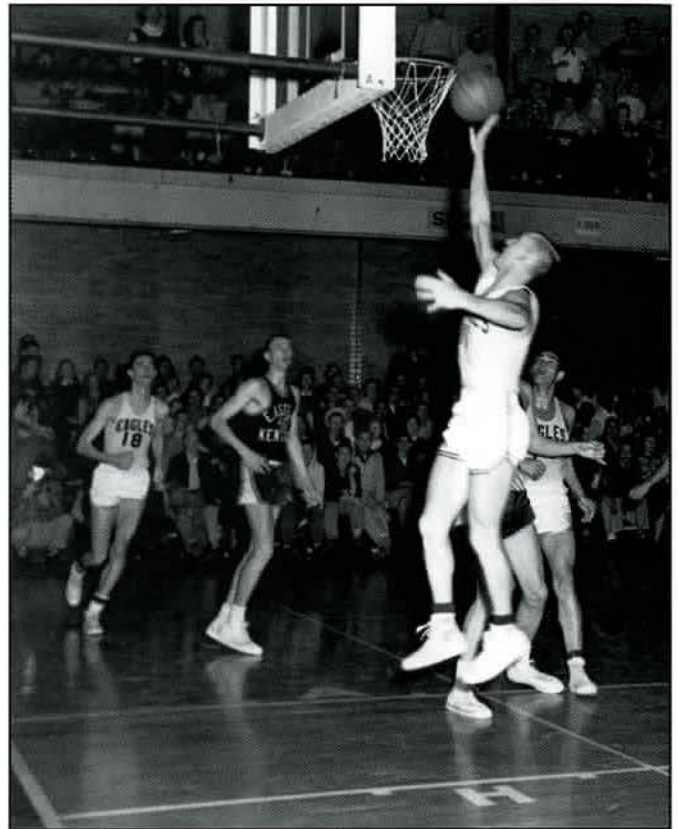
Among the great players during Johnson's tenure were All-Americans Earl Duncan, Warren Cooper and Sonny Allen. All three were 1,000-point scorers, and Allen went

on to a professional career and then served MSU in many capacities, including baseball coach and assistant athletic director before his retirement. The Eagle baseball field is named in his honor.

Johnson passed the coaching torch to Bobby Laughlin. Laughlin coached MSU for 12 seasons, and his teams earned four Ohio Valley Conference championships and three trips to the NCAA Championships.

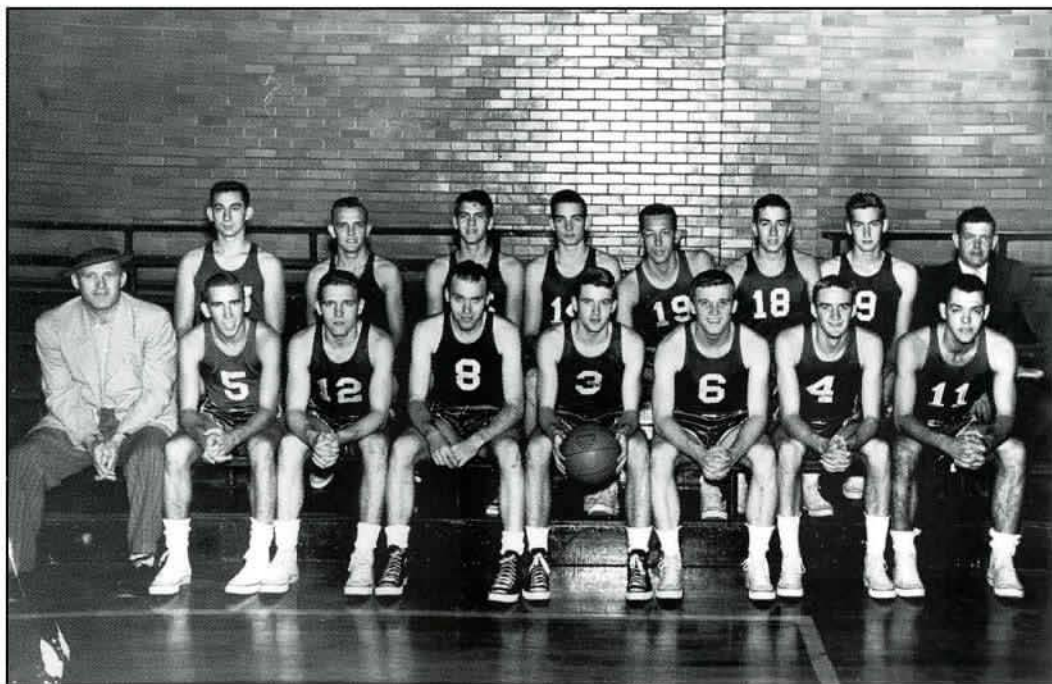
Early in his tenure, Laughlin benefited from performances by All-

Americans Dan Swartz and Steve



Hamilton. Swartz was honored twice on All-America teams and went on to an NBA career with the Boston Celtics. Hamilton was adept at both basketball and baseball and is one of only two individuals to ever play in both an NBA Championship Series and a World Series. After leaving MSU, Hamilton played for the Minneapolis Lakers of the NBA before concentrating on a baseball career that saw him pitch for several teams, most notably the New York Yankees.

In 1955-56, the Eagles won two games in the NCAA Championships

before being eliminated. In 1956-57, MSU lost a first round game to a very talented Pitt squad by only one point.

MSU's other NCAA appearance under Laughlin came in 1960-61 when the Eagles defeated Xavier in the first round, then lost a seven-point decision to Kentucky. Granville "Granny" Williams scored 705 points for the 1960-61 team.

All-American Harold Sergent was the standout player during the final years of Laughlin's tenure.

Bob Wright took over as the Eagle coach in 1965-66 when Laughlin became the University's athletic director. Wright's teams featured two of the most exciting players in Eagle history, "Leapin" Lamar Green and Willie "Hobo" Jackson. Green went on to a successful professional career.

Bill Harrell succeeded Wright and led MSU to two conference championships. His teams featured native Kentuckians Leonard Coulter,

Howard Wallen, Jim Day, Arch Johnson and Ted Hundley. Coulter earned All-America honors in 1972.

MSU went through some lean years in the late 1970's, but play was always exciting thanks to Hundley and Herbie Stamper, MSU's all-time leading scorer. Stamper, a long-range bomber, scored 2,072 points without benefit of the three-point line.

Wayne Martin took over as MSU coach in 1978-79 and led the Eagles to two NCAA appearances in his nine seasons. Eddie Childress and Earl Harrison were standouts on the 1982-83 and 1983-84 NCAA teams.

Bob McCann, an OVC Player of the Year, was a standout player from 1984 through 1987 and has since played for several NBA and Euro-

pean professional teams.

Another recent Eagle to make his mark nationally was Bret Roberts, OVC Player of the Year in 1991-92. Roberts led the nation in scoring with 28.1 ppg. average in 1991-92. He was drafted in both the major league baseball and NBA draft. He played professional baseball in the Minnesota Twins organization.

Current Eagle Ricky Minard was a 2001-02 All-OVC selection and ranked among the top scorers in the country. Last year's Eagle team led the nation in free throw shooting.

As you can see, All-Americans, statistical champions, Player of the Year honors and NCAA postseason play is not new to MSU. The challenge now is to revive that tradition!





MSU Basketball Today

Throughout this publication, you get a picture of Morehead State University Eagle basketball today.

MSU's facilities rival any in the Ohio Valley Conference and among



athletic training staff.

Academic achievement is an integral part of the Eagle basketball program. Study halls, tutors, computer laboratories and constant assistance and monitoring are available for student-athletes.

The MSU travel itineraries feature first class transportation and road headquarters and top-ranked opponents. This year the Eagles add Alabama and Arizona State to a nonconference schedule that has previously included Kentucky, Louisville, Cincinnati, Florida, Georgia Tech, Minnesota, North Carolina State, Dayton, Ohio State and Vanderbilt.

The Eagle coaching staff, led by Head Coach Kyle Macy, a two time All-American at Kentucky, has a plethora of national and international



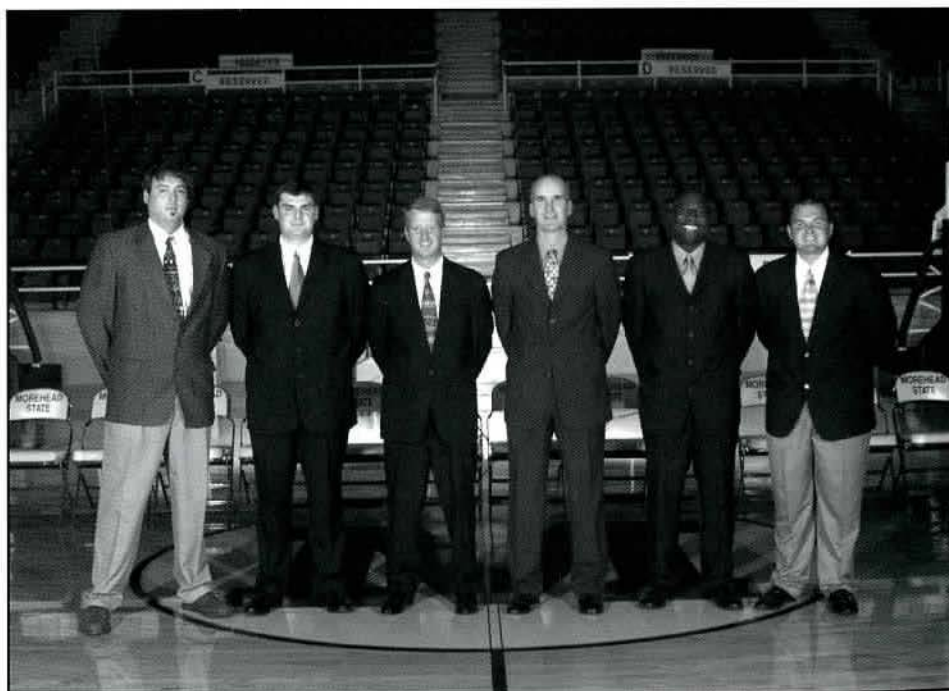
playing and coaching experience. The 2002-03 coaching staff is pictured below.

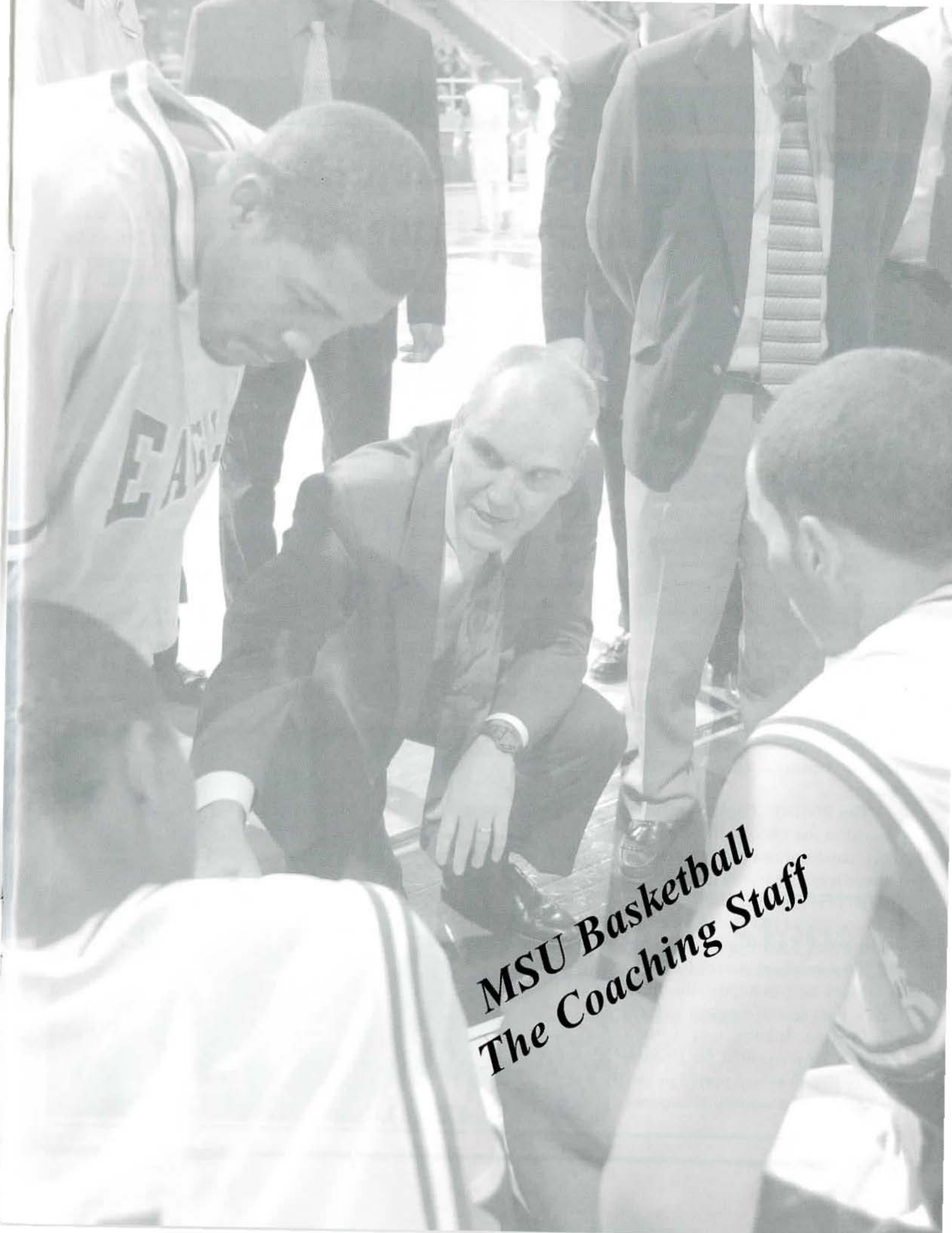
Today's Eagle basketball program takes the proud traditions of the past and couples them with the latest innovations in today's intercollegiate athletic world.

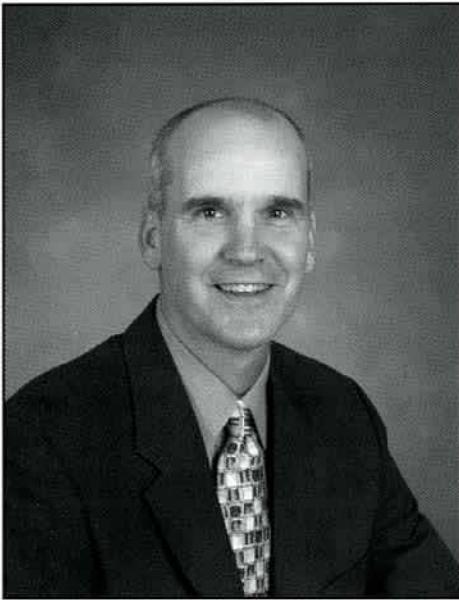

Kyle Macy, Head Coach



Kyle Macy, one of the Commonwealth of Kentucky's best known and most popular basketball figures, begins his sixth season as the Head Men's Basketball Coach at Morehead State University.

A native of Indiana, Macy has been inducted into the Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame. He joined such basketball greats as Larry Bird and Oscar Robertson as a unanimous selection.

The 2001-02 Eagles finished second in the Ohio Valley Conference standings and became Macy's second team to advance to the semifinals of the league tournament. The 18 wins posted last season were the most by an Eagle squad since the NCAA tournament team of 1983-84.

Macy, born in Kendalville, Ind., and a high school standout at Peru (Ind.) High School, was a two-time All-American at the University of Kentucky and played on the Wildcats' 1978 national champion-

ship team. He played three seasons at Kentucky after spending one season at Purdue.

Following his collegiate career, he spent seven seasons in the NBA, playing for the Phoenix Suns (5), Chicago Bulls (1) and Indiana Pacers (1). In all seven of his NBA seasons, his team qualified for the playoffs. He also played three seasons in the Italian professional league.

From 1993 through 1997, he served as the color analyst for the University of Kentucky Radio Network's broadcasts of Wildcat basketball. He has also worked with Host Creative TV, Host Communications Radio, Raycom Television Sports, SportsChannel, Mutual Radio, ESPN, WVLK-Radio and Westwood One Radio.

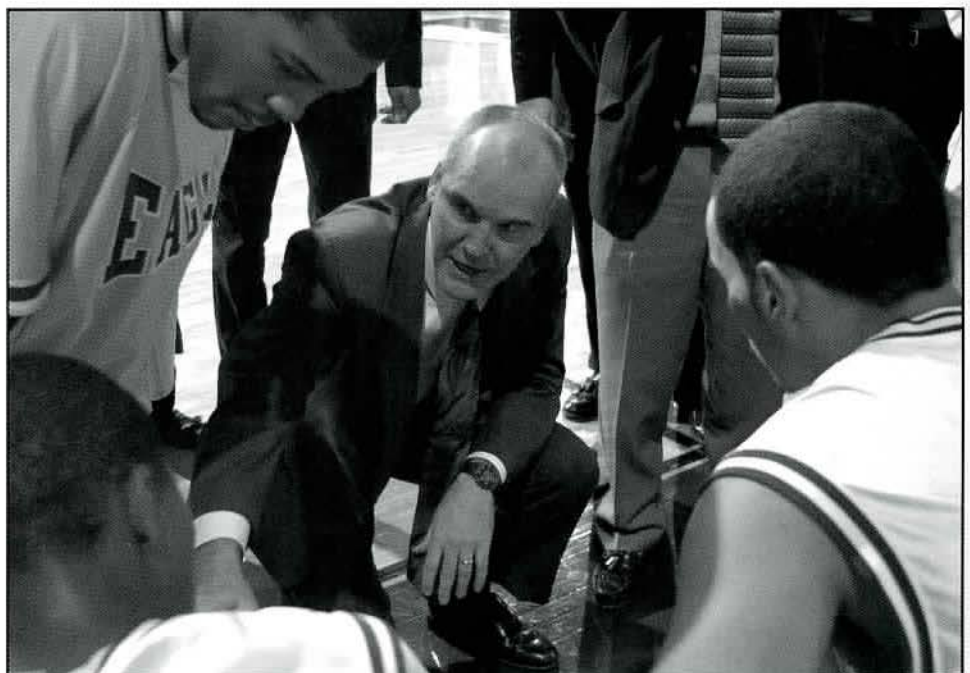
From August, 1994, until his ap-

pointment as Eagle coach, he was a Correspondent Banking Officer for Central Bank & Trust Company in Lexington.

Macy's annual basketball camp has been held for more than 20 years and more than 1,000 youngsters and 125 coaches participate annually. He has also produced an instructional basketball video and published a high school basketball preview.

"It's extremely exciting to be a head coach on the Division I level," Macy said. "Becoming a head coach was something I'd been looking forward to since I was four-years old and sitting on the bench beside my father."

The 45-year old Macy and his wife, Tina, have two daughters, Mallory and Meredith, and a son, Malone.

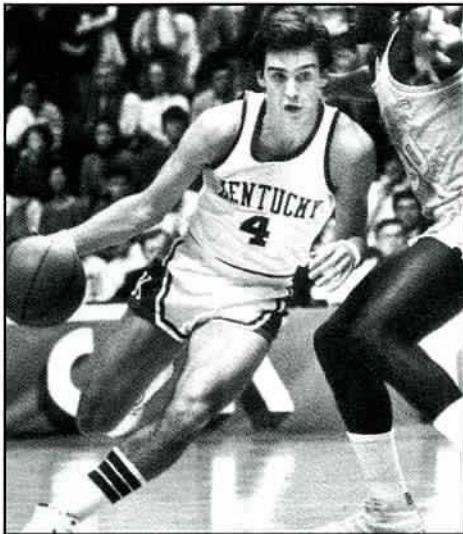

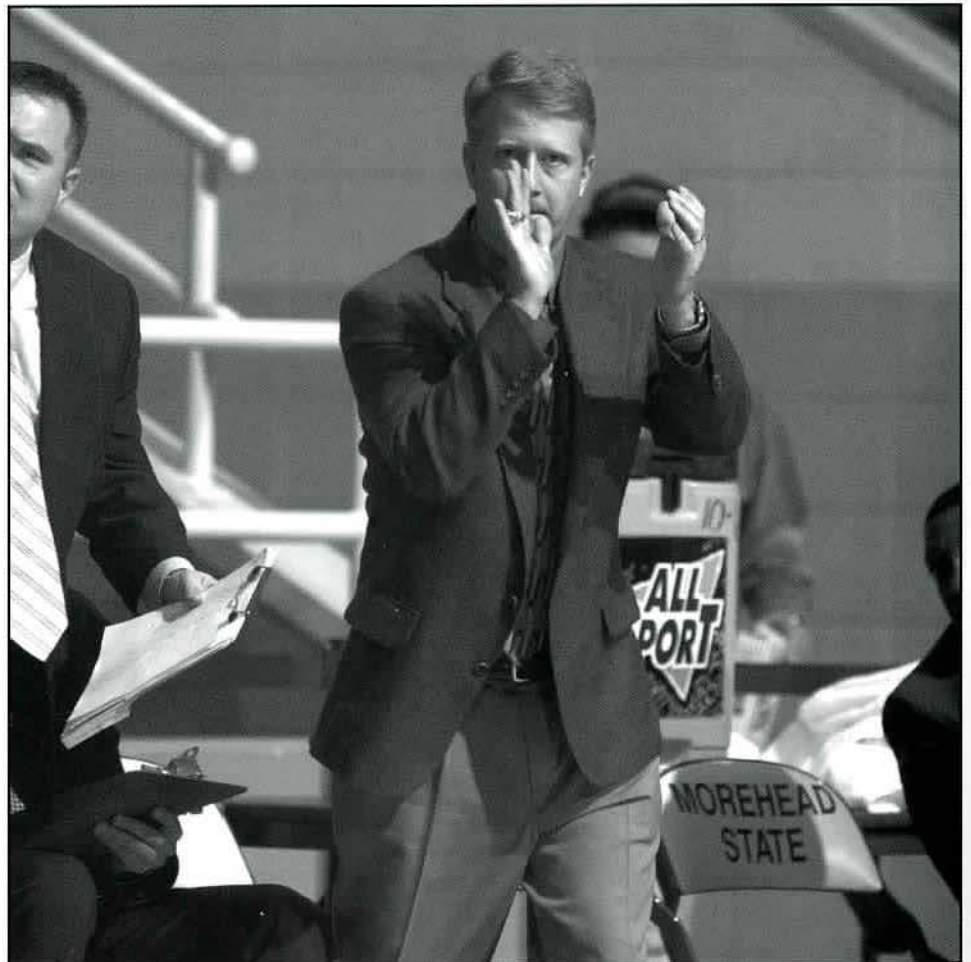
Games Trials, World Championship Trials and several Olympic Sports Festivals. Breeden has also conducted clinics in South America and Japan.

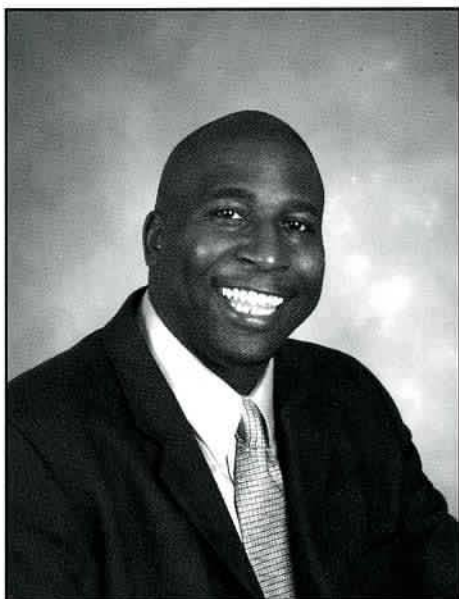
Breeden holds bachelor's and master's degrees from Kentucky. He and his wife, the former Patti Pedisich of Lake Ronkonkoma, N.Y., are the proud parents of a daughter, Jillian.

Veteran college and high school coach Wayne Breeden begins his sixth season at Morehead State University. Breeden directs the recruiting efforts of the MSU staff and performs many other coaching and administrative tasks.

Breeden became an assistant on the MSU staff after a successful tenure at Ashland Blazer High School where he had a five-year record of 123-41. He led the Tomcats to the runner-up spot in the 1996 Kentucky State High School Tournament.

The native of Mt. Washington, Ky., began his coaching career as a graduate assistant under Joe B. Hall at the University of Kentucky. That season the Wildcats advanced to the NCAA Final Four. In addition to serving four years as an assistant at Kentucky, Breeden has been an assistant coach at George Mason and Eastern Kentucky. In addition to working under Hall, he has also served as an assistant to Eddie

won the Big 10 championship, and during Robinson's career, IU played in three NCAA Tournaments and advanced to the "Sweet 16" twice.

Following his collegiate career, Robinson spent several years in private business before joining the Plattsburgh State staff in 2001.

He earned a bachelor's degree from Indiana in 1993.

A native of Anderson, Ind., and a former all-state basketball player at Madison Heights High School, Robinson is married to the former Tracy Baxter of Ellettsville, Ind. They have two sons, Isaia (4) and Mekhi (6 months).

Robinson also has a daughter, Sara (15).



Stew Robinson, a former standout guard at Indiana and most recently an assistant basketball coach at Plattsburgh State, is in his first season as an assistant basketball coach at Morehead State University.

Robinson played from 1982-86 for Coach Bob Knight and the Hoosiers. At IU, he was a three-year starter and a two-time season assist leader. The 1982-83 Hoosier team

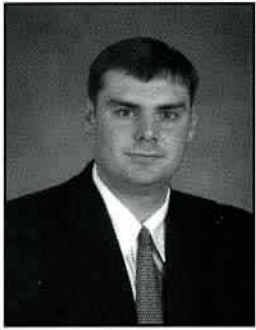
Morehead State coaches at various Kyle Macy camps.

He will complete requirements for a bachelor's degree this year.



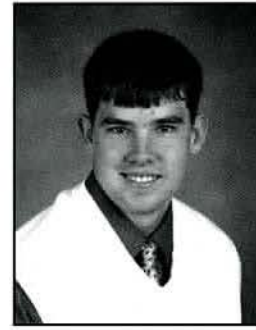

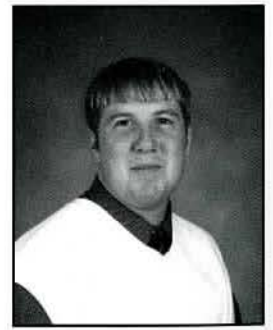

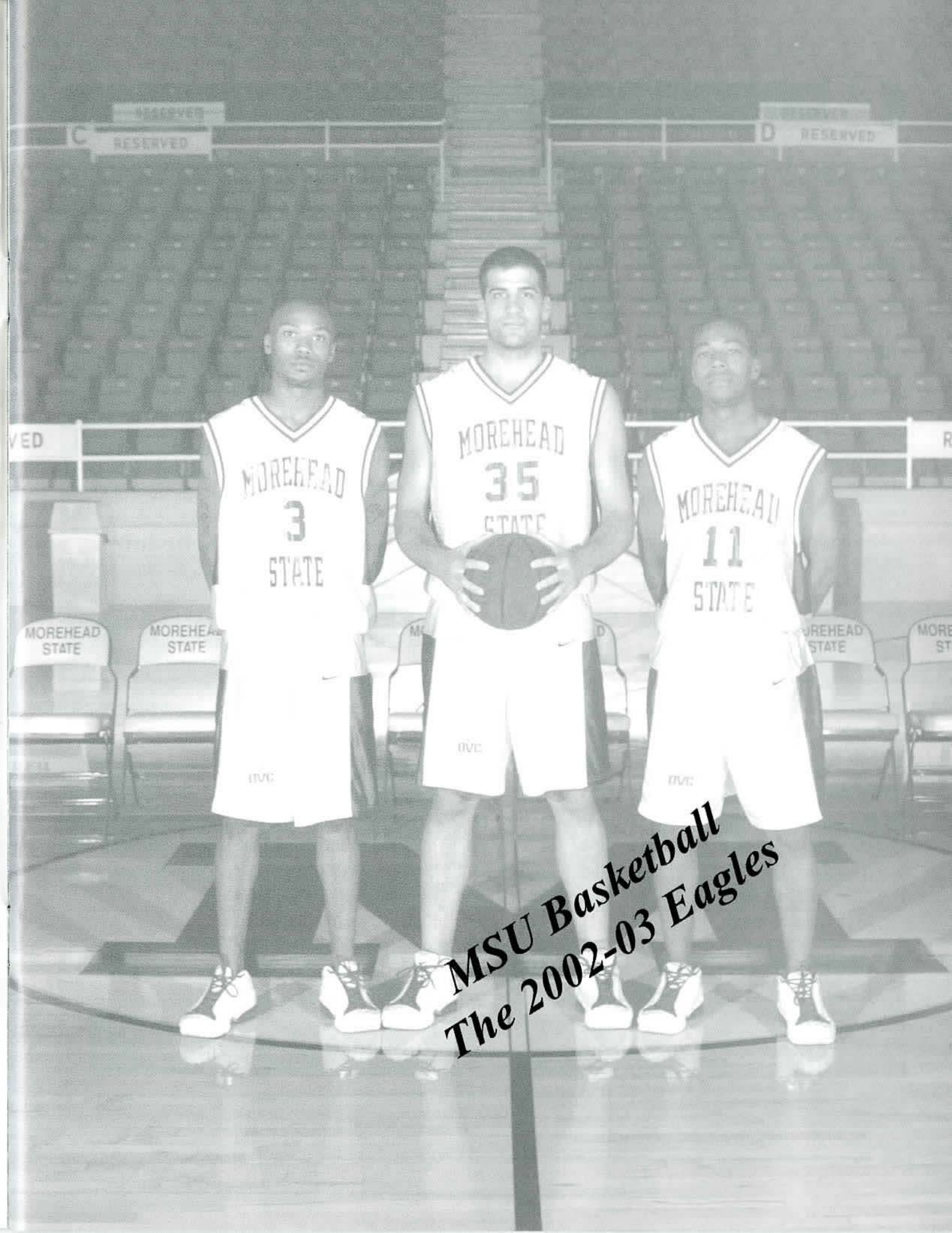

The Eagle Outlook

Kyle Macy enters his sixth season at the helm of the Morehead State University basketball program with four returning starters and another outstanding recruiting class.

Wayne Breeden returns as an Eagle assistant. Stew Robinson, a former standout player at Indiana is in his first year as an assistant. Former student manager Jeff Davis, and former Eagles Troy Lee Thomas and Kyle Umberger round out the staff.

Veterans

Heading the list of returnees are All-OVC honorees Ricky Minard (6-4, 201, Jr.) and Marquis Sykes (6-0, 175, Sr.). Minard averaged 22.3 points and 6.9 rebounds in 2001-02 and was named first-team all-confer-

ence. Sykes became MSU's all-time assist leader as a junior and averaged 9.4 points and 6.5 assists.

Other returning starters are post player Ike Lopez (6-9, 220, Sr.) and guard Kyle Hankins (6-2, 180, So.). Lopez averaged 8.9 points and 6.1 rebounds. Hankins averaged 4.8 points.

Also back are Chez Marks (6-3, 160, Sr.), David Aliu (6-6, 250, Jr.), Ramon Kelly (6-4, 180, So.), Kalilou Kamara (6-5, 207, So.), Cory Burns (6-8, 225, So.) and Chad McKnight (6-7, 220, So.). Marks averaged 8.7 points and ranked second in the OVC in 3-point field goal percentage. Aliu averaged 4.1 points and 2.7 rebounds. Kelly saw extensive action before missing the final 10 games

with a leg injury. Kamara saw limited action. Burns made two starts. McKnight missed early games with a knee injury but is healthy in 2002-03.

Newcomers

Two junior college standouts and a high school all-stater make up MSU's 2002 recruiting class. They are post player Anton Kerley (6-9, 253, Jr.), wing Craig Lewis (6-6, 180, Jr.) and point guard Quinton Smith (5-11, 170, Fr.). Smith will sit out the 2002-03 season.

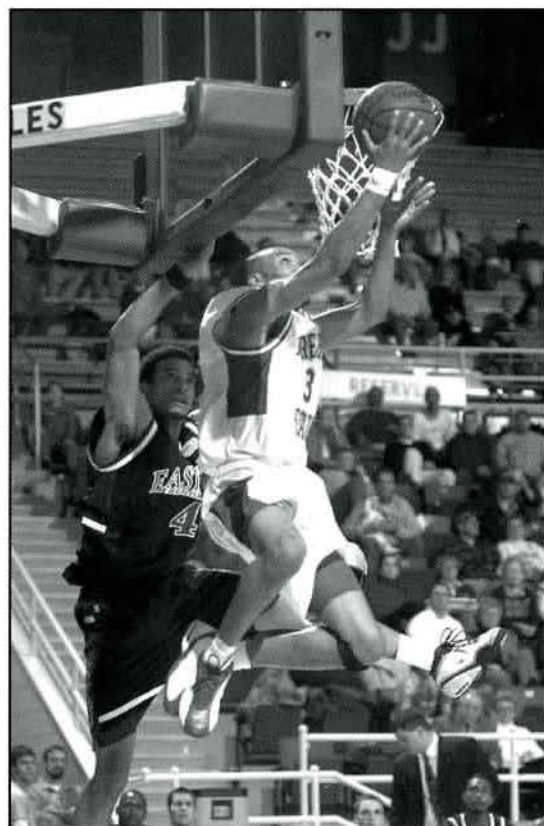
Academic-Athletic Center



The Academic-Athletic Center, with its Ellis T. Johnson Arena, has been the home of the

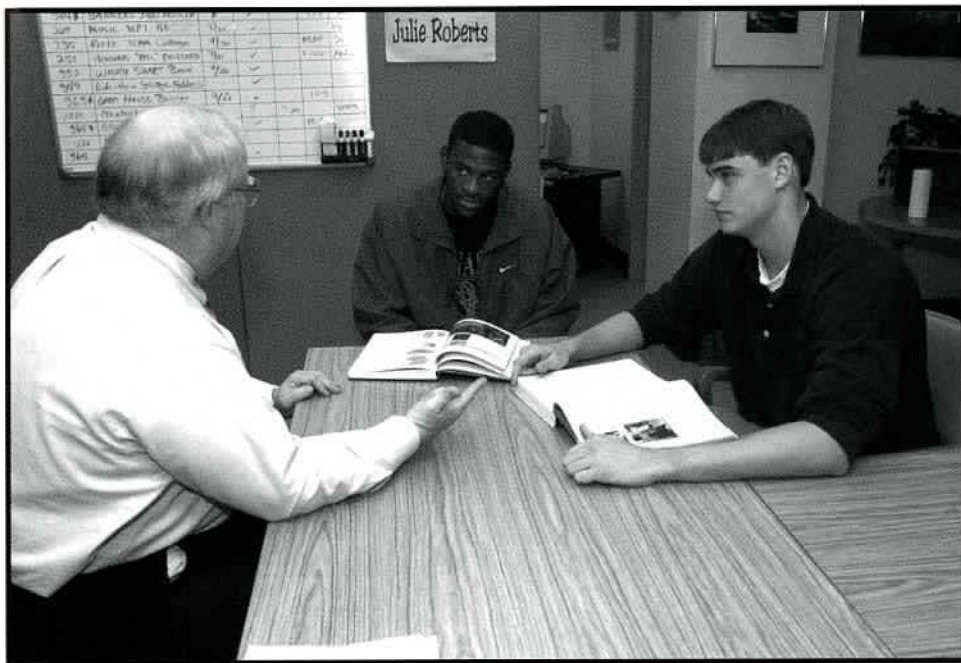
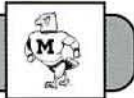
Basketball Eagles since 1981. The first University function in the facility was Spring Commencement on May 9, 1981.

In addition to MSU basketball games, the AAC also plays host to MSU commencements, various meetings and outstanding concerts. Among the artists that have performed in the facility are Alabama, David Letterman, M.C. Hammer, the Goo Goo Dolls, Blessed Union of Souls and Sawyer Brown.



Every March, Johnson Arena comes alive with the sounds of high school basketball as MSU annually plays host to the Boys and Girls 16th Region Tournaments.

The AAC also includes an outstanding L-shaped Olympic swimming pool with separate diving area, a gymnastics room utilized by the National Champion Eagle Cheerleaders, a physiology laboratory, two VIP meeting rooms that are used at Eagle games for fans and boosters, a weight room, sauna and steam rooms and four concession areas.

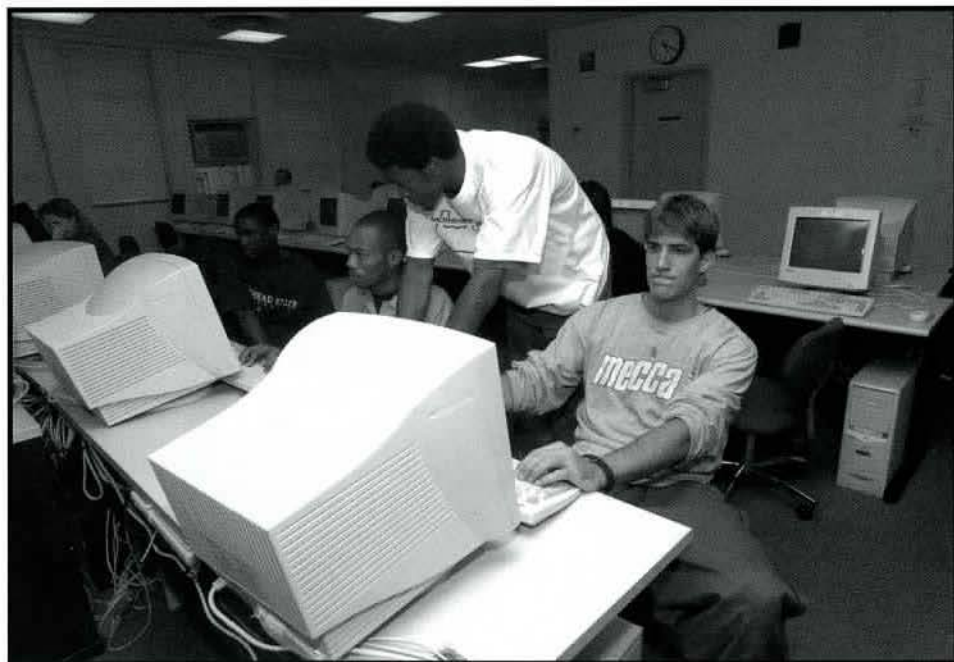
Academically, the University offers 76 undergraduate degree programs, including nine associate level degrees and 12 pre-professional programs in four colleges -- Business, Education, Humanities, and Science and Technology -- and 1921 academic departments.

There are 15 graduate degree programs plus 17 graduate level non-degree programs designed especially for professional educators. A post-master's level degree, education specialist,

and a joint doctoral program with the University of Kentucky also are offered on the MSU campus.

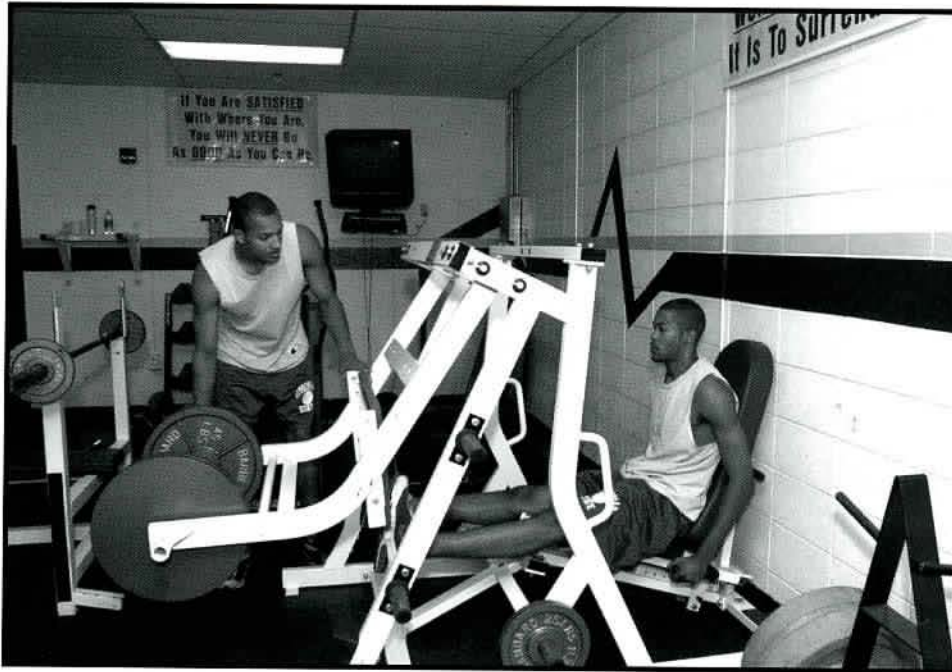
Classes also are conducted in Ashland, Jackson, Maysville, Pikeville, Prestonsburg, West Liberty, Whitesburg and other locations. Extended campus centers located in Ashland, Jackson, Prestonsburg, and West Liberty are staffed with full-time personnel.

Additionally, MSU offers distance learning courses via Internet and interactive compressed video. Sixty-one percent of MSU's 320 full-time faculty members hold doctoral degrees.





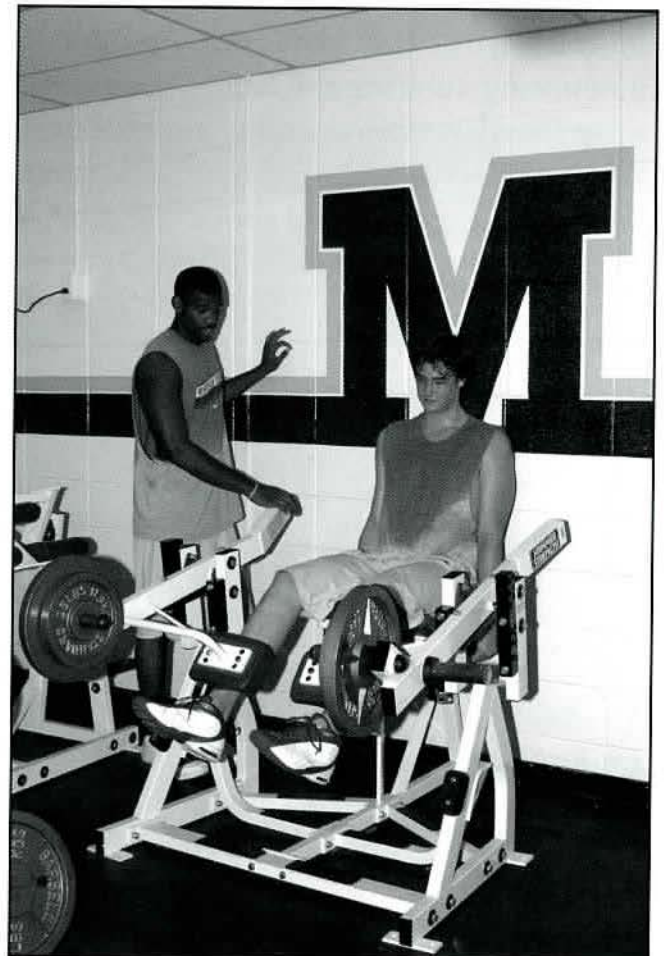
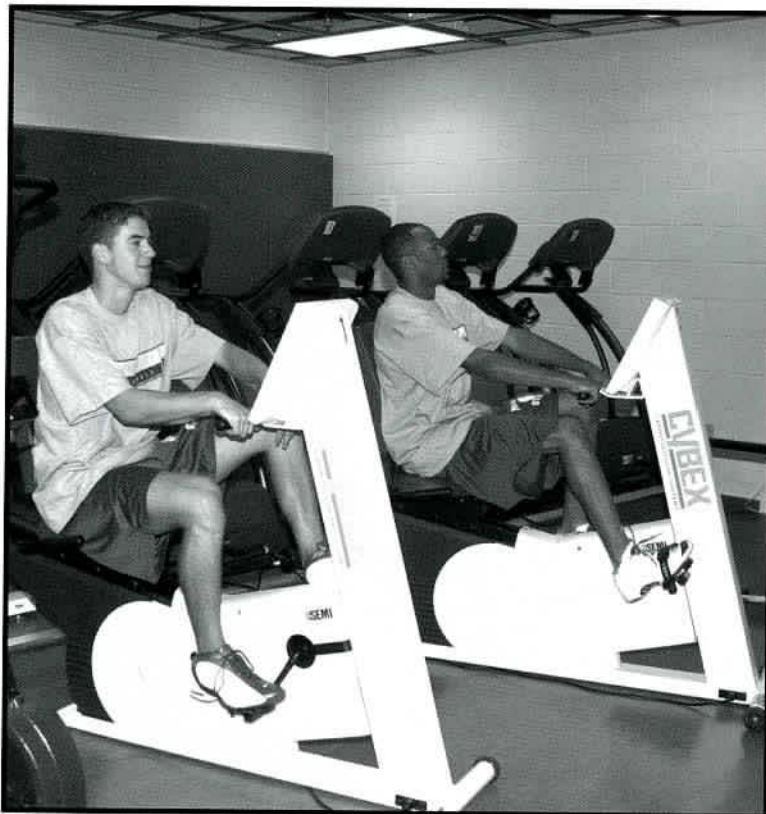

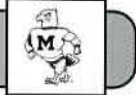
The men's basketball team benefits from the expertise of its coaching staff and the experience of those individuals in strength and conditioning programs.

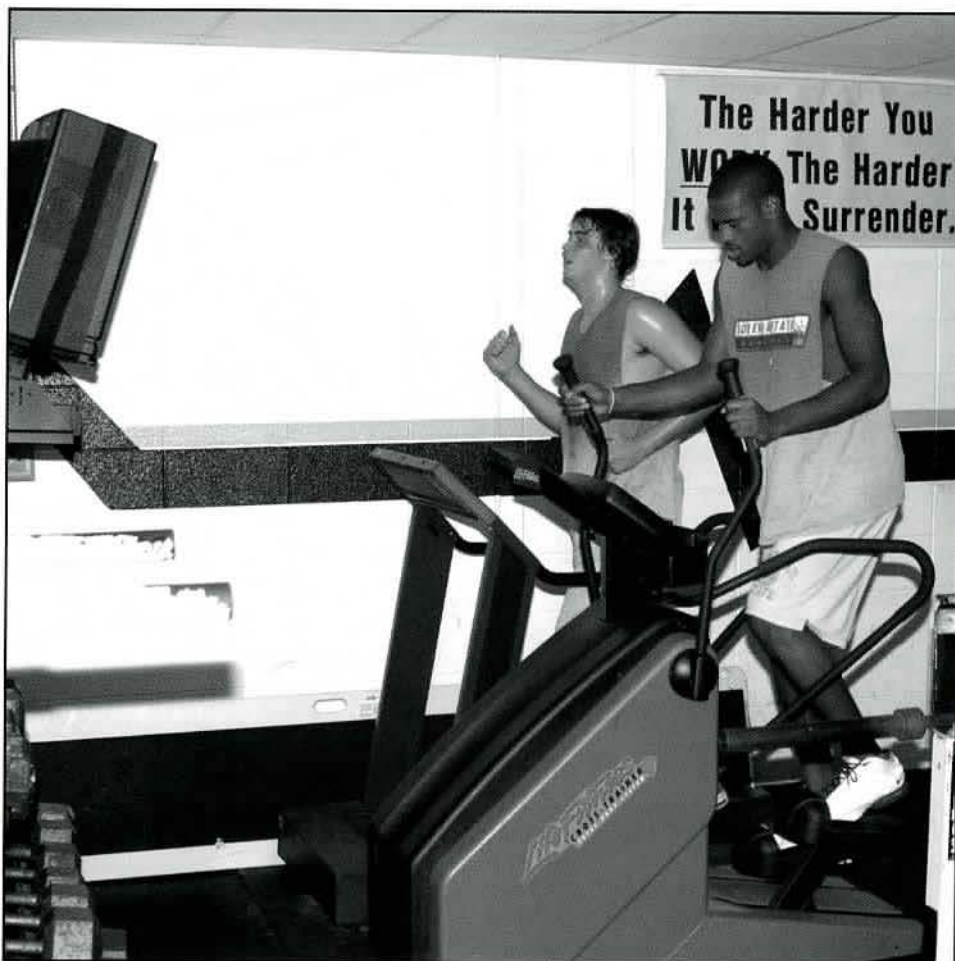
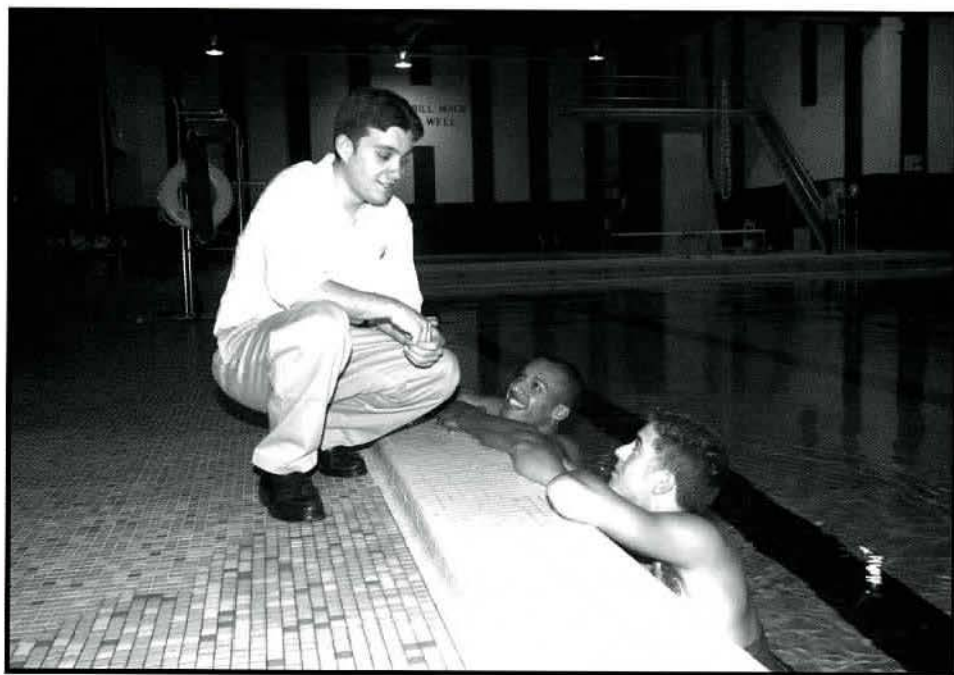
Center, the track at Jayne Stadium and MSU's new, state-of-the-art Wellness Center, located next door to the Academic Athletic Center.

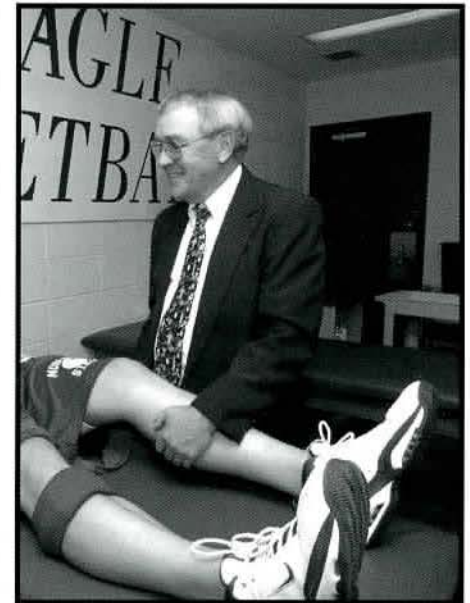

Carver earned a bachelor's degree in exercise science from Northwestern State University (La.) and a master's degree in kinesiology from Kentucky.

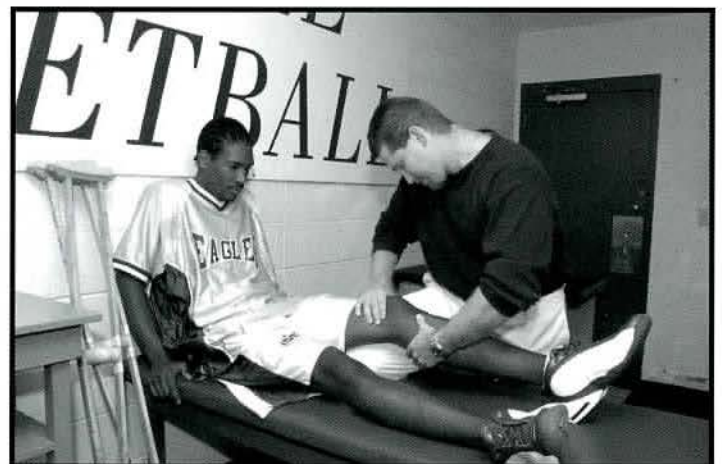

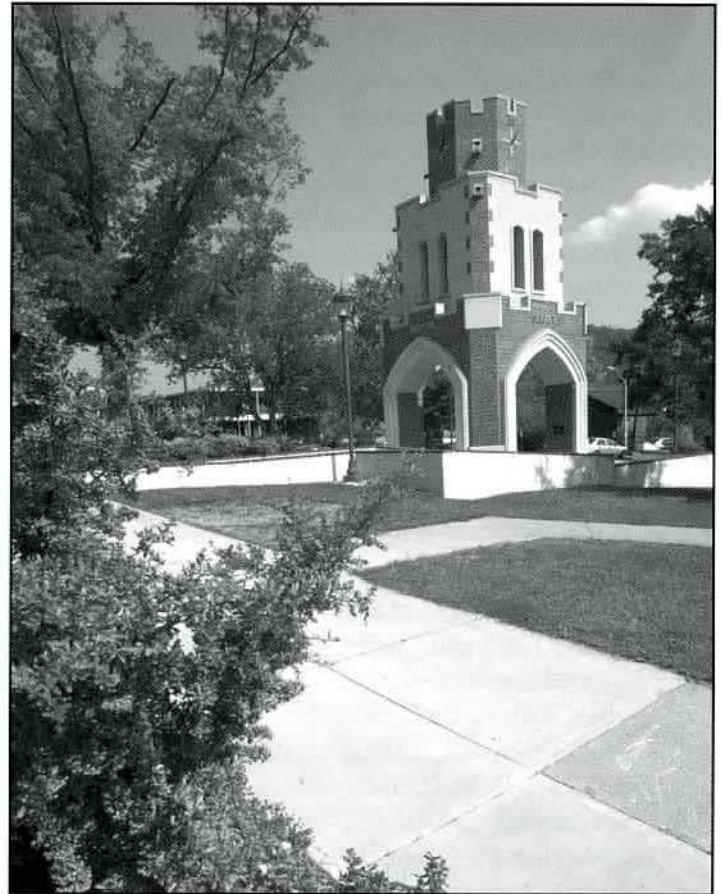
The University

Meeting the educational needs of Eastern Kentucky while striving to constantly improve the quality of its public service, economic development and applied research programs are the primary objectives of Morehead State University.

Historically the University traces its lineage to the Morehead Normal School, which opened its doors in 1887. The private school closed in the spring of 1922 when the Kentucky General Assembly established Morehead State Normal School. The state institution accepted its first students in the fall of 1923 and graduated its first class in 1927. Name changes occurred in 1926 when "and Teachers College" was added, again in 1930 when it was shortened to Morehead State Teachers College, again in 1948 when "Teachers" was dropped and, finally, to university status in 1966. Twelve men, starting with Dr. Frank C. Button, have served as president. Dr. Ronald G. Eaglin assumed office as the 12th president on July 1, 1992.

Academically, the University offers 88 undergraduate degree programs, including nine associate level degrees and 12 pre-professional programs in four colleges -- Business, Education, Humanities, and Science and Technology -- and 19 academic departments. There are 35 graduate degree programs plus 17 graduate level non-degree programs designed especially for professional educators. A post-master's level degree, education specialist with four speciality areas, and a joint doctoral program with the University of Kentucky also are offered on the MSU campus.

Classes also are conducted in Ashland, Jackson, Maysville, Pikeville, Prestonsburg, West Liberty, Whitesburg and other locations.



The University



Extended campus centers located in Ashland, Jackson, Prestonsburg, and West Liberty are staffed with full-time personnel. Additionally, the University offers a number of distance learning courses throughout the region via Internet and interactive video. Sixty-one percent of MSU's 340 full-time faculty members hold doctoral degrees.

Physically, the University is located in the foothills of the Daniel Boone National Forest in Rowan County. The nearly 500-acre main campus within the city limits of Morehead includes more than 50 major structures with a total replacement value of more than \$144 million. Beyond the city, the University's real estate holdings include the 320-acre Derrickson Agriculture complex and a nine-hole public golf course. The instructional plant includes 120 class rooms and 112 laboratories. Housing facilities include space for approximately 3,400 single students and 138 families.

Fiscally, the University currently operates on an annual budget of \$93.1 million with about \$44.7 million provided by the state and \$29.4 million coming from tuition and fees and other sources. Additionally, grants and contracts from external sources for research, service and academic/student support projects generate more than \$10 million each year. Private donations to the University, mainly through the MSU Foundation, Inc., have reached \$2 million.

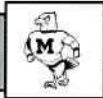
Statistically, the University has awarded more than 51,000 degrees and currently has 1,049 full-time employees. The student body represents 105 Kentucky counties, 43 states and 37 foreign countries. The University attracts more than 55,000 visitors each year and its economic impact, directly and indirectly, on the Morehead area is estimated at more than \$80 million yearly.

Administratively, the University is governed by an 11-member Board of Regents with eight citizens appointed by the governor and three seats held by the elected faculty, staff and student representatives. Management of the institution is vested primarily in five divisions -- Academic

Affairs, Administration and Fiscal Services, Development, Student Life and University Relations-- each headed by a vice president.

Athletically, the University sponsors 18 intercollegiate sports for men and women in accordance with the regulations of the Ohio Valley Conference, the Pioneer Football League and Division I of the National Collegiate Athletic Association. MSU also supports an intramural program involving more than 20 team and individual sports.

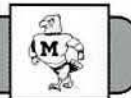

The Ohio Valley Conference Sportsmanship Statement

General. The Ohio Valley Conference is committed to establishing sportsmanship and developing healthy environments for competition. This conference wants to lead the way in abolishing the notion that it is desirable to create a "hostile" environment for intercollegiate athletic contests. Instead, we will strive to create "hospitable" environments. We believe that part of the role of education through sports is to teach our youth and our communities to conduct themselves with sportsmanship and respect for opponents.

In an effort to achieve this goal, the Conference has developed this statement which outlines the expectations of the various groups and individuals associated with our intercollegiate athletics program.

Administration. It is incumbent upon institutional administrators to create an environment of hospitality for visiting teams, particularly for those individuals at Conference institutions. OVC administrators must develop the attitude that the treatment of a visiting team and its fans will be in the same manner that they would want their teams to be treated.

The athletics director at the host institution must ensure that he or she, or someone else designated as game manager, approaches the coach of the opposing team at a spectator event in order to welcome that coach to the institution, provided an opportunity for the coach to address and concerns, indicate the location of the game manager in the arena or stadium and identify security personnel to ensure that the visiting team is protected from abuse from the home crowd and that security is in very close proximity to the visiting team's bench. Each institution must arrange its seating at spectator events so as to emphasize sportsmanship and minimize the harassment of the visiting team and its fans.

The athletics director must ensure that those who are employed by the university treat the opponents with fairness and respect. For example, public address announcers must be required to announce the contest in an evenhanded manner with equal excitement for both teams. The institution's chief executive officer and athletics director should review periodically with other athletics department staff members, coaches, student-athletes and spirit groups (cheerleaders and bands) precisely what is acceptable conduct, as set forth in this document.

Coaches. Coaches have the greatest amount of influence over whether the young people in their programs are taught and follow the high principles of sportsmanship. The OVC has been benefited by coaches who have risked losing a contest by removing student-athletes who have demonstrated disrespect for

the opponents. This discipline measure educates that individual and his or her teammates about the importance of sportsmanship over participation and winning. This type of attitude and courage must be adopted by all OVC coaches. Administrators and coaches must pay special attention to their student-athletes' behavior and continually emphasize the need for sportsmanship and respect. Such education is needed to counteract the constant messages received by our young people from many professional athletes and others who demonstrate a lack of respect for opponents. This Conference and its coaches are committed to teach messages that are appropriate about sportsmanship.

Coaches also have the ability to influence the behavior of their fans. OVC coaches must take every opportunity when addressing the media, booster groups or other public forums to express the desire for fans to support their team at home contests, but not to abuse the visiting team. Coaches and administrators should stress that the participants in our athletics contests are young people who do not deserve to be mistreated by a hostile crowd.

Student-Athletes. Respect for the game in which the student-athlete participates also demands respect for the opponent. Student athletes at OVC institutions are expected to treat opponents with sportsmanship.

OVC student-athletes must understand that they are perhaps the most visible representatives of their institutions. Also, their behavior is observed and emulated by many who are younger. OVC student-athletes must honor the responsibilities that accompany the privilege of representing our schools by behaving with dignity and class on and off the field.

Spirit Groups. Like our student-athletes, these groups are visible representatives of our universities. As such, we place high expectations on them for decent behavior. Cheerleaders, bands and other spirit groups are admitted to contests at the pleasure of our institutions to support their teams and assist in creating a fun atmosphere. They are not admitted in order to disrupt or confront the opponent and such behavior will not be tolerated. Their focus must be toward encouragement of their team and respect for the opposing team.

Officials. Officials who are assigned Conference contests must enforce the rules regarding sportsmanship, without tolerance for abuse. The only warning to participants and coaches regarding sportsmanship should come at the beginning of the contest. Once the contest begins, penalties (consequences), not warning, must be assessed for violations of unsportsmanlike conduct. Similar to the baseball policy of ejecting coaches for arguing balls and strikes, the Conference will require that officials eject any coach who

protests unsportsmanlike conduct calls, provided such ejection is permissible to the rules of that sport.

Each official assigned by the OVC will be provided a card with the following statement which must be read to the captains and coaches of every contest prior to the beginning of the game: "The OVC requires officials to enforce all rules regarding unsportsmanlike conduct by coaches and players. There will not be any tolerance for negative statements or actions between opposing players, especially taunting and baiting. If such comments are heard, a penalty will be assessed immediately. If any coach protests an unsportsmanlike penalty, he or she will be ejected for the contest. We have been instructed not to issue warnings during the contests. It is strongly suggested that you remind your participants of this policy." Officials who do not follow this policy will be subject to suspension.

Commissioner. The commissioner is expected to enforce the unsportsmanlike conduct rules of the game and the Conference. He or she is authorized to assess penalties for improper behavior that is not detected or properly addressed during the contest. Institutions and their personnel are expected to fully cooperate with his or her effort to investigate possible improper behavior.

In the unfortunate event that an altercation occurs during a contest, all individuals who are on the bench are expected to remain there. It is incumbent upon the head coach to ensure that this occurs. The commissioner is directed to suspend automatically the head coach of a team whose bench personnel enter the field or court of play during an altercation, regardless of whether those individuals become involved in the altercation.

Fans. The Conference hopes and believes that the establishment of the principles outlined in this document will create a wholesome atmosphere that will attract more fans to our events. The fans attending our games must be reminded by the public address announcer of the expectations of sportsmanship and respect for both opponents.

We expect that all fans will act in an appropriate manner, and respect the opposition and the officials. We understand that occasionally there are individuals who attend games and abuse the opposition and officials. Those individuals may be dismissed from athletic events.

Concluding Statement. The Conference believes that the effort to meet the expectations outlined in this document will increase the attractiveness at our athletic events by creating a healthy environment for our competition.

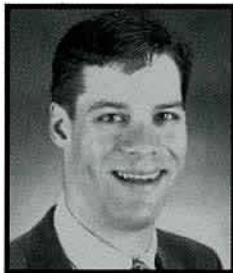
Stacy begins his 16th season as sports information director.

The NCAA defines "representatives of athletic interests" as alumni, friends and boosters of the University. All member institutions are held accountable for their representatives' actions. One violation could jeopardize the eligibility of any or all Eagle Athletic programs.

As a general rule, anyone who has financially supported Eagle Athletics, been a member of any booster organization, or who has supported Eagle Athletics is considered a "representative" of Eagle Athletics. If anyone has questions regarding these types of relationships, please contact Brian Hutchinson, Associate Director of Athletics (606) 783-2593.

Prospective student-athletes can be defined as a student who has started classes in the ninth grade or any younger student-athlete who has received a benefit from the institution. These individuals may only be recruited by MSU coaches who have passed the *NCAA Recruiting Rules Examination*. While "representatives" of Eagle Athletics may speak to any of these individuals via telephone or in person, a recruiting effort must not be made. Also, no student-athlete or prospective student-athlete may receive any extra benefit outside of the support provided by the institution. These are certainly not all the regulations any "representative" of Eagle Athletics must remember.
