For advertising purposes, the right way would be to give back to each customer in proportion to the amount of trade, without his gambling for it. But the way it is done, they take the profit allotted to this means of advertising, and instead of giving to each customer his right proportion, they put it all in a pot, and gamble for it. The man with one ticket may win what the man with a hundred loses. But if we were to take this jack pot down behind the creek bank and "shoot craps" for it, the public would be ashamed to gamble for it, for they would be "low down" gambling. But being up here and make a public institution of it, in the streets, elevates gambling to an accepted institution.

But there is no difference. The man out yonder in the gambling dive is no worse than the merchant who gathers on bank night or on Saturday afternoon to try of getting something for nothing. The reason each customer is not given back in his proportionate amount of trade is, that, without something to appeal to the gambling instinct, craps could not be brought together for the occasion. And here is the evil of all games of institutions of chance—the appeal and development of the gambling instinct. In a game of checkers there is only skill. It never gets very much attention in the gambling circles. But in craps there is the chance—the mystery of the unknown—and the hope that "luck" will come through chance. There is no gambling where we know what is coming. The mystery of the chance is the appeal.

However mild in form this may be, or innocent in appearance, the world is full of wrecks which started on an innocent carelessness, and I believe that the same thing will happen in Morehead, by practice and public example, the business of craps will be introduced here. Teach our children to gamble—to try to get something for nothing—and then sit on juries to penalize those same children when they grow up in these sins, to steal, to rob, to take a chance for gain.
