QUESTION—What do you think is the worst sin a man can commit?

From here and there comes word of the first insects arriving. Warm weather will bring them out in full force and the years' old gardeners vs. pest duel will begin.
In their usual order of emergence, the early insects are: Fleas, ticks, cutworms, Colorado potato beetle, and the several general feeders that keep consuming the garden vegetables until their favorite weed diet becomes available.
Flea beetles are small black chewing insects responsible for the many minute hole in leaves of potatoes and tomatoes. They can be curbed by spraying or dusting with any of the arsenicals, but Bordeaux mixture controls them. Too, Inasmuch as Bordeaux is the control for blight, which strikes both these crops later, its use is to be recommended, now, to control both.
The cabbage worm is a chewing insect and may be poisoned by dust or spray containing lead arsenate, calcium arsenate for some reason being not effective against it. The signal to begin application is the presence of the white and yellow "butterflies" bobbing about among the cabbages, laying eggs. However, applying poison should be stopped a month before cabbage harvesting is to be done, and rotenone substit-

Mexican beetle controls them, but application may be made from the above, as the holes the "general feeders" make are eaten through the leaf.
Kentucky College of Agriculture extension circular 359, just out, gives the control of all garden insects. Copies may be had from county and home agents or by writing to the college.

Raise More Hogs Says Ag. Expert

For Expanded Stock National Defense Calls Raising For Next Year

To meet the food requirements of the National Defense program it will be necessary to expand hog production, Grady Sellards, Extension Field Agent in Animal Husbandry of the College of Agriculture, University of Kentucky, makes the following statement relative to the present situation:

"The Secretary of Agriculture has suggested an early increase in pork production a government price-supporting plan is announced, hog prices to be supported on a basis of \$0.00 per 100 pounds of hog in Chicago."

"The extension program of the College of Agriculture, the recommendations of which have been widely adopted, has increased the efficiency of producers on thousands of farms, thus simplifying the matter of increasing production."

"Through the development and dissemination of a type of purebred hogs that develops to market weight in five to six months, a constantly increasing number of producers are adopting purebred breeding stock for market. In the use of purebreds properly fed and handled, the time required to produce finished market hogs may be reduced as much as two to three months. From such breeding stock two litters can readily be produced each year."

"As suggested by the Secretary an immediate increase in production may be accomplished by marketing at 25 pounds heavier than customary the hogs now on feed," reports Mr. Sellards.

Mr. Sellards says further that additional increase in production may be secured later by increasing the size of litter, diligent care at farrowing time; by providing good houses for sows frequently wander away from their pigs, leaving them to the mercy of the weather, and vicious animals, such as foxes. Shade should be provided in the summer."

"Scold all farrowing houses before using them a second time. Place houses on ground plowed since used by hogs, or ground with hogs little or none for some time. Brush and wash the mud and dirt from sows before plowing."

FBI Officers To Confer In This Section

Series Of Meetings Planned To Be Held In Various Sections Of State

According to H. K. Moss, Special Agent in Charge of the Federal Bureau of Investigation at Louisville, Kentucky, arrangements are being made to conduct a series of Quarterly Police Conference throughout the State of Kentucky. At these conferences there will be outlined the FBI Law Enforcement Officers Mobilization Plan for National Defense. These conferences will be held at Ashland and other locations.

These conferences will constitute a part of a nationwide program of the FBI for the mobilization of police agencies in national defense, internal security and intelligence activities. The FBI in accordance with a Presidential proclamation of September 6, 1939, has been designated as the coordinating agency of national defense investigations, intelligence and enforcement work. In order to discharge this very important responsibility of making national defense investigations, the FBI requests that all private citizens possessing information regarding national defense matters should immediately forward the information to the nearest office of the FBI.

All law enforcement agencies throughout the State of Kentucky will be invited to attend one of these police conferences. Very interesting programs have been arranged for these conferences and a sound motion picture, recently brought back from England, by representatives of the FBI will be exhibited at these conferences to show graphically some of the important police duties incident to the agencies, presently existing in England. Slides based on photographs and illustrations obtained in England will also be shown. There will also be given a practical demonstration in the handling and detection of explosives, as well as a general discussion and demonstration of sabotage methods. A portion of these conferences will be devoted to a special closed secret session to be attended only by enforcement officers. The executive officials of all law enforcement organizations, small and large, will be afforded an opportunity at these conferences to execute a written pledge to support this FBI Law Enforcement Officers Mobilization Plan for National Defense. It is anticipated that practically all law enforcement officials in the State of Kentucky will attend one of these conferences.
