Morehead State University will conduct the monthly test of its audible alert system on Monday, Dec. 1, beginning at 12:30 p.m.

The system consists of three speakers that use an alert tone as well as voice messages to warn the campus during an emergency.

The high powered amplifiers, located on Ginger and Cartmell halls along with Jayne Stadium, are designed primarily to alert pedestrians on campus sidewalks and streets.

Faculty, staff and students also can be notified by signing up for Eagle Alerts (e2Campus).

Star Theater to host Orion launch watch Thursday

Morehead State University's Star Theater will host a launch watch event as NASA conducts a test launch of the Orion spacecraft, marking the start of mankind's journey to Mars.

According to NASA, Orion is designed to take astronauts farther into space than they've ever been before. The unmanned test flight scheduled for Thursday, Dec. 4, from Cape Canaveral, Florida. The hour and a half hour, two-orbit flight will test the spacecraft's vital safety systems to ensure they will function properly before Orion carries astronauts into space. Orion will one day carry humans to an asteroid, and eventually to Mars, while providing them with emergency abort capabilities and provide them a safer return to Earth. The launch of Orion marks the first deep-space capsule NASA has developed in the last 40 years.

The event at the Star Theater will begin Thursday, Dec. 4, at 6:30 a.m. with a scheduled launch time of 7:05 a.m. MSU will follow the launch until 8:30 a.m.

Bull to be student speaker for Fall Commencement

Melissa Bull of Pearl City, Illinois, will be the student speaker for [Morehead State University's Fall Commencement](#) on Saturday, Dec. 13.

During the ceremony that begins at 10:30 a.m. in the Academic-Athletic Center, MSU President Wayne D. Andrews will confer degrees on more than 600 graduate and undergraduate students.

She is the daughter of Thomas Bull and Molly Lovgren Watson. She is the sister of Evan Bull and granddaughter of Winafred Lovgren.

Bull is a candidate for a bachelor's degree in business management and Spanish.

A graduate of Pearl City High School, she was a member of the track and volleyball teams, National Honor Society, Spanish Club, choir and show choir. She was the conference champion in high jump all four years of her high school career and was named MVP at the Northwest Illini Conference track meet in 2010. Bull qualified for the IHSA State track meet in 2008 for high jump and again in 2010 for high jump, triple jump, long jump and 100M hurdles.

Aside from school activities, Bull participated in competitive power tumbling at Pierce Athletics in Freeport, Illinois, and competitive cheerleading at Elite Tumble and Cheer in Oregon, Illinois. Bull competed as a power tumbler for more than 10 years, finishing her career at the elite level. She also was a nine time national qualifier.

She enrolled at Morehead State University in the fall of 2010, where she earned a spot on MSU's All-Girl Cheerleading squad. She won two national championships (2011 and 2014) at the UCA College Cheerleading Championships. Recently, Bull and her stunt group placed first in Partner Stunt Video Entry and have accepted a bid to the 2015 National Championships. She also was a member of MSU's track team her freshmen year.

Bull worked as a student tutor at the Tutoring and Learning Center where she had more than 715 tutoring appointments to help more than 275 students achieve their own academic success. She also worked at the Holiday Inn Express in Morehead.

Bull maintained a 3.75 grade-point-average while working and participating on the cheerleading team. A member of the Beta Gamma Sigma fraternity, she spent a summer studying abroad in Segovia, Spain.

In April 2014, she was selected to represent the United States on the Team USA All-Girl Cheerleading squad, where she competed and won a world title at the International Cheer Union World Championships.

After graduation, Bull will seek another national championship in January. She will continue to reside in Orlando, Florida, as she has accepted an internship in hospitality at Walt Disney World.

For the commencement exercises, the grand marshal and mace bearer will be Dr. Stacy Baker, professor of music tuba/euphonium, who received the 2014 Distinguished Teacher Award.

Faculty marshals will be Dr. Frances L. Helphinstine, professor of English, and Dr. Dora Ahmadi, chair of the Department of Mathematics, Computer Science and Physics.

Student marshals will be Susan Ahmadi and Delano Sanders, Graduate Programs; Cyra Jones and Erica Eldridge, College of Science and Technology; Michael Hutchinson and Waylan Coffey, College of Business and Public Affairs; Maria Kalla and Aaron Shepherd, College of Education; Kathryn Jackson and Seth Sparks, Caudill College of Arts, Humanities and Social Sciences.

MSU selected as a top school in MAE's 2015 Guide to Colleges and Universities

Military Advanced Education (MAE) has awarded Morehead State University the designation of a Top School in its 2015 MAE Guide to Colleges and Universities, measuring best practices in military and veteran education. The Guide will be released in the December issue of MAE, and available online at www.mae-kmi.com.

“We are pleased to be recognized as the campus community continues to build on MSU’s tradition of providing the help veterans and their families need to transition from soldier to student and ultimately to college graduate,” said Max Ammons, MSU’s director of military initiatives. “A few years ago, MSU opened the [Veterans Resource Center](#), which assists prospective and current military and student veterans by providing counseling and direction on all educational benefits, enrollment and registration assistance, counseling resources and referrals, academic and career assistance, and provides a place for student veterans to study or relax and reconnect with their fellow student veterans.”

The Guide presents results of a questionnaire of the military-supportive policies enacted at more than 600 institutions including private, public, for-profit, not-for-profit, four-year, and two-year colleges. From community colleges to state universities, online universities and nationally known centers of higher learning, MAE’s 2015 Guide to Colleges & Universities arms students with information about institutions that go out of their way to give back to our men and women in uniform.

Now in its eighth year, MAE was the first publication to launch a reference tool of this type. This year, institutes were evaluated on their military culture, financial aid, flexibility, on-campus support and online support services. Each school’s performance rating by category is represented by an easy-to-recognize dashboard. This will enable prospective students to quickly target schools that follow best practices in military education, and then put these in context with other academic or career considerations.

“We believe the Guide serves as an invaluable tool for both education services officers and transition officers when advising servicemembers about their educational opportunities,” said Kelly Fodel, MAE’s

editor. “We used strict criteria to individually evaluate the submissions of respondents, and we had a record number of schools participating this year.”

“Not only is the 2015 Guide printed in our December issue of Military Advanced Education, but also published in a searchable database online,” Fodel said. “We designed this database with the military student in mind. We want to help them make informed choices, so we are giving them access to all the survey questions and answers provided by the schools, as well as explanations about critical issues like activation and deployment policies, withdrawal policies, scholarship and financial aid information and important support information.”

MSU also was previously recognized as a 2015 military/veteran-friendly university by GI Jobs magazine and the Military Times.

ICCAE partnership agreement to be announced

University officials from Morehead State, Kentucky State and Eastern Kentucky will announce a grant and partnership agreement Wednesday, Dec. 3, in Frankfort for the Bluegrass State Intelligence Community Center of Academic Excellence.

The announcement will be held at the Kentucky Office of Homeland Security FUSION Center, Transportation Cabinet Building, 200 Mero Street, in Frankfort.

During the event, speakers from each school including Dr. Wayne D. Andrews, MSU president, and Dr. Raymond Burse, KSU president, will address the project.

"We are really honored to be named a national center of academic excellence," said Dr. Michael W. Hail, assistant dean and professor of government at Morehead State University and a project co-director.

The Bluegrass State Intelligence Studies Consortium was formed to address the urgent need to increase the number of students from Kentucky and nearby states who are aware of and prepared for intelligence community (IC) careers.

The center is innovative, because it targets a population of motivated, but under-prepared students who are potential IC employees. Additionally, this proposal is unique in that it includes a Homeland Security Intelligence Initiative to foster increased interchanges among academic institutions and regionally-based federal, state and local intelligence agencies.

The long term goal of this project is to provide students with the research, scientific, technological, analytical and critical language knowledge, skills and abilities, which when combined with their academic disciplinary backgrounds, will ensure the IC has a diverse, highly-qualified and motivated pool of applicants from Kentucky and nearby states.

The center will have flexibility in continuing support to faculty and student research; student scholarships for study abroad, international exchange and internships; and funding for workshops and other outreach activities. Consortium members also will continue to seek additional outside grant funding targeted toward intelligence studies programs.

Regents hold quarterly meeting

During its regular scheduled quarterly meeting Thursday, Dec. 4, Morehead State University's Board of Regents approved the 2014 fall graduates, approved a tuition rate increase for 2015-16 and heard the final Fall Semester enrollment report.

The Fall Commencement ceremony will be held Saturday, Dec. 13, at 10:30 a.m. in the Academic-Athletic Center. President Wayne D. Andrews will confer degrees on more than 600 graduate and undergraduate students.

The Regents approved the 2015-16 Tuition and Mandatory Fee Schedule based on a 3-percent increase in the rate for resident undergraduates and also complies with all other tuition parameters identified in the Kentucky Council on Postsecondary Education's Tuition Policy for 2014-16. Students taking 12-18 hours will see an increase of \$116 per semester in the fall of 2015.

The 2014 final Fall Enrollment report saw an enrollment of 11,053 (down 2.7 percent from 2013), and administrator tenure for Dr. Steven Ralston, provost and vice president for academic affairs, was approved by the board.

The Board accepted the 2013-14 financial audit report and amended operating budget; the first quarter financial audit report and amended operating budget; ratified personnel actions; heard reports on the health insurance and benefits plan for 2015 and personal service contracts.

Dr. Andrews also presented the Regents with his report.

The next scheduled quarterly meeting will be held Thursday, March 19.

Fetal ultrasounds to be offered

Morehead State University's [Department of Imaging Sciences](#)' Diagnostic Medical Sonography Program will offer free, two-dimensional fetal ultrasounds to expectant mothers, who are between 16 and 28 weeks of pregnancy.

The ultrasound examinations will be given Jan. 14 through Feb. 19 and be performed by appointment only on the fourth floor of the Center for Health, Education and Research, Room 402, in the University's sonography lab.

The scans are performed by senior level students who will be directly supervised by associate professor Marcia Cooper. She is certified in obstetrics and gynecology by the American Registry of Diagnostic Medical Sonographers. The fetal ultrasound scans provide students the experience they need for entering into the sonography workforce.

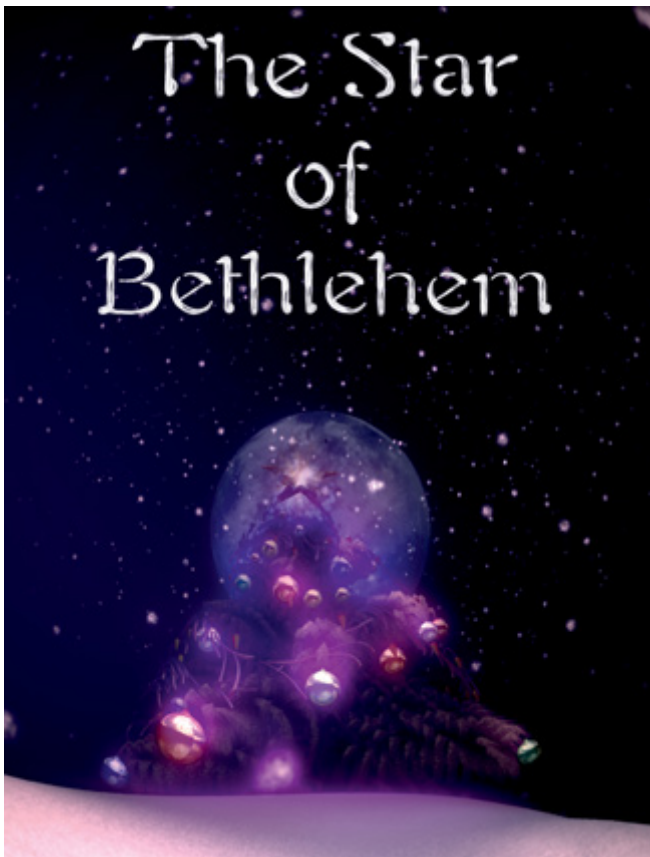
All volunteers will be asked to sign a consent form stating that the scans are "non-diagnostic" and are performed for educational purposes only. Participants are asked to bring a towel.

MSU police offer campus safety tips

With the semester winding down, [Morehead State University's Police Department](#) offers this advice to the campus community: Be aware of your surroundings and take the necessary precautions to avoid loss of your belongings.

"It is not uncommon to see an increase in crime at this time of year," said MSU Police Chief Matt Sparks. "On the campus, everyone is busy with the end of semester activities and fail to adhere to the safety rules that they usually follow."

Purses, wallets, cell phones, iPods and textbooks are among the items that are reported missing most often.

Students, as well as faculty and staff, are urged to take all necessary measures to secure and protect personal belongings in residence halls, offices and vehicles, in addition to office equipment and other vulnerable items.

According to MSUPD, always be on the lookout for suspicious activity.

"We want to remind you to take the extra time to secure items in the trunk or under the seat before leaving your automobile," Chief Sparks said. "The threat of a break-in is reduced if your belongings are not visible. Remember to lock your vehicle before leaving it in the parking area."

University police remind students to also practice safety in the residence halls:

- Make sure your door is locked when leaving your room, even if you are only going next door. It takes less than 10 seconds for a thief to enter an open room and steal property.
- Do not leave messages on phones or computer accounts, indicating how long you will be away or when you expect to return.
- Follow the safety in numbers rule when going out at night and arrange to go with friends/roommates. It is a good practice to scan your surroundings whether walking on campus, traveling by automobile or enjoying a shopping excursion.

- **Do not leave valuables or property (purses, backpacks, books, personal identification, etc.) visible in or around the office or living area.**
- **Keep emergency numbers by the phone. Call 911 to report any suspicious person or activity.**
- **Take the time to be aware of your surroundings and any unusual activity.**

MSUPD also will be conducting traffic checkpoints at various locations throughout the rest of the year.

“The purpose of this exhibit is to entice middle school and high school students to come and see and to learn about space science and STEM (science, technology, engineering and mathematics) disciplines,” said Dr. Wayne D. Andrews, MSU president. “Our Space Science people and the museum people have worked very hard on this beautiful exhibit.”

Designed by Eric Thomas, director of [MSU’s Star Theater](#) and staff member of the [Space Science Program](#), the exhibit will inform visitors about the role satellites play in the field of aerospace feature 1:1 scale models of satellites built and flown by MSU, and highlight the University’s role in preparing students to work in the challenging field of aerospace.

“We are excited to get this exhibit open and excited about the partnership between MSU and the Highlands Museum and Discovery Center,” said Thomas. “A lot of people worked on this project and we couldn’t be happier with the way it turned out.”

Thomas also stated the MSU’s Space Science Program intends this to be a long term relationship with the Highlands Museum and Discovery Center. Through this partnership, the exhibit space will continually be updated and collaborations on workshops, summer camps and guest speaking opportunities will also be forthcoming.

“It started out as a small project and turned into this,” said Dr. Ben Malphrus, the department chair of the Earth and Space Science. “This exhibit is for all ages and we hope that this will excite students into careers in STEM, especially careers in engineering and space.”

The exhibit takes up 840 square feet in the basement of the Highlands Museum and Discovery Center.

According to Dr. Malphrus, aerospace was the No. 1 manufactured export in Kentucky in 2013 – even more than the automobile industry – bringing in \$5.6 billion.

Earlier this year, MSU and Ashland Community and Technical College signed an agreement to establish a transfer program in Space Science. In the 2+2 transfer program, students will complete two years at ACTC before transferring into the Bachelor of Science degree program in Space Science at MSU. The agreement lists the specific ACTC and MSU courses needed for the bachelor's degree, with freshman and sophomore level courses to be completed at ACTC and the junior and senior courses completed at MSU.

The Kentucky Highlands Museum was organized in 1984 as a historical and cultural center for the Ashland area. The Museum was housed in the historical Mayo Mansion until taking up residency in downtown Ashland's Main Street District in the first floor, basement, and mezzanine levels of the former C. H. Parsons Department Store in 1994. In 1997, the museum, following a strategic planning process, changed its name to the Highlands Museum and Discovery Center.

Learn from our failures and triumphs. If you fail, raise the bar higher. If you succeed, still raise the bar. We can raise our bar with our education. Yes, today we graduate, but tomorrow we can still learn. Let's challenge ourselves to raise our own bars," Bull told the crowd.

"I used to be very involved in track, especially in the event high jump. And just like life, the bar continued to rise after every successful merit. At each height, you had three chances to succeed. Everyone is presented with these three chances: early life until high school, college, and life after college. If one of your attempts at the bar was a struggle, then set your bar higher to make the next stage better. If you triumphed through high school and college, then continue to raise your bar and succeed in life. High school and college were great experiences, but we have these two stages and attempts to learn to make the next part of our life unforgettable."

Bull enrolled at Morehead State University in the fall of 2010, where she earned a spot on MSU's All-Girl Cheerleading squad. She won two national championships (2011 and 2014) at the UCA College

Cheerleading Championships. Recently, Bull and her stunt group placed first in Partner Stunt Video Entry and have accepted a bid to the 2015 National Championships. She also was a member of MSU's track team her freshmen year.

Bull worked as a student tutor at the Tutoring and Learning Center where she had more than 715 tutoring appointments to help more than 275 students achieve their own academic success. She also worked at the Holiday Inn Express in Morehead.

Bull maintained a 3.75 grade-point-average while working and participating on the cheerleading team. A member of the Beta Gamma Sigma fraternity, she spent a summer studying abroad in Segovia, Spain.

In April 2014, she was selected to represent the United States on the Team USA All-Girl Cheerleading squad, where she competed and won a world title at the International Cheer Union World Championships.

After graduation, Bull will seek another national championship in January. She will continue to reside in Orlando, Florida, as she has accepted an internship in hospitality at Walt Disney World.

For the commencement exercises, the grand marshal and mace bearer was Dr. Stacy Baker, professor of music tuba/euphonium, who received the 2014 Distinguished Teacher Award.

Faculty marshals were Dr. Frances L. Helphinstine, professor of English, and Dr. Dora Ahmadi, chair of the Department of Mathematics, Computer Science and Physics.

The Association of Technology, Management, and Applied Engineering (ATMAE) Board of Accreditation has voted to reaccredit [Morehead State University's Bachelor of Science in Engineering Technology program](#) with options in Electronics and Telecommunications and Computer Engineering Technology, Design and Manufacturing Engineering Technology, and Construction Management and Civil Engineering Technology for six more years.

The reaccreditation marks the fourth time that ATMAE (formerly NAIT) has accredited MSU's BSET program. When compared to the many other programs seeking either accreditation or reaccreditation, AET programs received the relatively rare award of a full accreditation and reaccreditation.
