St Alban To Be In Service Here

June 22, which falls this year on a Sunday, is Saint Alban's Day. At Saint Alban's Episcopal Church there will be a special celebration of the Holy Communion, with sermon, at 8:30 a. m. Episcopal churches are either dedicated to Christ Himself (the Christ Church, Church of the Redeemer), to some event in church history (Church of the Nativity, Church of the Transfiguration, Church of the Ascension), to some religious doctrine or truth (Trinity Church, Grace Church), or to some Saint (Saint Alban who lived at the beginning of the Fourth century, was the first Christian martyr of England. He was the first in that country, of whom we have record, to lay down his life for the Christian cause. During the persecution of Diocletian, which swept the whole Roman Empire, a Christian priest fled to the house of the soldier, Alban, then a pagan. Alban offered him protection, and was himself converted. When the persecutors arrived, Alban gave himself up in the priest's stead. He thereby "plunged" in true fashion the sword of martyrdom. "Greater love hath no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends.")

**The UPWARD LOOK**  
By Rev. E. H. Kazze

**QUESTION:** What is the Bible word meaning of the word "sanctification"?

**ANSWER:** There certainly is much confusion on this question that to read the Bible on this point and let it be its own interpreter one will find its true meaning. We must remember in seeking truth of this kind not to take one passage of the Scripture and isolate it from all the rest, but each one must be interpreted in the light of the whole teaching.

In both Testaments the same Hebrew and Greek words are translated in their various grammatical forms. The one uniform meaning is, "to set apart for God." In both Testaments the same words are used of things and of persons. When used of things, no moral quality is implied; they are sanctified or made holy because they are set apart for God.

Sanctification when used of persons has a threefold meaning. In POSITION, believers are eternally set apart for God by redemption, "through the offering of the body of Jesus Christ" (Heb. 10:10). Positionally, therefore, believers are "saints" and "holy" from the moment they believe in Jesus as their Savior (Phil. 1:1; Heb. 12:1). When we say "positionally" we mean that God declares them to be saints "through faith" and by means of His justification, though in their experience they may yet have sin. They are declared so by the law of faith.

In EXPERIENCE, the believer is BEING sanctified by the work of the Holy Spirit in the heart, through the Scriptures (John 17:17; 2 Cor. 8:18; Eph. 5:25, 26, 1 Thes. 5:22, 23). This is what we call growth in grace. It continues throughout this life and in this sense believers are given victory over sin, though sin still remains in their mortal bodies.

In CONSUMPTION, the believer's complete sanctification awaits the appearing of the Lord (Eph. 5:27; 1 John 3:2). Purification of the believer's life comes through putting to death the sin within us. Spiritually, believer's lifetimes are given victory over sin, though sin still remains in their mortal bodies.

Does anyone believe that the fall of Britain ends the danger of war for the United States? "Some British leaders thought that Hitler would liberate our son. A few statesmen would settle down, Chamberlain thought that appeasement had guaranteed the world peace, for his time. Let those people who are talking about war-mongering think back a little while. Who attacked Poland? Who intervened in Spain? Who overran Austria and Czechoslovakia? Who gobbled up Denmark? Who invaded Norway? In the light of history the persons who believe Britain's downfall and prosperity would be aided and prospered by need a guardian. They've got no business wandering around loose in this crucial chaotic world.

"Once upon a time women and children were reasonably safe behind fighting lines. Now nothing is safe. Cities can be wiped out in a few hours. In the hands of fanatics and outlaws the machine threatens civilization. Unless we find some way to end war we might as well prepare for a return to barbarism. Does anyone think that the way to end war is to stand by and let Hitler triumph? Does anyone think that the way to lasting peace is to give the dictators time to consolidate their gains and utilize their conquered resources and then prepare for the richest conquest of all—the United States? Some persons argue that no power or combination of powers can conquer the United States. Provided we stay at home and arm ourselves. Have they thought of the fact that with Britain out of the way the dictator nations have resources and productive power greater than our own? The fate of nations on the defensive has not been so good lately. Hitler is likely to continue to win if he chooses both the battleground and the time for battle. If the American people become convinced that the choice is checking Hitler over there or over here I know that their choice will be.

"The combined economic power of the United States and Great Britain is almost twice the power of Germany and Italy and the conquered countries. If we enable England to hold out Hitler might as well prepare himself for defeat. In modern war with its dependence on all sorts of machines and supplies, Great Britain's power is the final test of might. England and the United States together are an unbeatable combination. Without England the balance of power would be the dictator nations and we would face a desperate struggle against very heavy odds.

We all want to have a share in helping to make America strong. We know that the burden of the burden will fall on labor and industry which is turning out planes and guns and ammunition. But the women, the housekeeping women who have no active part in industry want to do something too. Each time the paper comes, each time you turn on the radio and hear more of the things that make you realize it is vital that America become invincible, you think about your part in this great defense effort. Being a woman, one of the things you naturally think of is conserving and saving.
