W. C. Caudill Dies While In Minnesota

Brother Of Local Men Is Brought To Morehead For Burial Sunday

William C. Caudill, brother of C. P. D. C., S. M. D. B. and George Caudill of this city, notice of whose serious illness was received by the family here on Wednesday of last week, died in a hospital at St. Paul, Minnesota on Friday of last week.

Mr. Caudill had been ill only a short time. He and his wife had been on a fishing trip to the lake region in Minnesota, when he was stricken with paralysis. He was hurried to the hospital in St. Paul and the family here was notified. The brothers hurried to St. Paul, but Mr. Caudill died only a short time after their arrival.

Funeral services were held here Sunday afternoon, at the Methodist Church, with Rev. L. Edward Murrill, Rev. B. H. Kiser and Rev. E. A. Landolt in charge. Burial was made in the cemetery at Sharkey, Ky.

Mr. William C. Caudill was the son of Abel and Mary Ann Caudill and was born on July 27, 1941, being at the time of his death 63 years of age. He graduated from the University of Indiana Law College in 1903. Soon after he located at Durant, Oklahoma, at which place he resided until his death.

On July 30, 1927 he married Mary Elizabeth Anderson. He served as Mayor of the City of Durant and took an active part in all civic affairs.

He is survived by his wife, Mary Elizabeth Caudill, Durant, Oklahoma, seven brothers, Sam, George, Dan and Cornelius of Morehead; Joe of West Palm Beach, Florida; and W. C. Caudill, Lima, Penn.; two sisters, Mrs. and Mrs. Hannah Blair of this city. He was preceded in death by Sarah Briggs of Kanakee, Ill., and his parents, William and Sarah and three sisters.

Attendance Laws To Be Enforced Say Authorities

Laws Governing Attendance To Be Rigidly Enforced Say Officials

Every child of school age is required to attend school this year. So says the County Attendance Officer, Mrs. Mabel Alfrey. Those children who are physically or otherwise disabled have to present a doctor's certificate before they can be excused from going to school, and then they will not be entirely released as the program plans to take care of as many children as possible. The Attendance Officer, County Superintendent, and Board of Education as well as the teachers urge that all children have their names on the list and these not able to enroll so their doctor and present a certificate from him to the teacher. The parents are asked not to cooperate with this Attendance Officer.

July Reminders

If bunch grapes are sprayed with Bordeaux mixture every two or three weeks, beginning when the fruit is about the size of a pea and continuing until controlled.

Any of the fruit trees, grapevines or small fruit such as blackberry, Youngberries, raspberries, etc. that do not have dark green leaves should be sprayed liberally with nitrate of soda early this month.

You can make up a delicious spiced tea as follows: 1 gallon of water, 2 tablespoons tea, 2 cups sugar, 4 to 6 lemons, 6 to 12 oranges, 1 pint pineapple juice, 1 stick cinnamon. Steep tea in boiling water; add sugar, fruit juices and spices. Bring

\$5,300,000 Taxes Paid by Railroads in Kentucky in 1940

Railroads operating in Kentucky paid a total of more than \$5,300,000 in taxes to the State, counties, cities and towns last year. Of this amount, at least \$2,645,000 went into School Funds; approximately \$960,000 went to build and maintain county roads and city streets, and the remaining \$1,695,000 went into General Funds.

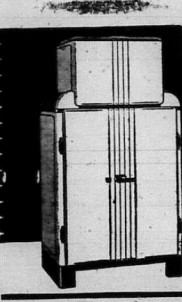

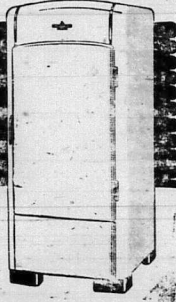
