Election Day passed off quietly in Rowan county, with no disturbance of any sort to mar the quietude of the day. A tranquil day, which saw a much larger number of voters cast in both the Democratic and Republican primaries than was indicated by the activities and apparent interest. The pre-primaries activities of the candidates was unquestionably one of the best in years. Results show that Claude L. Clayton while running a close race in Rowan county, with his opponent Dr. H. L. Nickell carrying the county by the margin of about 300 votes, was swept into the office of Representative of the Rowan-Bath district by an avalanche of votes in Bath county. Clayton's majority in Bath is over 1,000 votes.

Early reports from the first five precincts in Bath indicate a land slide for Clayton in that county. He is leading the county ticket by several hundred votes, a thing that is decidedly unusual in a county election year.

Dan Parker has won the nomination for the office of county Judge over Arthur Hogge, in a neck and neck finish, that had the voters guessing until the day was counted. Judge Hogge took the lead as the vote was counted in number One precinct. Dan Parker forged to the front in Number Two, held it with an increase through Nos. Three and Four, and took the lead. Prechet Five slowed him up and Precinct Six cut him back as Judge Hogge took a nice majority in that precinct. Parker however came back strong in his home precinct at Haldeman. He carried it by 44. Parker's majority in the entire county was 338.

(Continued From Page One) us is used and how grateful our workers are for it. "After a recent raid, W. V. S. distributed hundreds of garments at a rest center. Workers were there for five days and were greatly helped by the generous supply of American clothing and shoes. At another town 42,800 garments were given out by workers who stayed in the depot until all matters are not waiting while the weather is hot, and the Americans are not either. It was proposed to close the rooms during the hot weather but the workers themselves vetoed it. They decided that they were as able to work in the heat as the British. Women and children were to do their duty under the stress of war and the rain of bombs. There is always room, say the committee for more workers, and always garments to be found. This happens to be our war, they say, and it is time for us to recognize it.

There is still much to be done and there is still time to do it. The war and the heat who had suffered had been equipped.

Here in the United States the Volunteer workers are suffering only from the heat of fatigue, not from the heat of fire that have destroyed their homes and burned their clothing, not from the fury of bombs that rain from the heavens.

The Rowan County Chapter is making excellent progress with the sewing in the face of the heat and are planning on keeping the Production Headquarters in the college administration building open all month even though this is the month of vacations. Someone will be in the room each week after noon, cutting out garments, learning them and receiving the finished clothing.
