Bond, can the Bond be regis- tered in the child's name?

Can I pledge a Defense Bond as collateral for a bank for a future educational need?

No, Bonds are registered and non-transferable. They are payable only to the persons whose name is on the Bond.

Note—To buy Defense Bonds and Stamps, go to the nearest Post Office, bank or savings and loan association, or write to the Treasurer of the United States, Washington, D. C. for a mail order form.

Can children buy Defense Bonds or Defense Savings Stamps? Yes. Hundreds of thousands of American children are buying Stamps regularly as their share in the national savings program. Why should children be encouraged to buy Savings Stamps? Because by buying Stamps they write their names on a Roll of Honor of Americans who are contrasted to buy Savings Stamps. "NAVY INTELLIGENCE"

Is it necessary to be a high school graduate in order to enlist in the Navy?

No. Navy enlistment does not require a high school graduate. All applicants will be given an examination containing approximately 100 questions. A grade of 28 per cent or better on this examination is sufficient to pass the Navy educational standards. However, a high school education will be valuable in the ocean during his Navy enlistment.

If I enlist in the Navy or Naval Reserve, will I be sent to a Navy Trade School?

All new recruits are sent through one of the 150 Naval Training Stations and after a training period, they may take examinations for entrance into Navy Trade Schools. Those recruits who pass their examinations with sufficiently high grades can enroll in these schools before assignment to the fleet. While attending these schools, they will receive "seaboard" Navy pay and free subsistence valued at \$15.00.

What is the greatest amount of money I can expect to earn during my first term of enlistment? It is possible to earn as much as \$12 a month by the end of your first term of enlistment, and approximately \$15 per month, including medical and dental care and 100% gratuity.

After I have served my term of enlistment, what benefits do I get from the Government?

Depending on your rate and length of service, you can get a cash bonus of as much as \$200 plus 30 days leave with pay.

What does the term "cash can" mean in the Navy?

"Cash can" is a slang term applied to the depth charge used in combat operations. The average "cash can" is a cylindrical metal can weighing approximately 300 pounds of TNT, and can be dropped from a ship or by airplane at depths ranging from 30 to 100 feet. These are generally carried in a metal sled at 75 feet depth must move away from the explosion area at a speed of 25 knots or more. The "cash can" are either called off the stern or shot from a "gun" which has one right and one left simultaneously.

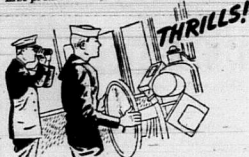
