Dr. Carter vaccinated some hogs at Farmington on Sept. 17.

## Army Aviation Board Here Next Week

Local Young Men Given Opportunity To Become Aviators. Young men of northeastern Kentucky who aspire to become pilots of Uncle Sam's warplanes will have the opportunity to do so brought their door steps when Aviation Cadet Examining Board of the U. S. Army Air Corps visits Morehead and Ashland next week. The Board, headed by Col. Robert L. Rockwell, Air Corps, distinguished World War Ace and veteran of the historic Lafayette Escadrille, will establish headquarters at the Administration building at Morehead State Teachers College on September 18 to 20 inclusive, and follow directly to Ashland on September 22 to 24 inclusive. Liberalized educational requirements put in effect by the Air Corps have placed the opportunity to qualify for Aviation Cadet appointments well within reach of high school graduates, according to Captain Daniel S. Earhart. Prospective applicants may be released for operation that will go directly to the Board either at Morehead or Ashland for full information and particulars relative to any phase of Aviation School Cadet appointments, or if they prefer may submit their applications through any U. S. Army Recruiting Service. Applicants with two or more years of college training are automatically exempt from all educational tests.

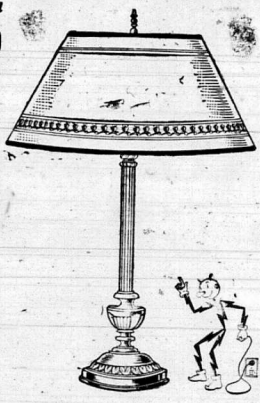



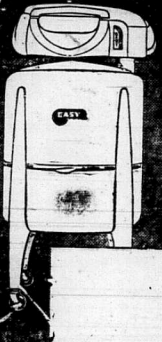
