SAVINGS STAMPS AT STORES

Answering the recent call of Secretary of the Treasury Morgenthau, American retailing has gone all out on a coast-to-coast border-to-border campaign to sell Federal Defense Savings Stamps.

Chain systems and independent retailers are participating. Some idea of the magnitude of the drive is found in the fact that approximately 16,000 non-grocery outlets are now offering the stamps for sale in addition to the thousands of outlets operated by both grocery chains and independent grocers.

The cooperating stores are doing more than simply stock and sell defense stamps. They are actively attempting to popularize and create interest in the stamps through window and store displays, newspaper and radio advertising, and in all other practical ways. No effort will be made to force stamps on patrons, but it will be brought to their attention that the stamps are a mighty sound investment, and that their purchase is one way every individual can help expedite the defense program.

CREDIT REGULATION

When the news broke that the Federal Reserve Board was preparing regulations to control installment credit, buyers rushed in to buy cars, refrigerators and similar goods before new rules would make installment purchasing next to impossible. Now, however, the rules have been issued and it appears that this fear was generally unfounded. All they do is to prevent the issuance of excessive credit and to make legal certain credit practices which industry and financial authorities alike have long considered unsound and dangerous. You'll have to pay a third down when you buy your new car and the maximum period of payment is 18 months. If you want a new refrigerator, ironing stove or so on you must pay 20 percent down and the balance in 18 months. For furnaces and other home items only 15 percent need be paid down and 18 months for the balance.

Some think these rules in the future will be made much more strict in order to conserve essential materials, and to combat price inflation. In the meantime only the buyer who wants easy terms will be affected.

They learn that there are certain things which cannot get out of—and they learn that allies do not count.

But one thing that should be done in all the classes in all the schools in this country is to try to make the children realize what a privilege this freedom of opportunity is to a classroom where education is a clean, wholesome, and wholesome.

and not on race of creed. We have neglected to stress the importance of school days in our haste to make gala days of the holidays. School has its own something to be hurried through. We have neglected to teach the children to appreciate school itself.

The children of today must be taught that democracy and equality and freedom are not empty words to be sung or recited about and then forgotten. Rather that they are eras of calls to tasks which are theirs as surely as they were the tasks of the pioneers, or of the boys in our armed services. The right to freedom must be earned by each generation. The young men of the country are in camp to fit themselves for the defense of their country if war comes. Their brothers and sisters are in school to fit themselves for life under these freedoms. All are soldiers together in an army for America.



Greater aid from the State for the school will help remedy the situation in our own county.
