laws on our Statutes are enforced, that justice, tempered with mercy where justified, is meted out and that the same effort is put forth to throw a protection around the innocent, as to punish the guilty.

Better roads is the most important matter for the consideration of our people. During the past four years the Fiscal Court, by reason of a Federal injunction which has hindered under a great handicap in their effort to improve the roads. This debt has been paid and the handicap removed and there is no reason why the next administration should not make many needed improvements on our roads. If I am elected to this office I shall attend each meeting of the Fiscal Court, and although the County Attorney does not have a vote and has no power over the expenditures for the county it is his duty to counsel and advise the court. I shall exert my utmost effort to the end that all roads in the county shall be put in such condition that they may be traveled over the year through and that the

budgets now down on account of the flood, shall be erected where they will serve the citizens of this county. To this end I shall lend my cooperation in every way to the Rural Highway Department, the W. P. A. and all other organizations that have for their object better roads for the county.

It is the duty of the County Attorney to assist the Commonwealth Attorney in the preparation of all cases for presentation to the Circuit Court. If elected I shall discharge this duty to the best of my ability.

A great many of our citizens are desirous of knowing the position of the various candidates in regard to Union Labor. During my entire life I have never been employed by any corporation in any capacity. Neither do I have any member of my family and consequently I have no entangling alliances. I have seen the benefits derived by many of my friends through collective bargaining in better wages and better working conditions. If I am honored by election to this office I shall try to see that labor is protected in this right and that better working conditions are established and that every protection is thrown around them in their efforts.

Having lived in this county all my life and knowing the citizenship as I do, I submit my name for your consideration, with a promise if elected to so serve you that fair treatment and a square deal shall be accorded to each and every citizen of this county. With biting faith in the citizenship of this county and the Justice of your verdict at the polls on November 4, 1941, I submit my name for your consideration and assure you that I shall appreciate your vote and influence.



We are continuing our discussion this week of good fiction books published recently that emphasize Love and Character. These books are as follows:

"Frost, Frances, Kate Training book, Farrar and Rhinehart Publishing Company, \$2.50.

"A lively and touching novel of New England character in this story of two women whose feud had begun in high school and continued until it was a legend.

Ritter, Ann, "Elizabeth, My Daughter," Mill Publishing Co. \$2.50.

The story of a modern girl daughter of the Governor of a western state, and of the difficulties caused by her own tumultuous and complex nature. It is the second novel by the author of "And Some Had Wine."

Stevenson, D. E., "Rochester's Wife," Farrar and Rhinehart Publishing Co. \$2.00.

A romance of dramatic intensity is this story of a young doctor, assistant to a general practitioner, in the Scottish countryside who falls in love with Rochester's wife.

Lincoln, Joseph C. "Out of the Fog," Appleton-Century Publishing Co. \$2.00.

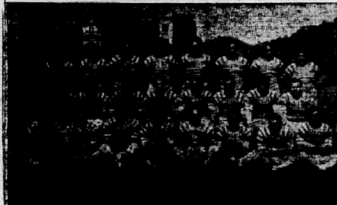
