Workers from all over the county say that prospects for attaining the goal assigned to us looks good and they believe that the county will be up there with Kenton, Clark Bourbon and Campbell counties and the cities of Louisville and Lexington.

## Morehead College To Receive N. Y. A. Scholarship

### College To Receive Scholarship

An allotment of \$2700 has been granted Morehead State Teachers College, to provide National Youth Administration jobs for approximately 42 non-collegiate high school students to continue their education without financial assistance. Robert K. Salvers, State Youth Administration supervisor, today Dr. J. D. Fain, has been selected by the NYA program at the college, to supervise the students to be given jobs and plan the work schedule.

The students will be selected from the library of students being maintained by the college and granted 40 hours of work in the college. The stipend for the students will be \$20 per month graduated after 10 weeks.

Twenty-two other Kentucky colleges have been selected to provide NYA jobs. The total allotment for the state is \$19,000. This will provide NYA jobs for approximately 2000 college students during the 1942-1943 school year.

## The Battle We Dare Not Lose

Each day the experts tell us that the war is not over and that the most important battle of any war is the last that if we lose every battle but that we will still win.

But there is one other battle we dare not lose and that is the battle of ideas.

The greatest weapon of the enemy both without and within is the spreading of false ideas. Sometimes these take the form of "realistic thinking" or showing only the moody and murky side of a condition emphasizing the evil side of a proposition to the fact until only impulses to crush out the evil remain. This is how democratic institutions in other countries were overthrown. Only the weaknesses were played up never the good.

Sometimes it takes the form of "placing the blame." This is the old alpha dog of seeking a scapegoat for government misdeeds. It means utterance to conditions. Human nature being what it is it is a good thing to try to start men thinking along these lines. But it is not their own fault but that of an organized conspiracy against them by an unconscionable group. The Nazis misled peoples and still have led.

Sometimes it takes the form of "sensibility." This deception sun theories for fear.

Sometimes it takes the form of "wishful thinking." For granted the light is lost and that nothing can be done. Therefore it is sensible to agree with the concealing enemy and see how much profit can be made from the days of Aesop on the fate of those who agreed with the tiger has been plain—but our "sensible" thinkers are always sure they can avoid being swallowed.

Sometimes it takes the form of "wishful thinking." It is not our job to fight nothing will happen to us. No one has dropped bombs on us so no one will. If we just stay at home and do not annoy anyone everything will be all right. Of course this

## UPWARD LOOK

While I write these words a "Book of the Month" is being produced in the radio. It is showing from God's Word that the land of Canaan, to which Israel was traveling under Moses, does not represent Heaven. In fact, it represents the vicious life of the Christian in the world. He says, "What there is a place in the life of a Christian where he is not a 'Book of the Month' man." And I agree with him one hundred percent as to his interpretation of Canaan. We have seen that there are many the old song "On Jordan's stormy banks I stand."

And a wistful eye,  
To see the fair and happy land,  
Where my possessions lie,  
Of course this song convinces Heaven as our final resting place. But that is not the mean- ing of Canaan. Israel was delivered from Egypt—through the miracle of God, under the leadership of Moses (a type of Christ).

When they came to Rades-Burne, they sent out spies into Canaan. Ten of them came back with the report that the land was good, but that Israel could not take it. They said it was protected by walled cities and that there were giants in the land. Caleb and Joshua, the other two spies, said the same thing except that they said Israel could possess the land on the God's hand. The people refused to believe and God led them wander in the wilderness for forty years, until all those who left Egypt except Caleb and Joshua died. Then Joshua and Caleb led the new generation across Jordan and began to possess the land.

There are definite reasons why Canaan does not represent Heaven. One is it is inhabited by giants and must be taken. This truly represents the Christian life. There is victory for God's child and he can, through the Christ, take the walled cities of blessing that are for him. He will gain victory over sin and over trial and anxiety and worry and come to peace. This victory can be realized in this life.

The brother who was speaking called this step "satisfaction." It is an experience which will soon present a program to I differ with him there. I believe it is the place in our lives where we gain victory over sin, the products and our enemies, but not a place where we rid ourselves of sin.

Sin will always be in this flesh until death. But whether it shall reign over us, or whether it is the question of sinless or one must be perfect, holy and true as God. That cannot be until this flesh is purified through death and resurrection. But we can know the power that makes us victors over the flesh, and that place in our lives is what we call "surrender." It is then that Christ takes up the battle for us and gives us the desire of our hearts, because we want His will done.
