Heretofore men were examined by the local physician and then the induction station could reject them for some physical defect that the local physician could not determine by supposed to give. Now all men the limited examination he was sent to the induction station under the new plan are sure when they quit their jobs and leave home that they are going to be accepted in the armed forces.

The Local Board received a call for December 1 for men but this call has been cancelled on accounts of not being able to perform the examinations in time for the call. However, the local board will call men for examination in Lexington in the near future and it is important that every man be on time for that call and failure to answer the call for physical examination is a violation of the Selective Service

Regulations and is punishable by both fine and imprisonment. The Board does not believe another call will be received until after the Christmas holidays but they expect the next January call to be a big one. The office of the Local Board will be open during the holidays and any one wishing to consult with the members of the Board relative to their status, is welcome to come to the office at any time. Thirty men have already been notified to report to Lexington on December 10 for physical examination. The rules stated above apply in all cases.
