FFA Sponsors Defense Training Plan

The out-of-school defense training program is intended to create a reservoir of youth with preliminary training who may go into national defense industrial employment as the occasion demands, or who may be further qualified to serve actively in the armed forces. These courses may also function as devices for selection and guidance of individuals into advanced or specific training courses.

Many boys have taken advantage of these courses, and as soon as they finished the course have had jobs waiting for them. Some of these boys are making as much as \$200 a month, that took these courses last year.

There are four different courses in which you may receive training. They are tractor, truck and auto-mechanics, metal, work, wood work and elementary electricity.

Book Gossip By Cain

Recent Non-Fiction Books.
Today we are going to discuss a few of the new non-fiction books that have been published within the last few months. They are as follows:
1. Arnold, Major General H. H. "Winged Warfare." Harper and Brothers Publishing Co. \$3.00.

Every young man who is interested in any one of the many branches of aviation as a career, should read "Winged Warfare" which tells the whole vastly important story of the airplane as a weapon of war. The authors discuss the fighting plane, its arms, its bombs, its cameras, its engines, its instruments—all the accessories that give it precision in destruction, the power to project all frontiers. Every phase of aerial warfare is considered.

There is even a chapter of aerial aviation devoted to experimental aviation development and research, and another on aircraft present problems in building twenty to fifty thousand airplanes. Finally the authors describe exactly what our nation should have by way of adequate air defense.

2. Croy, Homer: "Mr. Meeks Marches On." Harper and Brothers Publishing Co. \$2.50

Wilberforce Meek was a quiet little man with a wife, a daughter and a prosperous shoe store. He'd paid his taxes promptly but with growing irritation. 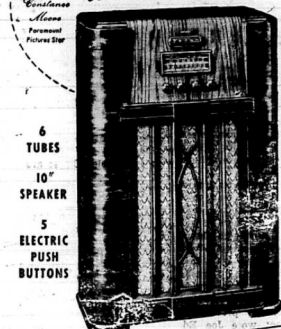

6+ MILLION IN TAXES

They pay their way

KENTUCKY'S trucking industry paid more to the State (1940-41 fiscal year) than the State Highway Department expended for new road construction—\$6,296,048, as compared to \$6,072,167.38. About 87% of Kentucky's freight is transported by truck, but the trucking industry pays almost 1% of the State's total tax income (1940-41 fiscal year)—\$6,296,048, as compared with \$49,294,095.

Trucks paid more than one-third of the entire expense of the Kentucky Highway Department in 1940-41—\$6,296,048, as compared to \$18,151,587.

The Truck tax figures do not include the Federal gasoline tax of 1 1/2¢ per gallon—installing for Kentucky trucks \$7,050,350. This returns to the State for road building purposes. Nor do the foregoing figures include sales taxes on new trucks, registration fees, nor real estate, tangible personal property, franchise, income tax, and other contributions by the trucking industry and its personnel to the State Government.
