High Price Paid William Estep Tobacco Crop

William Estep, of the Pine Grove neighborhood, sold 675 pounds of tobacco from one-half acre of land. Part of it was damaged in curing and approximately 300 pounds had to be discarded because of houseburn. The 675 pounds brought \$2,890 per hundred. This tobacco was a splendid crop of White Pepper variety tobacco, and would have been a great return yield but for the curing damage. This crop was grown on land limed and phosphated. It was raised on the farm of Estep and Korean soil in 1937, and 1938. It was in tobacco in 1940 followed by a cover crop of Vetch and Rye, which was turned under as a green manure crop. This green manure crop was turned under and a heavy application of barnyard manure was made and disked into the soil. The soil was then rebroke as deeply as possible and prepared for tobacco. The land was also treated with phosphate and tobacco and tobacco fertilizer in the row in liberal quantities.

Carless Harris Gets High Price For Tobacco Crop

Carless Harris of the Sharkey neighborhood grew 1065 pounds of No. 1 White Burley tobacco on 6 acres. This is about 1770 pounds per acre. Mr. Harris received \$3490 per hundred, or \$381.70 for his crop. This was the highest price ever received by a Rowan County farmer this year. Mr. Harris grew his tobacco on land that was limed in 1939 and had been in Korean and grass sod for two years. It had also been treated with 47 percent phosphate at the rate of 225 pounds per acre and 100 percent super phosphate at the rate of 500 pounds per acre. This is a higher application of a tobacco fertilizer in the row. This method of soil management is giving good results in every section of the County.

Defense Bond Sales Jump With War

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Sales of Defense Savings Bonds for November amounted to \$23,487,000, it was announced today (Dec. 5) by the Treasury Department. The November figure carried total Defense Bond Sales past the two billion dollar mark, and revealed that \$2,008,611,000 worth of Bonds have been purchased by the American people since the Pacific and Atlantic first year. Total sales had passed the one billion dollar mark during July. November sales were divided as follows: Series E Bonds, \$109,475,000; Series F, 18,978,000, and Series G, \$105,633,000. Total cash deposits at the Treasury for all three series of Bonds by month: May, \$49,838,000; June, \$31,827,000; July, \$60,920,000; \$23,237,000; October, \$20,713,000; November, \$23,387,000.

She has taught in many of our large colleges and universities, but she said, "I am happier in Morehead than I have been anywhere else." She has found Morehead a friendly place to live and has bought property on Second street, where she has just completed her new house. Dr. Bach came to America at first to study, and planned that she would some day go back to her native Switzerland, but in 1921 she decided to take the necessary steps to become an American citizen. Switzerland is a little democracy, and is one of the few neutral countries in the world today. Dr. Bach says she loves the Red Cross flag because it reminds her of her native Switzerland. The Red Cross was organized in Geneva, and the flag of Switzerland is flag with the colors reversed. She is opposed to Hitler regime. She feels confident that it will be defeated. The message follows: "The Army Department deeply regrets to inform you that your son, Willie Irvin Hamm, was wounded in action in the performance of his duty and in the service of his country. The Department appreciates your great interest and very kindly asks you to further information promptly when relieved.
