Registration Of Men 20-45 On Monday

Monday, February 16 is the day set for the registration of all men between the ages of 20 and 45 years for service in the United States Army. There has been some little misunderstanding as to just how old or how young a man has to be to register. The regulations say that any one born between February 17, 1897 and December 31, 1921 who have not already registered, are required to register on Monday. In other words if you are 20 years old on or before December 31, 1941 you must register. If you became 20 years old SINCE December 31, 1941 you are not required to register.

THE DUTY OF CIVILIANS

No longer is war for the military alone. With the annihilation of time and space, we have foreshortened the world, and the front line trenches are just as close to us in our cities and villages as they were in the front line trenches. This puts us all in the war—for civilian defense is as much an arm of our fighting forces as the army, navy or air corps.

Civilian defense does not signify that you have any right to protection it means work for you and me and each and every one of us, no matter where we live, and that our station in life, at that time, is our duty.

It really isn't anything new to us. Every frontier settlement knew what civilian defense was about. When the alarm was sounded the settlers trooped into the blockhouse, each of them had a task to do, from the men to their muskets at the loopholes, to the women, reloading the rifles and mounding the bullets, to the small boys carrying water and putting out fires, and to the girls looking after the younger children.

Civilian defense is self-preservation pure and simple. The armed forces must be free to think only of the enemy. Civilians must be trained to look after themselves and not be spectators. They must not divert either supplies, time or energy from the main track of winning the war.

There are simple rules to follow. First, coordinate your own household for defense. Be sure you have followed all your local fire department's suggestions for fire precautions and that you know duties until they return.

You are permitted to register at any registration place in the county that is most convenient for you. You do not necessarily have to go to the place to register where you vote. The important thing is to register some place in the county.

Men who register will be required to answer 10 simple questions contained on a four by six filling card. 1. Name. 2. Place of residence. 3. Mailing address. 4. Telephone. 5. Age in years. 6. Place of birth. 7. Occupation. 8. Name and address of person who will always know your address. 9. Employer's name and address. 10. Place of employment or business.

After a registrant has answered the questions and signed his name to his registration card, he will be given a registration certificate signed by the registrar. He must have his certificate in his personal possession at all times, as under the Selective Service Regulations failure to possess the certificate or to show it to authorized persons, constitutes a violation of the Regulations and is to be considered prima facie evidence of failure to register.

Registration should not take longer than five minutes for each individual although in some cases it may take longer. It is essential that registration be conducted as rapidly as possible however, registrants must allow ample time to each registrant so that every question on the registration card can be answered properly and a description of the registrant is thoroughly completed on the back of the registration card.

presented in earlier days by proper nutrition in the home. It will be the duty of the home demonstration agent to work with the women not only on the farms but in the cities to assist them in planning wholesome diets that will lead to the building of strong bodies; to show how canning, preserving, and storage of food can be done economically and without losing any of the food value.

Many Western Kentucky counties have long had a home demonstration agent. While this county was one of the first in this section to employ a county agricultural agent it has been one of the last counties to employ a home demonstration agent. These workers will also assist in handling 4-H club work and the Home Makers clubs among the adults. The citizens and taxpayers will soon be called on to decide whether to employ such an agent or not. The expenses need not be great as the agent would use the same office as the agricultural agent and the salary largely paid by the state. It is very much worth investigating for yourselves.

from 1729 in 1941 to 4200 next year, an increase of 40 percent which is 30 percent larger than the county goal.

Beef cattle marketings will be increased from 1783 in 1941 to 1966 in 1942, according to the farmers, this being an increase of 11 percent, or 9 percent more than the county goal. Egg production of the county will be increased from 181,573 dozens to 275,300 dozens in 1942, an increase of 51 percent compared with the goal set up with the county.

The total acreage in farm gardens for 1942 is expected to remain about the same but extensive improvements in cultivation and use of garden acreage is planned. Farm wives in the county have already made increases in the canning of food for home use. The increase for 1941 over 1940 was 20 percent, reported to County Agent Kermit C. Mills.

Of the 1200 farms in the entire county all but 83 were contacted by AAA-commitmentmen, making the survey. The 83 not contacted live outside the county. Of the 1117 whom the commitmentmen interviewed 1050 indicated that they would make commodities needed. Mr. Turner urged that every farmer in increases in one or more of the county begin now to carry out the program. He has outlined for 1942 "Every day's delay is a loss to Defense that cannot be replaced," he said. say to apply for new tires should use the following procedure:

Get an application form from your local board. Take it to one of the board's inspectors and obtain a statement that the tire or tube to be replaced cannot be repaired, recapped, retreaded or otherwise made use-

able. Present to the rationing board the inspector's statement and explain the purpose for which the tire or tube is to be used. (Farmers are eligible to apply for tires or tubes for farm tractors or other farm implements for which they are essential or for trucks which they use to haul food to market. Tires or tubes MAY NOT be obtained for trucks which transport such products to the consumer, such as truck gardeners who sell from house to house. They must be mounted immediately.)

If the applicant is eligible to buy new tires under the require-

ments of the tire rationing board, the board will issue a certificate granting permission to buy the tires from any dealer provided the board's month-

ly quota of such certificates has not been exhausted. Americans All I hope you won't feel bad about my playing cards. TAKE IT OR LEAVE IT!

THE chief counsel for the Tennessee Valley Authority told the Kentucky Legislature at a hearing on the electric power bill (Ward Bill 146) on February 3, that T.V.A. would not come into Kentucky unless it could come on its own terms. In a report on this hearing, the Lexington Herald declared that the T.V.A. chief counsel "delivered a virtual ultimatum similar to that which he had given to the Legislative Council."

WHAT IS THIS T.V.A. "ULTIMATUM"?

- 1. It demands special privilege legislation giving the T.V.A. unfair advantage over electric power companies and cities which operate their own electric plants.
2. It threatens tax losses to the cities, counties, state and federal governments which would have to be added to the tax burdens of individual citizens.
3. It denies to the people of Kentucky their inherent state's right to regulate and control the operations and rates of the utilities that serve them.
4. Its promised benefits are heavily offset by the dangers and disadvantages of outside control.

5. It threatens to cripple the developing rural electrification program by giving T.V.A. power systems unfair advantages over the various county R.E.A. co-operative associations.

Kentucky citizens will want to think a long time before they surrender their right to govern themselves and their affairs in every particular.

If Abraham Lincoln were living in his native state today, he might well be warning his fellow citizens—"GOVERNMENT OF KENTUCKIANS, FOR KENTUCKIANS, BY KENTUCKIANS."

Isn't this question broader than the sale of power alone?

It is an issue that vitally affects every taxpayer . . . everyone who works in a mercantile business . . . every doctor and dentist . . . every farmer . . . every freeborn American who likes to call his soul his own.
