# Your Duty Lies On On The Home Front

The United States must fight on two fronts. First, there is the military front. American soldiers, sailors and airmen are fighting and dying in the Pacific. They are living up to the highest traditions of this nation's military history. They must be given the finest, best equipment the world, and they must be given it in lavish quantities. All the resources of this nation, human and material alike, must be used to that end.

Second, there is the home front. We have said, time and again, that we are fighting to defend and perpetuate freedom. That is true. But the defense of freedom at home, as on the war front, demands more than straight thinking from all. It demands a people who will look squarely at the facts, no matter how unpleasant they may be. It demands a kind of national toughness that knows precisely what we are fighting for, and that will permit nothing to be in the way of victory on the home front less than the military front.

We will, of necessity, demand and accept a large measure of economy during the war. Whether that dictatorship ends when the war ends will depend upon the resolution and the understanding of the American people. The future of this country and the kind of government is in the balance. The people will decide which way they really desire when they know that the indulgence of those appetites and desires may result in defeat for our forces, and we will certainly meet the death of some American boy. It is an indication that those people are not government slaves, and therefore must be governed.

# 684 Register In Rowan Monday

Allison, field supervisor for the St. Louis Emergency Crop and Feed Loan office, all farmers are being urged to cooperate with the farm defense program sponsored by the United States Department of Agriculture by the planting and cultivating of crops, both for sale and for use. The Emergency Crop and Feed Loan office of St. Louis, in cooperation with this program, is preparing to finance all eligible farmers. Applicants will, of course be required to plant home gardens to produce sufficient food for their workstock and subsistence animals and to comply with the soil conservation program.

## Fire From The Air

In a recent address, T. Alfred Fleming, director of conservation of the National Board of Fire Underwriters, declared that American industry must be prepared to guard its production of war materials from the air—including fire from the air. The best defense lies in the use of a complete protective device and the employment of competent watchmen. All employees should be prepared to deal with fires started by incendiary bombs.

Now that we have gone to war the chance of American coastal cities being attacked is an ominous possibility. No city is matter how far from the oceans it is situated can consider itself safe from the danger of saturation. Fire and explosion are among the saboteur's foremost weapons, and only 24-hour guard against them.

We sit back complacently and say "It can't happen here." But people of many nations of Europe said that too and where are they today? One bomber giving 200 miles an hour at 5,000 feet shooting a stick of 10 or 15 incendiaries per second can strafe its load and start a fire every 30 yards for a distance of over 3 miles in three minutes. England learned the lesson that every able bodied citizen must be both conscious and able to handle them intelligently.

This is not a pretty picture. But it shows precisely the kind of danger that America must condition itself to accept. Total war means war on industries and civilians no less than war on armies and navies. The weapon

The following statement in printed form has been placed in the hands of each senator and representative in Frankfort.

**DON'T BE RUSHED!**

**Why Pass Any T V A Bill Now?**

With the present and increasing demands for Electric Power in Tennessee and the adjoining areas, occasioned by war production, it is not expected that there will be any power available from T V A to the municipalities of Kentucky until after 1944.

Then why pass a bill at this session to meet a condition that will exist some years hence, when not a single city or person in Kentucky will be damaged if you don't? On the contrary, the passage of this T V A substitute bill at this time will definitely:

1. Stop the construction of a \$4,000,000 taxable generating plant and transmission program.
2. Cripple and obstruct the efforts of our Company in its war production program, rendering it as ineffective as a wounded soldier who has been dropped on the field of battle by the bullets of an enemy.
3. Close in our face the doors of all sources of new money necessary to carry out the improvements and enlargements of our system. (Since this T V A bill came before the Legislative Council and this Legislature, the market value of our preferred stock alone, owned by people living in Kentucky, has shrunk substantially more than \$2,000,000.)

4. Deny our Company the opportunity to determine if, during the intervening period, it can continue to pay approximately 25c out of every dollar that it takes in for taxes and still reduce its rates to approach the levels of T V A.

5. Destroy the morale of over 1,100 employes of our Company in Kentucky, whose maximum efforts and production are as vitally needed today as are those men actually fighting in the front lines of battle. As a matter of fact, many of these men have shed blood on the battlefield in the defense of our country.

It is a significant and exceedingly important fact that, so far as we know, only two newspapers in Kentucky have indicated that they favor the passage of this T V A bill. If it could be determined at this time, a large majority of the users of electric service would also oppose its passage now.

Some of the items that are deductible from gross income for purposes of this article. Lack of space prevents a full explanation of the various deductions. If in doubt on any item consult the nearest collector of internal revenue. In the taxable year 1941 as deductibility agent.

Typical business expenses of a mercantile establishment are the amounts paid for advertising, hire of clerks and other employees, rent, light, heat, water, stationary, stamps, telephone property insurance and delivery expenses.

A professional man may deduct all necessary expenses incurred in the pursuit of his profession.

A loss arising from "fires, storms, shipwrecks or other casualty" need not be connected with the taxpayer's business. If his home or his automobile is destroyed by fire he may claim a deduction for the loss sustained unless compensated for by insurance or otherwise. Loss of property by theft is an allowable deduction.

In general, taxes are deductible only by the person upon whom they are imposed. Certain taxes assessed against local beneficiaries or to articles, or speeches, and the Federal income tax. The Federal tax of 10 percent on the retail sale of jewelry, furs and toilet preparations is not deductible by the purchaser. Other taxes not deductible are those imposed on employees by the State and gift taxes and state inheritance taxes. The Federal estate tax is deductible by the person who begins to tell him anything.

Analyze what you read and hear, and study with an open mind, ready to admit a automobile, gasoline, cigarettes and liquor are imposed upon the manufacturer, producer, or importer and as not deductible by the purchaser or consumer.

A free press calls for charitable contributions and gifts made by an individual are deductible within certain limits if actually paid within the year. The organization to which the gift is made for a corporation, trust, community chest fund or foundation must be created in or organized under the law of the United States or territory or of the District of Columbia and must be organized and operated exclusively for religious, charitable, scientific, literary or educational purposes, or for the prevention of cruelty to children or animals. Gifts to an individual are not deductible.
