### Morehead Is Approved For Navy V-1 Plan

In order to secure an adequate supply of officer material for the expanding navy, the authorities have arranged for a special course of college training for young men between the ages of 17 and 20. Briefly stated, young men who wish to sell themselves of this opportunity enlist in the navy and are assigned to the V-1 training program. They then enter college at their own expense and pay for years of college work. During the latter half of the second year an examination is given and on the basis of these results the college students are selected for the navy's V-5 (Aviation Cadets) and also the V-3 program (Reserve Midshipmen). 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### Families Will Register For Sugar May 4

Through a slight misunderstanding of the rules and regulations that will govern all sugar rationing, the News in its previous article, and MUST be may have left the public under the wrong impression. ### Care For Eggs And Chickens Is Outlined

The demand for fresh eggs will be good throughout the coming summer. Flock owners should therefore keep laying hens at least two months longer than usual and maintain high average production by continuing the feeding of a good laying mash; by keeping the flock supplied with clean, fresh water at all times; and by using lime and mites and killing all hens that have quit laying.

Too many farm flock owners do not know how to cull for production but all can and they should learn. E. D. Blair, agent No. 230 is supplied without cost by your County Agent or the Kentucky Agricultural Experiment station. Save valuable feed and increase egg profits by keeping only laying hens. ### Civilian Signal Corps Wants Men Between 16 And 50 Years

Some of the best of recent opportunities, according to Harry H. Sewers, manager of the United States Employment Service at Ashland, are the mechanic learners (radio) positions. Applicants between the ages of 16 to 50 in the civilian signal corps. Applicants are employed—as students—at \$85 a month in a preliminary training course which last approximately three months. They are instructed eight hours per day in the fundamentals of electricity, overhaul, repair and inspection of signal line equipment. The first preliminary classes will be held in the following Kentucky cities, Ashland, Covington, Harlan, Lexington, Louisville, Owensboro, Paducah, Paintsville and Somerset.

## Unemployment Employees Ask Longer Hours

The Kentucky Unemployment Compensation Commission has under consideration today a request by its more than 250 employees for an extension of working hours, with out pay, during the present national emergency. The petition presented by the employees that they be permitted to work 44 hours each week as compared with the present 39 hours work schedule. In presenting the petition, an employee spokesman declared that over one third of the male employees of the commission had either already gone to military service or were scheduled for induction within the next few months. "Those of us who have gone already or are going into service will not be fighting over or on a 40 hour week basis, and the employees who are not ex-

pected to be called feel that it's going to take a lot more than a 40 hour week effort back home to win the war. One extra hour a day for each employee is not much to contribute, individually, but collectively it adds up to approximately 6000 hours a month. That is equal to the services of 30 full time employees. We have talked it over among ourselves and this feeling almost without exception represents the individual viewpoint of each one of us."

Leslie, Doris: "Royal William." Macmillan Publishing Co., \$2.50. A witty and most readable novel based upon the life of William IV of England, the sailor king who had a tragic romance with an actress who lived on Drury Lane. The book is by the author of "Full Flavour" and other novels.

Niles, Blair: "East By Day." Farrar and Rinehart Publishing Company, \$2.50. Romance and stirring adventures in America one hundred years ago are the high spots of this very interesting novel. The authentic scenes shift to Virginia from New England and even end to the struggling new Republic of Liberia.

Thamson, Jr. and John W. "Lone Star Preacher." Scribner Publishing Co., \$2.75. A red headed figure in Texas preacher in the Civil War is the hero of this novel illustrated by the author.

Sadler, Michael: "Fanny by Gaslight." Appleton Century Publishing Co., \$2.50. A new and lusty side to reputation started by a red headed figure in London, with its taverns, proscriptions, men about town and clogs on the spree.

Are you relying on others to protect you and are you dodging your civilian defense job because it is hard work? Are you skipping on full time, and not giving overtime? If you are you are serving the Axis.

Do you stand on your rights and demand preferential treatment for yourself or your community or group? Do you refuse to do your part in this war until you are paid to do it? Do you think only of yourself and your narrow circle of life instead of the nation as a whole? Do you demand the privileges of democracy and ignore its responsibilities? If you do, you are serving the Axis.

Do you discriminate against your fellow Americans? Are you a disseminator of the poison of hatred with which Hitler is trying to gass this country into confusion? Do you generalize about racial and religious groups—passing on as gospel truth the lies handed out by Herr Goebbels and his emissaries—forgetting they are not groups but individuals, neighbors with whom you have lived and grown up, who have suffered with you, sacrificed with you and rejoiced with you? Do you fan class hatreds with stories of greed for money and for power, suspecting both industry and labor of treason, for getting that they know they have just as much to lose in this war as you have? If you do you are serving the Axis.

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Now is not the time for a divided allegiance! This is our war—the war of all of us. This is the UNITED STATES or America! We are Americans all. Do not serve the Axis.
