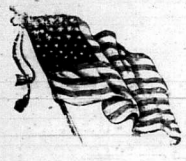

## Hemp Farmers Should Thin Plants Now

Thirty six Rowan county farmers have made plans and signed contracts with the Commodity Credit Association to grow 116 acres of hemp to promote our War effort. Most of this hemp is planted, so the next job is to thin it. In planting hemp for seed, production it is the general practice to drop 12 to 15 seeds in each hill, because heavy seedling greatly increases the chance of getting a good stand if moisture conditions happen to be unfavorable or the seed of poor quality. Usually, of course, most of the seeds produce plants, and since only a few plants should be grown in each hill, thinning is necessary. Thinning hemp is best done when the plants are just large enough to get hold of with the fingers, say about 4 to 6 inches tall. If delayed much longer, the roots become matted and it is difficult to pull out individual plants without injuring the ones. Just as in thinning of corn, the work is best done when the ground is fairly moist. If for any reason the job has been delayed until the plant is a foot high, it is best to wait for a rain before trying to thin or to cut the plants in instead of pulling them.

CORN AND BEAN GARDENING

Despite the first plantings of these two running behind schedule because of the spotty season, the system of making the best use of the available supply should be planned for.

Sweet Corn - From now on, only the really sweet sorts should be used. Of these the list may seem so large as to confuse the gardener.

left, branches will form only near the top and seed yield will be low. If the hills are too close, say 1 1/2 feet apart, each way it is best to leave two plants per hill on rich bottom land, and not more than three in upland. With hills spaced 4 to 4 1/2 feet apart, leave three plants per hill on very productive bottom land, and four on upland.

public enemies. He was an eye-witness to the massacre of Nanking in 1927, and the machine gunning of a large number of women and children, wounded by Japanese bayonets, crawling on their hands and knees under the barbed wire to the safety of Shanghai's International settlement to receive Emile Cecil and other American police and missionaries.

He achieved his definite unpopularity with the Japanese by his work, antagonistic to Nippon, done during his four years as news commentator for a Shanghai radio station. He said much that displeased the Japanese and nothing that found favor with them. He still carries a scar from the first attempt on his life which cost the life of a rickshaw coolie, who was killed with the effect of a bomb thrown with Alcott as his target.

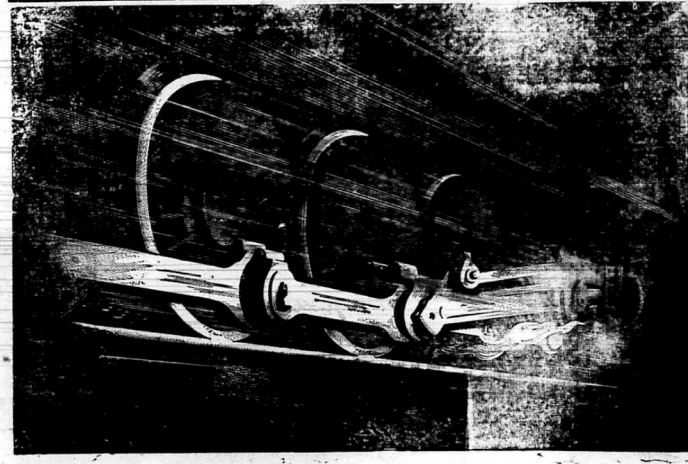
