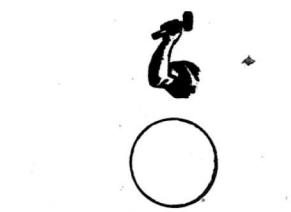

**New Stove Dealers
Delinquent In
Registering**

In a statement by the Louisville District OPA it was disclosed that many retail dealers in new stoves have not yet complied with the regulations in that they have failed to properly register their firm at their own War Price and Rationing Board.

According to the regulations, a dealer in new stoves was to have registered on September 1, 2, or 3, with his Board, and required to show his inventory as of September 1, indicating the type and number of pieces of equipment he had on hand. The store is also required to report the type and number of stoves sold during the calendar year of 1941 or 1942, whichever was the greater. Any dealer who has sold a new stove since September 1, even though the transfer has been made on a bona fide rationing certificate, has been in violation if he has not registered in accordance with the

above.

ROUGH WOOD: Diameter at least 4 inches at small end under bark. Other requirements same as for peeled wood.
