MOREHEAD, Ky.---It had not happened since 2004 but the 138 members of the 2010 Kentucky General Assembly went home Thursday without completing their only constitutional duty -- enactment of a state budget for the next two fiscal years starting July 1.

The Senate adjourned about 6 p.m. and the House followed just before 7:30 p.m. on the 60th and final day of the 2010 regular session. Later, Gov. Steve Beshear described the session as an "abject failure" and said the citizens of Kentucky were "disgusted" by the turn of events. House Democrats led by Speaker Greg Stumbo, D-Prestonsburg, and Senate Republicans led by Sen. David Williams, R-Burkesville, blamed each other for the collapse of budget negotiations which began three weeks ago. Both sides accused the other of playing politics with the budget because of this year's elections in which all 100 House seats and 19 of the 38 Senate seats will be on the ballot.

Beshear, who had pleaded with legislators to work out their differences on a state spending plan, now is faced with the constitutional responsibility of calling a special legislative session to develop a budget before the end of the fiscal year on June 30. If that does not occur, the governor will be forced to shut down most of state government at midnight on June 30, except for public safety operations. Beshear has indicated he will issue that call in May. Morehead State University President Wayne D. Andrews said he is disappointed by the lack of a budget but remains hopeful that the impasse can be resolved in the special session. Draft budgets adopted by both the House and Senate included cuts in state appropriations for public colleges and universities as the lawmakers wrestled with a projected revenue shortfall exceeding \$1.2 billion.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University's Kentucky Folk Art Center will host "A Day in the Country 2010" on Saturday, June 5. The folk art fair will be held at the Morehead Conference Center on First Street in Morehead from 9 a.m. until 4 p.m.

A reception for artists and visitors will be held on Friday, June 4, from 5-7 p.m. at KFAC.

The event will bring together more than 50 self-taught artists from more than 10 states to display and offer their work for sale. Visitors can expect to find wood carvings, stone carvings, paintings and more.

"A Day in the Country continues to draw new artists as participants and new collectors from across the nation," said Adrian Swain, KFAC curator. "We're committed to making the show as diverse and exciting as possible. While artists from East Kentucky are the backbone of the event, it's interesting to include the work of people from other regions and cultural backgrounds. It makes for a dynamic mix of talent and personalities."

The featured exhibition during the event is "Red River: The Narrative Works of Edgar Tolson, Carl McKenzie, Earnest Patton, and Donny Tolson." Guest-curated by Larry Hackley, the exhibition features at least 10 major works by each of these artists, for a total of 46 works in all. The focus is on their narrative work, so most of the carvings are complex, multi-figure scenes, including six Garden of Eden pieces by Edgar Tolson. The exhibition will be on display through July 3 and will then be shown at other venues in the region.

"We're very excited about this year's event," said Matt Collinsworth, KFAC director. "A Day in the Country drew visitors from more than 20 states last year. Minnie Adkins had a vision when she began this event in her yard in Isonville. We hope that we've done right by her in growing it and promoting it. The event is gaining in prominence nationally, and it's simply a unique opportunity, especially when paired with the great music offered at the Clack Mountain Festival."

MOREHEAD, Ky.---AmeriCorps members and volunteers across Kentucky will build 500 beds during a 24-hour bed-blitz on May 8.

The Kentucky Build-a-Bed project has been selected to kick-off the 2010 National AmeriCorps Week, an annual recruitment and recognition event designed to bring more Americans into service while saluting the efforts of AmeriCorps members and alumni for their powerful impact on society.

According to AmeriCorps members it is a big deal for Kentucky, because in the past the National AmeriCorps Week Kick-Off-Events have been held in big cities like New York, Chicago and Washington D.C.

The Build-A-Bed project, has gained much momentum since its formation last year. The project, conceived by AmeriCorps members, delivered more than 50 beds to K-12 Kentucky students last May.

The program targets a very specific and often neglected community, the working-poor. Many children are living in homes with not enough beds, or none at all. Homeless shelters and various nonprofits take care of the homeless, but those who have homes and not furniture rarely receive much focus for help. The Build-A-Bed's mission is to ensure that K-12 Kentucky children are guaranteed a proper place to sleep in their homes.

To achieve this year's goal of 500 beds, Kentucky Build-A-Bed has partnered with outreach groups at Morehead State University, which include Retired Senior Volunteer Program (RSVP), MSUCorps, Adult Education and College Access, Center for Regional Engagement, Youth-Build, Today's Youth, Upward Bound, Student Support Services, and Campus Compact VISTA members.

Kentucky Build- a-Bed is working with Frontier Housing, VISTA and other agencies, nonprofits and regional schools to begin collecting community donations and assembling volunteers to help build the beds on May 8.

MOREHEAD, Ky.--- Twenty-four area high schools competed in Morehead State University's Raider Challenge, sponsored by the MSU Army Reserve Officers Training Corps.

Each school brought its top Army Junior ROTC students to compete in the six-event exhibition, totaling more than 600 students and another 150 instructors and parents.

Ripley Union Lewis Huntington High School of Ripley, Ohio, took first place (46 points) overall in the event. RULH was the only school to bring a non-Army JROTC. Second place went to Wayne County High School in Monticello (50) while Spring Valley High School, Huntington, W.Va., was third (58).

"The number of students, instructors, parents and teachers nearly doubled the size of our past-record turnout," said Lt. Col. Maxwell Ammons, professor of military science and commander of the MSU Army ROTC program.

Top scores in the modified Army Physical Fitness Test went to <u>Cadet Fithen</u> from RULH for the boys, and the top girls score went to <u>Cadet Warner</u> from Greenbriar East High School in Lewisburg, W.Va.

Fithen scored 366 points and Warner reached a 297, respectively, off point tables based upon 2 minutes of pushups, 2 minutes of situps, and a 1-mile run. Wayne County had the highest overall average, 281. RULH scored second with 280, and Grant County High School, from Williamstown, averaged a 279.

Since the high school Junior ROTC program is a citizenship program, there were no military events at the Raider Challenge, though many of the programs do participate in separate rifle competitions. Each team competed in six events. Lawrence County High School finished first in Urban Orienteering. This event sent each team running around the MSU campus to find 2-digit alphanumeric codes written on signs, after properly plotting points on a map of the area. George Rogers Clark finished second in the event while Louisville Eastern High School took third.

A timed Obstacle Course forced the teams to negotiate multiple obstructions while trying for the fastest time around Eagle Lake on the north end of MSU's campus. Madison Central High School took top honors in the race. Spring Valley finished second while John Hardin High School of Elizabethtown placed third. The event produced exhausted cadets with extremely dirt-filled uniforms and grit-filled smiles.

The Squad Drill event was a pre-released set of instructions that each team memorized and performed. Color Guard is a parallel yet different event involving rifle and flags. Both events were held in MSU's Laughlin Gym. RULH took top honors in Squad Drill, closely contested by North Hardin High School, and Lincoln County High School, respectively. Spring Valley won the Color Guard event, while Lincoln County took second and Wayne High School placed third.

One-rope bridge is a competition that forced each team to negotiate a river-like gap. One cadet is allowed to run across the gap and firmly tie the rope to a tree. Then, he or she runs back across the gap, and each cadet crosses the gap using only the rope. Wayne County topped the other 23 teams with a time of 2:17. George Rogers Clark was second (2:31) and Grant County placed third (2:50.)

Montgomery County High School won the Commander's Challenge, RULH finished second while Elliott County High School was third. The team was forced to negotiate a minefield, with only the squad leader able to view the field. The remaining squad members were blindfolded. This is the only event that was not divulged to the participants before they arrived at the competition. They were required to use their leadership and listening skills to complete it with a respectable time.

RHLH also won the tug-of-war contest, and lost a close battle to the MSU senior Army ROTC tug team.

The proceeds from the day helped to pay for the Military Ball and other events held annually by the ROTC Battalion.

"One of the things that make our annual Raider Competition unique is that it is completely planned, coordinated and executed by MSU ROTC students," Lt. Col. Ammons said.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---As the spring semester begins to wind down, Morehead State University's Police Department offers this advice to the campus community: Be aware of your surroundings and take the necessary precautions to avoid loss of your belongings.

"It is not uncommon to see an increase in crime at this time of year," said MSU Police Chief Matt Sparks. "On the campus, everyone is busy with the end of the year activities and fail to adhere to the safety rules that they usually follow."

Purses, wallets, cell phones, iPods and textbooks are among the list of items that are reported missing most often.

Always on the lookout for suspicious activity, an increase in the number of reports of theft has police officers being ever more vigilant. Students, as well as faculty and staff, are urged to take all necessary measures to secure and protect personal belongings in residence halls, offices and vehicles, in addition to office equipment and other vulnerable items.

"We want to remind you to take the extra time to secure items in the trunk or under the seat before leaving your automobile," Chief Sparks said. "The threat of a break-in is reduced if your belongings are not visible. Remember to lock your vehicle before leaving it in the parking area."

University police remind students to also practice safety in the residence halls:

- Make sure your door is locked when leaving your room, even if you are only going next door. It takes less than 10 seconds for a thief to enter an open room and steal property.
- Do not leave messages on phones, My Space or other computer accounts, indicating how long you will be away or when you expect to return.
- Follow the safety in numbers rule when going out at night and arrange to go with friends/roommates. It is a good practice to scan your surroundings whether walking on campus, traveling by automobile or enjoying a shopping excursion.
- Do not leave valuables or property (purses, backpacks, books, personal identification, etc.) visible in or around the office or living area.
- Keep emergency numbers by the phone. Call 911 to report any suspicious person or activity.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Students enrolling at Morehead State University for the 2010 fall semester will see some procedural changes in how tuition and fees are paid. Students will continue to have access to their billing statements and other pertinent information, all from one's personal MSU account.

Students create a financial obligation to Morehead State when they register for classes. The total semester charges—including tuition, housing, meal plans, books and fees—less financial aid, scholarships or third-party payments, result in the amount for a payment plan.

"We are excited to offer these payment plans to give students options," said Carol Ford, assistant director for student services in the Office of Accounting and Financial Services. "This should speed up the enrollment process and allow it to move faster and in a more efficient manner. If students cannot pay in full, they will now have the option to sign up on a fixed payment plan and know their University obligation by logging on to their MSU account."

Following the 2010 summer sessions, MSU will implement two plans for paying fees and eliminate the Statement of Intent. One week prior to the start of classes, all students must make payment in full or enroll in a payment plan to prevent their schedule from being canceled.

Enrollment in the Standard Payment Plan will be available beginning July 1. The enrollment fee is \$40 for a net balance of less than \$1,000, or \$75 for a net balance of \$1,000 or more. The financial obligation will be determined by the student's expenses less financial aid or scholarships awarded. The amount will be divided into three payments which will be due in August, September and October. The enrollment fee and first payment will be due at the time of enrollment.

Students must register prior to the first day of classes to avoid a \$75 late registration fee. Students must make payments on time to avoid a late payment charge at the monthly rate of 0.65 percent on outstanding balances and to avoid a hold being placed on their account.

Recipients who are eligible for and awarded financial aid to cover their entire obligation are required to enroll in the Financial Aid Pending Plan one week prior to the start of classes to avoid cancellation of class schedules. There is no enrollment fee.

Any changes in financial aid, tuition, books, meal plan or other charges, will be automatically reflected in the billing statement and result in an increase or decrease in the monthly bill. Students may elect to pay an amount greater than the amount due or the entire balance in full at any time.

Students who have had their schedules dropped will have until the last day to add a class (Aug. 31), to reregister and pay in full or enroll in an online payment plan. One week after the last day to add a class (Sept. 7), there will be final schedule drop for all students who have not enrolled in a payment plan or paid their balance in full.

The enrollment process also will include a change in how refund checks will be disbursed. Checks will not be disbursed until after all financial transactions are complete. Two weeks after the beginning of classes, checks will be direct deposited or mailed to the address the student has on file with the University. Checks will not be available for pick up.

Information on student refunds, including direct deposit, is available on WebAdvisor, located at www.moreheadstate.edu. The University will distribute monthly e-bills with the amount owed and with detail of any changes made to the account.

"We want our students to fully understand the financial obligations created with University enrollment," Ford said. "we now have available current detailed billing information that each student can access through WebAdvisor. We encourage our students to review that account information at least monthly. Regular review of this information, reporting any discrepancies, and taking action to keep their account in a current status, will help our students develop financial management skills that are valuable throughout life."

MOREHEAD, Ky.---The General Assembly went home more than a week ago from the 2010 regular session without a new state budget, leaving Gov. Steve Beshear with the task of calling a special legislative session before the current fiscal year ends on June 30. As of today, a firm date has not been determined and the call has not been issued.

The governor was critical of the legislature's failure to enact a new biennial budget and continues to encourage legislative leaders to work out their differences before he brings the lawmakers back to the Capitol at a cost of about \$60,000 per day.

With all 100 House seats and 19 of the 38 Senate seats at stake in this year's elections, it was assumed that the special session would be called for late May or early June to avoid the May 18 primary. However, Gov. Beshear has said that he wants a new budget by June 1 so that he can make adjustments in the state's bonded debt before July 1. If so, that would require a session in May.

Senate President David Williams says his chamber will not accept a budget with substantial new debt or increased business taxes. House Speaker Greg Stumbo insists that his members only will support a budget that creates jobs by funding millions of dollars of capital construction projects, primarily the replacement of dilapidated public school buildings.

If a new budget is not in place by 12:01 a.m. on July 1, the governor will be forced to shut down all state government operations, including public higher education, that are not essential to public safety.

The visit will last at least a week, although faculty members may choose to stay longer, enabling the faculty member to become familiar with the site and the program, and to gain a better understanding of the dynamics and special challenges and rewards of teaching in a study abroad program.

Recipients are expected to apply to teach in an approved study-abroad program within two years of the grant-funded visit, and to make a conscientious effort to internationalize a class they teach. The grant will fund the airfare and help defray the costs during the visit.

The faculty members selected are:

Dr. Capp Yess (College of Science and Technology) will travel to Italy and joining a KIIS program in June 2010, visiting Rome, Florence and Venice, which were key locations in the life of Galileo. He will be identifying ways to infuse an astronomy course with some of the philosophical influences that shaped the thinking of this great astronomer. In a potential future international course, students would actually travel to these places and see them first-hand.

James Masterson (College of Business and Public Affairs) will travel to China in association with the KIIS program there. He will be gathering information concerning globalization and the role of the economic development in China in the world economy. Masterson would eventually like to teach a course in China, where students could visit key locations concerning the cultural history and economic rise of China.

Dr. Timothy Simpson (College of Education) will travel to Ireland through the CCSA to explore ways to bring the cultural heritage of folktales, stories, and storytelling into his classes, and comparing/contrasting Irish and Appalachian stories. MOREHEAD, Ky.---Filippo Graziani, professor of astrodynamics and dean of the Aerospace Engineering School at the University of Rome, will be the next guest of the 2009-10 Morehead State University Department of Earth and Space Science speaker series.

Graziani will lecture on Friday, April 16, at 5:30 p.m. in the Star Theater of the Space Science Center.

Graziani is visiting Morehead to work on a collaborative space mission called "GlioLab" which is a joint effort between the GAUSS-Group of Astrodynamics at the "Sapienza" University of Rome and MSU's Space Science Center and Department of Biology and Chemistry.

The primary objective of GlioLab is to investigate the combined effects of microgravity and ionizing radiation on the survival rate of cancer cells affected by Glioblastoma multi-forme. Chantal Cappelletti, a Ph.D. student in astrodynamics at the University of Rome, has been working at the Space Science Center this past year as a visiting scholar on the project. She has established a team of several student researchers at MSU.

Dr. Darrin DeMoss, professor of biology, is leading the effort designing the biological experiment and Bob Twiggs, professor of space science, and Dr. Ben Malphrus, chair of the Department of Earth and Space Science and director of the Space Science Center, are working on systems engineering and management of the project. Several MSU students in biology and space science are involved in the research. GlioLab is intended to fly on the International Space Station next year as part of the Kentucky Space NanoRacks program.

"It is a particular honor to have Dr. Graziani visit and to provide a talk for our students and the public," said Dr. Malphrus. "The opportunity to collaborate on an important space mission like GlioLab is an incredible opportunity for our students and faculty and has potential to produce some very interesting science relative to the understanding of cancer cell mitosis in microgravity."
