MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University's Board of Regents approved a midyear pay supplement of \$750 for each full-time faculty and staff member employed prior to July 1, on Thursday, Dec. 9, during its quarterly meeting.

"I want to take this opportunity to thank each member of the faculty and staff for their hard work and commitment to Morehead State University," said President Wayne D. Andrews. "Their efforts, both individually and collectively, have enabled the University to move forward during a time of severe economic challenges. In identifying and implementing multiple cost-saving initiatives, the faculty and staff have enabled the University to operate more effectively and efficiently. As a result, we have been able to generate an institutional fund balance to support a one-time \$750 mid-year pay supplement.

"I am hopeful that it will assist many families with end-of-the-year expenditures and rising utility costs during the upcoming winter months. All midyear pay supplement checks will be printed and distributed through departmental supervisors during the week of December 13-17," said Dr. Andrews.

The amount will be subject to tax and retirement deductions and its for full-time faculty and staff member employed prior to July 1, in an authorized position funded in the University's unrestricted operating budget and serving in a non-probationary performance status.

The Regents also heard from Dr. Ben Malphrus, chair of the Department of Earth and Space Sciences, and Robert Twiggs, professor of Space Science, on the programs and projects currently underway at MSU's Space Science Center.

The Spotlight Presentation was made by Dr. Malphrus and Twiggs, who outlined the center's accomplishments since opening and also gave the Regents a look at some of the satellites that students are developing and will launch.

MSU is among five institutions in the U.S. with a bachelor's degree in space science.

The Kentucky Space program, of which MSU is a lead institution (along with the University of Kentucky), has developed its own CubeSat, KySat-1 which will fly as a secondary payload on NASA's Glory Mission in February.

BOR approves full-time faculty and staff pay supplement
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Twiggs has brought a number of space-related projects to Morehead State, including a collaboration with the Aerospace Engineering School at the University of Rome, leading to the development of a joint satellite called EduSat. EduSat is a 10 kg (22 lb.) satellite built by the University of Rome. EduSat Sat, which will launch on from the Kosmatras Launch site in Yasny, Russia, will contain 4 PocketQubs (femtosats invented by Twiggs) which will be ejected from the "mothership" at apogee.

Morehead State undergraduate students have built one of the PocketQubs-- Eagle-1, with the others built by private individuals in the U.S. and Europe. MSU Space Science students also designed and built the orbital deployer which will release the PocketQubs from EduSat. These femtosats will be the smallest satellites ever launched. Each will have Earth and Space monitoring sensors and test micro/nano technology for space applications.

During its regular scheduled quarterly meeting, the Regents approved the 2010 winter graduates. The ceremony will be held Saturday, Dec. 18, at 10:30 a.m. in the Academic-Athletic Center.

The Board also accepted the 2009-10 financial audit report and amended operating budget; accepted the first quarter financial report and amended operating budget; heard reports on the health insurance plan for 2011; approved personal service contracts; and received the 2010 final fall enrollment figures.

The group ratified personnel actions and approved amending the Student Government Association's Constitution.

Dr. Andrews also presented the Regents with his president's report.

The next scheduled quarterly meeting will be held Thursday, March 10.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University's Dr. Jennifer Birriel, associate professor of physics in the Department of Mathematics, Computer Science and Physics, gave a presentation to the general public as part of the MacAdam Student Observatory at the University of Kentucky at the invitation of Dr. Ron Wilhelm, UK assistant professor of astronomy.

Dr. Birriel spoke to a crowd of nearly 200 on the topic of "Life in the Universe." The crowd included several groups of middle school students.

"Claims of UFO sightings and alien abductions abound in popular culture. Science fiction literature imagines an incredible variety of extraterrestrial intelligences capable of routinely communicating and traveling across vast distances in space. In my talk, I discussed just how realistic such scenarios are and explored how scientists in the emerging field of astrobiology are attempting to answer the question 'Is there life in the Universe or are we alone?'" said Dr. Birriel.

"I also discuss the physics and mathematics of interstellar travel and communications."

Dr Birriel received her Ph.D. degree in physics from the University of Pittsburgh in 2000. Her research interests include variable stars, planetary nebulae, supernova remnants, light pollution, and the physics of everyday phenomenon. She is author or co-author of more than 50 publications, both refereed and popular.

She also is a regular contributor to Mercury Magazine with her column titled "The Astronomer's Notebook."

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MSU grad Gearhart takes new professorship at John Hopkins

Director of Pediatric Urology John P. Gearhart is the inaugural recipient of The Robert D. Jeffs Professorship in Pediatric Urology at Johns Hopkins. President of Johns Hopkins University Ronald Daniels officially accepted the new professorship for Johns Hopkins in a Dec. 1 ceremony at which Gearhart was installed as the new Robert D. Jeffs Professor of Pediatric Urology.

“It's a tremendous honor,” said Gearhart, who trained with Jeffs and succeeded him as director of pediatric urology in the James Buchanan Brady Urological Institute at Johns Hopkins and at Hopkins Children’s. “He taught us the truth of science, that excellence was always expected and he lived what he preached.”

The founding chief of pediatric urology at Johns Hopkins and a trailblazing surgeon in his field, Jeffs died in 2006.

Like his predecessor, Dr. Gearhart is among the world's leading experts on urogenital malformations in children, most notably those related to bladder and cloacal exstrophy. Today he heads a world-class Division of Pediatric Urology specializing in the reconstruction of these birth defects in children, including those who have undergone previously failed exstrophy closures elsewhere. In the summer of 2010, Gearhart and his colleagues performed their division’s 1,000th exstrophy surgery, employing the multistage technique that Jeffs developed and perfected in the 1970s.

“Bob (Jeffs) took a major birth defect which consigned children to a reclusive, dismal existence and devised a three-step technique to repair it, basically altering the lives of thousands of children throughout the world,” said Gearhart.

A graduate of Morehead State University (1971) and the University of Louisville School of Medicine (1975), Dr. Gearhart completed his internship and a residency at the Medical College of Georgia, where he also served as chief resident in urology. After a fellowship in pediatric urology at the Alder Hey Children’s Hospital at the University of Liverpool School of Medicine and service on the faculty of St. Mary’s Hospital in Huntington, W.Va., he joined the Brady Institute at Johns Hopkins in 1984 as a pediatric urology fellow and trained with Jeffs. He succeeded Jeffs as professor and director of pediatric urology in 1996. His own mentees, former fellows at Johns Hopkins, include many current chiefs of pediatric urology in prestigious medical institutions across the nation and abroad.

The Jeffs Professorship was endowed partially by a bequest from long-time Johns Hopkins supporter Zanvyl Krieger (A&S 1928), combined later with the support of friends, grateful families and the Department of Urology at Johns Hopkins, led by Department Chair Alan Partin, M.D., Ph.D.

“For a lifetime of work done superbly well, we are thrilled to honor Dr. Robert Jeffs,” said Daniels at the Dec. 1 installation. “And to Dr. John Gearhart, we offer our heartiest congratulations and profound thanks for leading us toward a future of limitless possibility.”

Hall was an avid supporter of MSU and its Mt. Sterling campus. He worked with former MSU president Dr. C. Nelson Grote during the initial planning phases of establishing regional campus locations. According to many, he was instrumental in bringing the campus to the community.

All students MUST enroll in a payment plan or pay in full by Jan. 10, via WebAdvisor to prevent cancellation of Spring class schedules. Students receiving financial aid, scholarships, or third party payments that will cover their entire balance are required to enroll in the "Financial Aid Pending Plan," to prevent class schedules from being cancelled.

MSU offers online bachelor's degree "completer" programs designed primarily for graduates of the Kentucky Community and Technical College System (KCTCS). These programs allow KCTCS graduates to earn bachelor's degrees while continuing to meet work and family obligations without traveling long distances.
