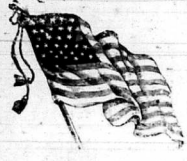

## Council Adopts Blackout Ordinance

At a meeting of the City Council held Tuesday night, a "Black Out Ordinance" governing the regulation of blackouts in the city of Morehead was unanimously adopted by the council at the request of C B McCullough, chairman of Civilian Defense in Rowan county. According to Mr. McCullough all cities in Kentucky are being urged to adopt such ordinances for the protection of life and property during possible enemy air raids. It is not the danger of an air raid but rather that there is always a possibility of an air raid. The ordinance has plenty of teeth in it, providing fines up to \$500 and imprisonment for not more than six months in jail for failure to observe all regulations. McCullough stated that it is the hope of the council that the ordinance will be held at a later date.

## Red Cross To Stop Civilian Relief Work

The following statement by H. C. Hester, chairman of the local Chapter of Red Cross is of interest to everyone. Due to the national emergency and the demands made on the funds of the local chapter of Red Cross, it becomes necessary that the local organization shut down its civilian relief work under the setup of the American Red Cross the men in the Armed forces have first right to funds raised and local Civilian Relief is only a side life in handling Red Cross funds. A letter from National headquarters of the American Red Cross called attention of the local chapter to the following statement during the emergency: The American Red Cross is not a relief agency except in times of emergencies brought about in time of disaster and what is known as Civilian Relief is no longer encouraged by National headquarters. Heretofore in Rowan county most of the fund raised went for civilian relief. (Continued On Page Two)
