INCOME TAX RETURNS (Continued from page 1)

In addition, a return must be filed by someone who paid or owed a tax on 1942 income. A return should be filed likewise by anyone claiming a refund of taxes withheld from wages.

The requirements for filing 1943 returns on or before March 15, apply to civilians and personnel of the armed forces alike, except that postponement or extensions are allowed those who are on sea duty or outside the continental United States. If a member of the armed forces is on sea duty or outside of the Continental United States, his wife may also postpone her return if her own income is less than \$1,200. There are several other special provisions applying to members of the armed forces, and Collector Glenn invited any service personnel needing tax advice to contact his office.

As in past years, there are two income tax forms, Form 1040, commonly called the "long form," may be used by any individual.

Form 1040A, called the "short form," may be used by individuals who (a) are citizens or residents of the United States, (b) had in 1943 \$3,000 or less income from salaries, wages, bonuses, commissions, or other forms of personal compensation, or from dividends, interest and annuities. In the case of husbands and wives filing separate returns, each must use the same form. The short form may be used as a joint return for husband and wife, if in addition to the other conditions for using that form, they were living together on July 1, 1943, and their combined income for the year did not exceed \$3,000.

On or before January 31, 1944, every employer is required to give to each employee a receipt on

Form W-2, showing how much wages were paid the employee during 1943, and how much tax was withheld. These receipts supply two important figures needed for making the annual return and the best time to prepare and file the return is as soon as the employee gets his receipt.

Collector Glenn has stated that notices have been mailed or will be mailed in the near future to all taxpayers who filed returns in this district for 1942, showing the amount of each individual's 1942 tax and the amounts paid on that tax. These are two additional figures which income taxpayers will need in the preparation of their returns for 1943. The notices should be sent back to the Collector along with the return.

Women's Club Hears Future Educational Problems Discussed

"What Will 1950 Be Like in the Field of Education," was the topic discussed by Dr. R. D. Judd of the Education department at a meeting of the Women's club, January 11. In his talk Dr. Judd set forth the following theses as being characteristic of education in 1950: 1. Free tuition for all alike who wish to attend college. 2. Out campus work to be accentuated. 3. Fewer "washouts" in college will be the result of careful screening of abilities. 4. Regional geography will be more carefully studied. 5. There will be better planned school economy as to how we spend our time and money. 6. There will be a new world view. One of Bobbit's cardinal principles, World Tolerance, will be reemphasized. 7. "We learn only what we live" will be the shibboleth for classroom teachers. 8. Rural teachers will be little better off. 9. There will be a need to re-examine our aims and methods in reading since we are now about a seventh grade nation in reading. 10. Schools will be more concerned about the health of the pupils. 11. Pupils will find that there are no hurry up schemes for getting reading and arithmetic. 12. "If you sow the wind you will reap the whirlwind," is a truism that cannot be tempered with. Noted Author Gives Series of Lectures On World Affairs

Sherwood Eddy Discusses Asiatic Problems For First Lyceum Program

The Lyceum program of the Morehead State Teachers college presented Dr. Sherwood Eddy, noted author, lecturer and religious worker, in a series of lectures in the college auditorium Thursday and Friday.

He addressed the student body at the regular Thursday chapel

exercises Thursday morning, and spoke to a group of students, faculty members and town people Thursday evening. Another lecture was held at ten o'clock Friday morning.

For the past 50 years Dr. Eddy has been traveling throughout the world doing religious education work among students of many nations. His work with students has begun in America and in 1893 he started his work abroad. For 15 years he was associated with the students of India, and the next 15 years were spent as Y.M.C.A. secretary for Asia. This work took him to Japan, China, India, Turkey, and many other countries. He was thrown into intimate contact with many of the great leaders of the world, including Chang Kai-shek and Gandhi, and through these contacts he has gained an insight into the important social and economic conditions of the world today.

In his address to the student convocation Thursday morning Dr. Eddy gave a picture of conditions of the various countries of the world, both enemy and ally, and

outlined a three-fold requirement for a better world after the war. "The world is confronted with three vital tasks," he said. "First, we must win the war; second, we must win the peace—a just and living peace; and third, we must build a better world—a world worth living for and worth dying for."

Dr. Eddy discussed in detail the Communist problem of Russia, setting forth the two greatest evils of that movement—denial of liberty and the violence of a continuing revolution, and the dogmatic atheism of the movement. He also listed the value of Communism—its determination to give justice to all, and their deep sense of brotherhood.

"We have a great deal to learn from Russia," he said, "and they have a lot to learn from us. Therefore, I think it is the providence of God that these countries are

brought together in the making of this peace and the building of the new world.

In his lecture Thursday night, Dr. Eddy discussed the problems and conditions of China, Russia and India, dealing with the strength and weaknesses of their leaders and government, and their prospects for the future.

Dr. Eddy was present at the capture of Mubden in Manchuria by the Japanese in 1931, and for 20 years he has annually conducted a traveling seminar of educators to study conditions in Russia, Poland, Germany, France, Great Britain, and other European countries.

He has been speaking recently before many types of audiences all over the country. The noted lecturer has also spoken to several hundred colleges and universities in all parts of Europe and Asia, and has been a member of count-

less forums, conventions, and conferences.

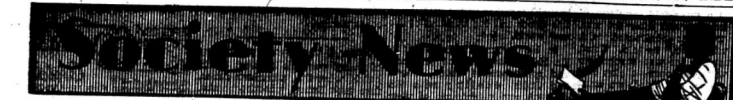
