

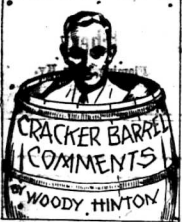

**Notice To File Claims**

**ORDER**

It appearing to the Court that by the judgment heretofore entered the lands herein described have been condemned and the United States has paid into the Registry of the Court the amount awarded as compensation for said lands, and funds now remain in the Registry; and it further appearing to the Court that the remaining questions to be determined are, first, the nature and extent of the above lands, which by the Court that any party claiming the whole or any part of the land described and condemned herein, or of the above funds, who has not heretofore filed in this cause an appropriate pleading setting forth specifically the nature and extent of his claim, shall file the same within ninety days from the date of the entry of this order, and in default thereof will be precluded from the benefit of this proceeding and from participating in the distribution of said fund.

After the expiration of said ninety days, all issues arising between adverse claimants as to the ownership of any of the lands condemned, or as to the rights of such claimants to share in said funds, shall stand for trial before the Court at such time as may be fixed by the Court; and if any such claimant shall fail to appear and prosecute his claim at the time so fixed his claim to share in such fund may thereupon be dismissed by the Court for want of prosecution.

Under the heading "NOTICE TO FILE CLAIMS" the Clerk shall cause a copy of the foregoing portion of this order to be published in one issue of the following newspaper, viz:

**ORDER**

It appearing to the Court that by the judgment heretofore entered the lands herein described have been condemned and the United States has paid into the Registry of the Court the amount awarded as compensation for said lands, and said funds now remain in the Registry; and it further appearing to the Court that the remaining questions to be determined are, first, the nature and extent of the above lands, which by the Court that any party claiming the whole or any part of the land described and condemned herein, or of the above funds, who has not heretofore filed in this cause an appropriate pleading setting forth specifically the nature and extent of his claim, shall file the same within ninety days from the date of the entry of this order, and in default thereof will be precluded from the benefit of this proceeding and from participating in the distribution of said fund.

After the expiration of said ninety days, all issues arising between adverse claimants as to the ownership of any of the lands condemned, or as to the rights of such claimants to share in said funds, shall stand for trial before the Court at such time as may be fixed by the Court; and if any such claimant shall fail to appear and prosecute his claim at the time so fixed his claim to share in such fund may thereupon be dismissed by the Court for want of prosecution.

Under the heading "NOTICE TO FILE CLAIMS" the Clerk shall cause a copy of the foregoing portion of this order to be published in one issue of the following newspaper, viz:

Morehead Independent, Morehead, Kentucky. The cost of such publication shall be paid out of the

funds held in the Registry of the Court in this action.
