Morehead Has Many Assets For Boy Scout Troops

Perhaps no community in Kentucky is better prepared in Kentucky to have a Boy Scout troop than Morehead. Valuable training to Scouts in earning merit badges is offered by departments at Morehead State College while the large library there is also available to them.

History Of Original Floyd County, Carrying Names Of Pioneer Citizens, Compiled

Originally Embraced Practically All Of Northeastern Kentucky

Names of all living residents of the original Floyd County area, which ancient boundaries were confined to the linbo forked by American progress one hundred and fifty years ago, will be included in the forthcoming comprehensive history book of that vast territory now being compiled here.

This was announced today by Franklin Moore, General Chairman of the Floyd County Sequenecentennial Celebration, which huge festive occasion will be staged here and throughout the 15-county area July 1, 2, 3, and 4.

Those counties which, in whole or in part, made up the original Floyd county, all of which are expected to play an important part in the coming celebration, are Breathitt, Elliott, Floyd, Johnson, Knott, Lawrence, Letcher, Magoffin, Martin, Manfefe, Morgan, Perry, Pike, Rowan and Wolfe.

Proper application for inclusion of the names of all living residents of those counties in the memorial history must be made through the offices of the Sequenecentennial Celebration at Prestonsburg. Additional details in this regard will be announced later.

W. women's Auxiliary; Mrs. Oona Hamilton, Prestonsburg, president of the Women's Club; Mrs. Winston Ford, Prestonsburg, acting deputy commissioner; Girl Scouts; Mrs. Nancy Webb, Prestonsburg, worthy matron of the Eastern Star; Miss Alice Harris, president West Prestonsburg Civic Club; Miss Anna Belle Hight, West Prestonsburg; Rebecca Lodge; Miss Sara Clay Stephens, Prestonsburg, president of the Junior Women's Club; Mrs. R. D. Francis, Prestonsburg, director of the Junior League; and J. R. Camelia of the same organization.

One of the interesting sections of the historical book will be a chapter on the "Centennial Babies"—this being appropriately illustrated pages of the birth records of the baby born in the 15-county territory since the first of the present year and up to time of publication of this historical volume. It is widely known that Kentucky historian, is now putting the finishing touches to the manuscript of his history of this area, one of the outstanding districts so replete in folklore, legend and the Kiwanis, and the Sequenecentennial Celebration Committee are rapidly forging ahead. Among these is a beauty contest, details of which are being worked out by its sponsors, the Junior Chamber of Commerce.

Breck Student Council Active In 1949-50

The Breckinridge Student Council is completing one of its most successful years since the organization was begun in 1937. The Student Council is the governing body of the Breckinridge Student organization and is pledged to "secure a more desirable relationship between students and a more wholesome and congenial atmosphere in Breckinridge."

All students in grades 7 through 12 belong to the Student Organization and each elects two representatives to make up the Student Council. Each year a president and vice-president are elected by the membership of the organization from a group of candidates selected by the junior and senior classes.

Elections are conducted as possible. The school is divided into three precincts and each precinct has its own election of officers, voting list, voting booth, ballot box and other equipment. Elections are held during the noon hour and those who wish to vote may do so.

At the last election only 10 out of 162 eligible voters failed to vote—about 6%.

Each year the Council sponsors a Halloween party and this past year the party was a "howling" success judging from the noise made by the revelers. Breckinridge was represented at the national convention of the National Association of Student Councils held in Cincinnati last June. Jenny Lou White, a senior at Breck, was one of two official delegates from Kentucky to attend the national convention.

Francis Apel, a senior and president of Breck County, was one of the speakers at the annual convention of the Kentucky Association of Student Councils at Fort Knox last November. The members of the Council are the sole and collection of tickets at the Breckinridge home basketball games and other refreshments at the games to earn money for Council activities.

From its earnings this year the Council was able to purchase a \$180 type recorder for the use of Training School classes. The representatives from the seventh through eighth grades were responsible for securing a recreation room for the Junior High School and have assumed the responsibility for supervising this room.

The Council has also started a School Safety Patrol to help conduct school children across the street safely before and after school. These patrolmen have been equipped with badges and safety signs.

Next year the group plans to work on a revision of the constitution and is planning a school award system for recognizing outstanding students in scholarship, speech, music, athletic and other school activities.

Officers of the Council for this year are: President, Francis Apel, 12th Grade; Vice-President, Betty Sue Waggoner, 12th Grade.

This 'Irish Luck' Must Be True

An old stove with \$3,002 in it carried the luck of the Irish this week.

The stove belonged to an elderly bachelor, Pat Lavelle, of Demet, S. D. When he died a year ago, all the property that could be found was auctioned—about \$12,000 worth. But Pat's stove, which he bought when he was a boy, was sold for \$3,002 in bills and coins.

The Irish angel! Heirs to Lavelle's estate are 19 cousins, most of them living in Ireland.

School Funds At Ashland May Be Withheld

Unless the Ashland board of education takes control of the junior college there, the state should withhold funds it provides for the Ashland public school system.

This recommendation was disclosed this week in an audit of Ashland's schools on file at the State Education Department.

State laws place the Ashland Junior College under the supervision of the city board of education. The city school superintendent should also be the chief officer for the junior college.

But the auditors reported the board adopted an order Jan. 28, 1948, in which it voted to give authority for administering the affairs of the college to the college president.

That was done, the audit said, after the board was warned in 1946, through an opinion by former Attorney General Eldon S. Dummitt, that the practice is unlawful.

Dummitt declared that a resolution adopted by the board on Aug. 1, 1946, creating the office of college president and giving him authority to supervise the college, is invalid. A copy of this opinion was sent to the Ashland board.

At Ashland, Herbert R. Smith, president of the school board, said his organization had not had time to study the auditors' comments. But he added the board would "do everything necessary to satisfy the State Department of Education."
