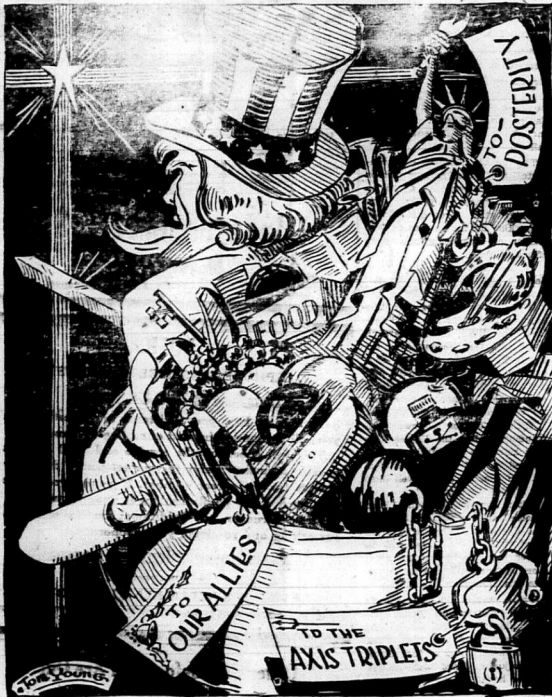

## A College Trains Full Quota of Navy Men

Owing to the very serious condition of our sister, Miss Mary Griffith, we have been unable to get much writing done this week and A-Americans-All has suffered accordingly. A full quota of six hundred sailors are now in training on the Morehead campus, taking intensive electrical study under the instruction of members of the college staff.

The Bluejacket students, which include men in four divisions, are stationed at Morehead for a six-week course preparatory to their being graduated and sent to sea on a United States fleetship. One group of graduates each month and a new group composed of sailors from various naval bases over the nation are sent into Morehead to replace the outgoing group.

Three classes have already completed their training here and been sent to sea since the naval unit was inaugurated in the first graduating class included thirty-five men, but the latter two have been composed of a full quota of almost one-hundred fifty men.

Of the graduating classes, top honor men receive ratings as electricians' mates, third class. Selection is made on the basis of scholastic standing, conduct, and leadership. Several men from the graduating groups have been sent on to advanced training in submarine warfare, amphibian warfare, and mine-sweeping.

Commander George Walker, veteran of thirty-one years of navy experience, is in charge of the Morehead unit, with offices in Men's Hall. The ship's company of forty men includes nine commissioned officers and the complement of petty officers and specialists. The commissioned officers stationed at Morehead are: the commanding officer, executive officer, two divisional officers, education officer, ship's service officer, supply officer, doctor, and dentist.

Dormitory accommodations, meals, and instruction for the Bluejackets are provided by the college. Men's Hall and Thompson Hall are filled to capacity with trainees, and three meals a day are served to them at the college cafeteria. The sailors attend classes in Science Hall, the Administration building, and in the electric workshops in Thompson Hall basement. They also have the use of the college gymnasium, athletic field, auditorium, library, and hospital.

The ship's hospital is located on the third floor of Allie Young Hall, and the canteen and barber shop are in the basement of Thompson Hall. Trainees are kept on a rigid schedule of study, which includes forty-four hours of classwork and supervised study per week. Besides the time spent in the physical education programs, routine inspections, and such. Week-end leave periods begin Saturday afternoon, and end Sunday night.

## Three Complete Courses This Quarter

Three Morehead seniors, Lionel Lyon, Claster Reynolds, and Bill Black, will complete their work toward degrees at the end of the present quarter and will be awarded diplomas at the next graduation exercises of the college.

Lyon, a major in political science and chemistry, is a graduate of Ashland High School. He entered Morehead in 1939, and has been active in various extracurricular activities, especially in the college music department, where he has been solo French horn player in the band, and a member of the choir and ensembles. He was selected last year as a representative of the college in "Who's Who Among Students in America Universities and Colleges", and has held offices in the Campus Club, Musc. Club, class organizations, Mu Phi, and Beta Beta.

Reynolds, of Buckhorn, Kentucky, has been an outstanding football player for Morehead. He entered college in 1936, and made a berth on the squad. In 1937 he was named all-state fullback. Reynolds was crowned King of the Winter Carnival in 1937, and was named Most Handsome Man on the campus in 1939. He resigned school last June after two years at teaching and working in a defense plant, and is completing his majors in history and physical education. During the summer term he was elected vice-president of the Campus Club, and was a member of the softball league. Reynolds is enlisted in the V-7 division of Navy Reserve, and at the end of the quarter he will enter Officers' Training School for naval engineers.

Black, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. G. Black, of Ann Arbor, Michigan, is completing his Morehead career as an honor student of both Breckinridge Training School and Morehead College. His honors have included being named twice for "Who's Who," Most Versatile Man in 1942, Most Popular Man in 1941, officer of numerous campus organizations, editor of the 1942 yearbook, as well as his having been prominent in all activities of the music department. Black is graduating with majors in political science and economics, with a minor in music.

Both Lyon and Black are enlisted in Army Reserve, and will be called into training at the end of the quarter.

## Zachem Is Named Little All-American Zach Only Kentuckian Picked On First Team

Vincent "Moose" Zachem be-

came Morehead's third "Little All-American" this week when the Associated Press named their all-star team. "Zach" gained the berth at center on the team by his brilliant performances on the gridiron this season in seven classes. He played sixty minutes in every game—three of those games with one hand in a cast.

After graduating in 1938 from Ashland High School, where he was an outstanding football and basketball player, "Moose" came to Morehead and as a yearling

he played on one of the best freshman teams Morehead has ever produced. For three years he held down the tackle slot and in his junior year he was named tackle on the all-K. I. A. C. team.

In the last three seasons, he has played all the line positions. Although his regular booth was at tackle, he shifted to center to replace Paul Adams in the '41 season. When Morehead tied Western in 1940 Zachem started the game at the end post. Because of his hand injury, Zachem moved to the guard slot when the Eagles were in punt formation and Vince Gandolfi centered the ball.

This season Zachem was converted into the regular center because there were no centers on Coach Johnson's roster. The coaching staff rates him "tops" in backing up the line, as he is a master at diagnosing opponent's offensive plays.

In the first tittle this year, Zach broke a bone in his left hand but refused to leave the game. In the following two tittles he played with the hand still in a cast. An official in the Marshall game said that Zachem was the greatest center he has ever seen perform and that he was the first football player who completed an entire game without a mistake.

Coach Johnson praised his star, "Zachem is one of the most outstanding leaders the Eagles have ever had. He is courageous, has worked hard at all times, is modest and popular, and is well liked by his teammates."

After graduation in June, "Moose" will report to the Marine Corps, in which he is a unlisted reserve, and he will be placed on the list with other Morehead athletes who have gone into the service.

Twice before in Morehead's football history an Eagle has been placed on the Little All-American squad. In 1938 Buck Horton, center, and in 1939 Stanley Adams, guard, were named for the honor.

Larry Workman, fullback, and Carl "Corky" Howerton, quarterback, received honorable mention in the A. P. rating. Both of these boys were outstanding on the Morehead team, which built one of the best seasons' records of the Kentucky colleges.

## MTSC Instructs Army Aviators

Two groups of ten trainees of the C. P. T. program, part of the civil aeronautics program sponsored by the government, have finished their ground school work and flight work on the Morehead campus and have been sent on to secondary schools.

The program offered by Morehead college in collaboration with the federal program includes elementary courses covering a period of eight weeks, during which time each cadet is required to have a minimum of thirty-five flying hours for completion of the work.

The student trainees take their ground work courses in the college classrooms, and receive their flight instruction at the Licking Flying Field, at Farmers. In order to do student flight work, each cadet secures a student pilot's license and on the completion of his training is eligible for a private pilot's license. On completion of their elementary training at Morehead, the men are assigned to secondary training centers located in the Columbus district, at Springfield, Dayton, Columbus, Cincinnati, and Oxford, Ohio.

Morehead C. P. T. trainees are entitled in the Army Air Corps Enlisted Reserve Corps, and must successfully pass the civil aeronautics physical and mental examinations.

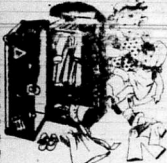

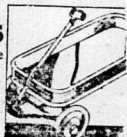

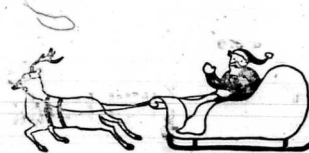
