Kathy Walker of Paintsville was elected Board of Regents chair. The board also elected Wayne Martin as vice chair. Sharon S. Reynolds, assistant to the president, was re-elected board secretary and Teresa Lindgren, interim chief financial officer, was appointed treasurer.

The board approved the creation of the W. Terry McBrayer Presidential Lecture Series in Government and Leadership. The series will begin in the fall. The regents also approved the naming the Claypool-Young main gallery as the Golding-Yang Art Gallery in honor of Deeno Golding, a long-time art professor who died in December 2017, and his wife, Yanya Yang, and brother-in-law, Neng Yang. The official ceremony will take place Friday, May 4.

In his report, President Morgan spoke on the University's activities since the last meeting and updated the members of the latest budget and legislative news.

Dr. George M. Luckey and Dr. Sue Luckey spoke to the regents on their years at MSU.

After the meeting concluded, President Jay Morgan and the regents visited the new location of the renovated home of Luckey Academic Honors Program in Fields Hall.

In March of 2003, MSU's Honors Program was renamed The George M. Luckey, Jr. Academic Honors Program. This naming was in honor of Dr. Luckey, a dedicated director of the program from 1990 until he retired in 2003. Dr. Luckey taught for more than 40 years as a

professor of philosophy at MSU, where he was recipient of the Distinguished Teacher of the Year Award.

The next quarterly meeting is scheduled for Thursday, June 7.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University's Dr. Amy Johnson Staton, assistant professor of veterinary technology, and Dr. Christine Boyd, physical education/health teacher for Warsaw Community School, had an article published in the Journal of the Association of Veterinary Technician Educators.

JAVTE is one of the most prominent publication of veterinary technician education in the United States.

The article titled, "Haptic Technology in an Academic Setting," describes haptic technology and the advantages of implementing such technology in a veterinary technology program. The use of haptic technology provides an opportunity for students to obtain a new understanding through tactile and kinesthetic experiences. With the utilization of haptic technology, students can achieve a complete training experience without the use of live patients. Haptics allow students to experiment, make mistakes, improve techniques, and practice indefinitely until they reach and exceed an appropriate level of clinical competency.

The exploration and creation of life-like simulations using haptic technology could be a great benefit to veterinary technology programs around the globe. It is hoped that with further research and investigation veterinary educators around the globe can come together, collaborate, and create different forms of haptic technology to provide an educational experience like no other.

Dr. Staton and Dr. Boyd were members of the first Ed.D. cohort at MSU. It was during this time they found an interest in haptics and the impact it could have on training programs such as veterinary technology.

Dr. Staton is a member of the Kentucky Board of Veterinary Examiners, which was appointed by Gov. Matt Bevin.

In addition to being a licensed veterinary technologist, she also holds a doctorate of education, and her research interests include applying interactive virtual simulation to the

classroom, and implementing low-stress handling into academia and veterinary facilities. She teaches on courses related to animal husbandry, radiology and surgical nursing.

Dr. Staton has been with MSU since 2008.

In 2016, she was named as one of the top 40 veterinary technology professors in the U.S. by the educational blog Vet Tech Colleges.com.

Dr. McGhee, born in Kensington, Ohio, was the youngest of three children born to Curtis L. McGhee and Erma O. (Wright) McGhee. He graduated valedictorian of his class at Augusta High School in 1957, where he also played basketball and served as senior class president. He married Connie L. (George) McGhee in 1963 at First Presbyterian Church in Carrollton, Ohio. He earned Bachelor of Science and Masters' degrees in Education at Miami University (Oxford, Ohio). At Miami, he was student senate president, a leader in campus organizations, and a member of Sigma Phi Epsilon Fraternity.

He began his teaching career in Rich Township, Park Forest, Illinois, and his administration career as an assistant principal in Massillon, Ohio. He obtained his doctorate from Syracuse University. In 1969, Dr. McGhee moved to Morgantown, West Virginia, to become principal of University High School, with an appointment to West Virginia University as assistant professor. In 1973, he moved to full-time teaching duties as an associate professor at WVU. He lived in Morgantown, where he taught and raised his family, until 1983 when he moved to Morehead State University. For much of his career at MSU, Dr. McGhee divided his time between teaching and administrative duties. While living in Morehead, he was a volunteer and community leader who served as president of the Kiwanis and member of Faith Presbyterian Church.

Dr. McGhee is survived by his son, Lt. Col. Michael C. McGhee (Ret.) and wife Marianne, of Villa Hills; his son, Mark J. McGhee Esq. and wife Rita, of Charleston, West Virginia; his daughter, Melissa E. Clay and husband Charles T., of Barboursville, West Virginia; and four grandchildren, Caroline M. McGhee, Craig J. McGhee, Lilith M. McGhee, and Maura S. McGhee.

Visitation will be on Thursday, March 29, from 4 until 6 p.m. at Northcutt and Son Home for Funerals in Morehead, with a service to follow directly after visitation at 6 p.m.

A graveside ceremony will be held at the Westview Cemetery in Carrollton, Ohio, on Saturday, March 31, at 1 p.m.

Dr. Morrison has essay published

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University's Dr. Ronald D. Morrison, professor of English, has published an essay that explores connections between the country-rock band Blackberry Smoke and the poetry of William Wordsworth.

The essay titled "Wordsworth's 'Michael,' the Georgic, and Blackberry Smoke" appears in the volume Rock and Romanticism: Blake, Wordsworth, and Rock from Dylan to U2, edited by James Rovira and published by Lexington Books, an imprint of Rowman and Littlefield.

In the essay, Morrison focuses on the formal features of the georgic, a poem focused on agriculture, and he draws connections between William Wordsworth's famous poem and various songs in the catalog of Blackberry Smoke. While critical treatments of Romantic poetry tend to focus on the pastoral, which presents an idealized view of nature and rural values, contemporary critics have begun to examine the form of the georgic, which tends to describe in relatively realistic fashion the joys and hardships of rural life and rural culture. Morrison believes that his article tells us something about both Romantic poetry and contemporary music, particularly the genre of Southern Rock.

Morrison notes that rock music has many parallels to Romantic-era poetry. In fact, the Doors were named after a line in William Blake's "The Marriage of Heaven and Hell," and the last two U2 albums were named after collections of poetry by Blake as well: Songs of Innocence and Songs of Experience.

"I had a lot of fun with this project. I think it is important to show students that poetry from earlier ages can have a great deal in common with the contemporary world and contemporary art forms," said Morrison.

Morrison has been an MSU professor since 1988. He was awarded the University's Distinguished Research Award in 2004. He served as the University's faculty regent from 2008-14, and he is a former chair of the MSU Faculty Senate.

Dr. William Green receives Distinguished Political Scientist Award

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University's Dr. William C. Green, professor of government, received the Distinguished Political Scientist Award at the annual meeting of the Kentucky Political Science Association (KPSA).

Green becomes one of only 17 Kentucky political science faculty to receive the honor since its creation in 1987.

An MSU faculty member for the past 34 years, Green has received MSU's Distinguished Teaching Award, Distinguished Research Award and Internship Faculty of the Year Award for his recruitment and preparation of 66 MSU students, who have participated in the five-week Canadian Parliamentary Internship Program.

Green holds the J.D. degree from the University of Kentucky College of Law, a Ph.D. degree in Political Science from the State University of New York at Buffalo, and a Master of Arts degree in Political Science, a Bachelor of Science degree in Education and a Bachelor of Arts degree in History, cum laude, all from Kent State University.

Green's research explores constitutional and civil liberties issues and the legal dimensions of economic development, labor relations, language rights, and pharmaceutical drug policies. His publications include four books, five book chapters, 25 journal articles, and 44 encyclopedia essays. His most recent book, Contraceptive Risk: The FDA, Depo-Provera, and the Politics of Experimental Medicine, was published by New York University Press in 2017. He now has a contract with Lexington Books to write Free the Grapes: Granholm v. Heald, Boutique Wineries, and State Alcohol Beverage Regulation.

According to Dr. Jonathan Pidluzny, associate professor of government, students in Green's courses on Constitutional Law, Courts and Civil Liberties, Environmental Law and Policy, European Parliamentary Democracies, and Human Rights Law and Politics are active learners whom he challenges to think, write, and speak, necessary skills for success in law and graduate school. Outside the classroom, his best students develop their research skills as participants in MSU's Undergraduate Research Fellowship program. Pidluzny also noted that students that have taken Green's law and policy courses have told him that his courses have provided them with the skills essential for success in law school. As the Government program's law school advisor, throughout his tenure, he created Societas Pro Legibus, MSU's campus-based society for the study of law, authored the question-based How to Take the LSAT and Go to Law School, and advised students who have been admitted to nation's top ten percent of law schools and to the University of Vermont, the nation's top environmental law school.

Four 2017 Canadian Parliamentary Interns presented papers at the KPSA's meeting. They were Aaron Curnutte of Prestonsburg, Sarah Fink of Hollsopple, Pennsylvania, Thomas Little of Virgie, and William Razor of Mt. Sterling. Brandon Bryer of Scarborough, Maine, Byer, Undergraduate Research Fellow, also presented at the KPSA.

In Ottawa, the students work in the office of a Member of Parliament, attend committee meetings and House of Commons debates, and participate in the political life of the nation's capital city.

Students who become Canadian Parliamentary Interns begin their preparation with his course on North American Politics during which they write Canadian-focused research proposals. In Ottawa, the students conduct research for their papers and, upon their return, write and present papers at MSU's Celebration of Student Scholarship and the Kentucky Political Science Association's annual meetings.

Since 2004, the interns have received an MSU Canadian Studies Scholarship, which he created, to provide them with a total of \$50,000 in financial support.

McBrayer has served in numerous public service roles, including as a member of the University of Kentucky Board of Trustees, the Chandler Medical Center Board, eight years on the Kentucky Council on Higher Education, seven years as chairman of Kentucky Educational Television, Commissioner of the Kentucky Department of Commerce, chairman of the Kentucky Board of Tax Appeals, and chairman of the Greater Lexington Chamber of Commerce.

In honor of McBrayer's generous gift to the Presidential Scholarship Endowment, the annual lecture series will be created. The fund will be invested with the proceeds used to provide scholarships to MSU students. Each year, the University president, in consultation with the MSU Foundation CEO, will provide direction to the University scholarship committee as to the use of the funds for the priorities of aiding in recruitment, retention and degree completion.
