## Morehead Enrollment Reaches 651 With Registration Of 85 Students For Short Term

MSC Continues To  
Grow Despite  
World Situation

Final enrollment figures revealed that 85 teacher-students were added to the present enrollment at MSC, bringing the total number of students up to 651. (That explains the ever-lengthening "chow lines" in the cafeteria.) It is interesting to note that this year (taking into consideration the present situation) there were many more women students to register than there were men. The contrary has been true for the last several years.

From Michigan to Florida and East of the Mississippi, there are sixteen states represented at MSC. Thirty-eight of Kentucky's 102 counties are also represented, with Rowan, Carter, Johnson, Floyd, Magoffin and Bath counties in the lead.

That Morehead continues to grow despite the low-hanging war clouds may, in part, be attributed to the personal interest the faculty manifests toward their students; and the up-to-the-minute library that contains the latest books and periodicals enabling the student body to keep abreast of the times.

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## Morehead's Board To Pick Chief May 10

Four Men Announced,  
Hodgkins Assured

The board of regents of Morehead State College will meet May 10 to elect a new president for the institution. A vacancy was created since the death of Dr. W. J. Baird.

Boswell B. Hodgkin, State superintendent of public instruction, and Dr. Adron Doran, speaker of the Kentucky House of Representatives, Hodgkin said he has not received formal applications from them.

The board consists of M. K. Eshen, Hazard; James T. Norris, Ashland; Edwin R. "Jack" Potts, Mayville. All four are appointees of former Governor Elbert Clements.

Dr. Manning is on leave from his State-Government position as commissioner of finance. He was named to that post by Clements.

Doran was speaker of the House during the 1950 legislative session when the schoolteachers' lost their fight with Clements for an appropriation of \$34,500,000 for education. Doran, a former president of the Kentucky Education Association, aided with Clements during the school fight.

Also in the running are Dr. John W. Manning, director of the Office of Price Stabilization for Kentucky, and Dr. Adron Doran, speaker of the Kentucky House of Representatives. Hodgkin said he has not received formal applications from them.

M. 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# Colonel 'Sonny' Allen Proves Basketball Hero Of Airmen In Training At Lackland

## Morehead Player Slated To Join Personnel Athletic Staff At Base

(The following is taken from the April 13 issue of "Tallapoosa," an official newspaper of Lackland Air Force Base, San Antonio, Texas. Sonny Allen volunteered for the Air Force at the Morehead recruiting station, Main Building, Main Street.)

Col. John Edward Allen, Jr. will complete basic training this week.

Col. Allen doesn't want scrambled eggs on his fatigue cap, however, as the rank is an honorary title presented him last year by the governor of Kentucky.

His honor was presented on the basis of an illustrious basketball career that saw the Kentucky player, known as "Sonny," break records like match sticks.

Before coming into the Air Force, Sonny was playing with the crack Indianapolis "Olympians" basketball team on a full-time schedule. With teammates Al Gross, Ralph Beard and other crack players, Allen was merely displaying to the Midwest the great talents which Kentucky has.

Sonny won the first varsity basketball title in the nation by leading the Kentucky team to the Breckinridge High School, Morehead, Ky. Under the high school rules, the team was to play only one game, but the team won so easily that it was decided to play a second game.

Sonny himself was named captain of both the all-star and all-state teams, an unprecedented honor.

After the season, he was picked to play in the game which is considered to settle the national high school title, the Indiana All-Stars versus the Kentucky All-Stars, featuring the best from the two hotbeds of age athletes.

His impressive high school record behind him, he was approached by coaches from virtually every big-name basketball school in that area. Adolph Rupp, of Georgetown, wanted him, and the University of Illinois, among many others, sought the outstanding prospect.

Sonny elected however to go to school in his home town, Morehead State Teachers college, where he was a basketball player. He wanted to play pro baseball in the summers with the Brooklyn farm system. As the Gallo Valley Conference, of which Morehead is a member, does not insist on a strict pure record, he could play college ball with them.

With his basketball ability, incidentally, is eclipsed by his hardwood arms, but he is an excellent first baseman and was named MVP in the Class C Middle Atlantic League.

At Morehead, Sonny played another four years, giving him ten years of varsity basketball. He was captain of the team all

# Low Rate Student Travel To Europe, Now Being Offered

New York.—The lowest rate available for student travel to Europe this summer is now being offered by the Council on Travel, 53 Broadway, New York, it was announced today.

The Council on Travel, a group of people who wish to travel to Europe for educational purposes will be able to make the lowest rate available as \$115 one way, on two American-built C-54s, reserved by the Council on Travel, for summer travel. Each ship can accommodate 1350 students.

Since 1947 the Council has worked to make European summer travel available to students with limited budgets, and to prepare the students who go abroad for the various duties they will find in Europe. The Council offers a series of lectures, round-tables and discussions on European culture and the low student fare on the C-54s is made possible by the elimination of the various duties of ocean travel. During the nine-day Atlantic passage, the students will live in dormitories (fitted with clean, comfortable beds) and will be served by the ship's crew. Students will be responsible for making up their beds each day. Meals will be served cafeteria style.

Everything essential for the comfort and welfare of the passengers will be available on the ship. There will be a full medical staff, a nurse, a dentist, a pharmacist, a chef, a stewardess, and a crew of 100. The ship will be converted into a floating hotel, and the crew will be responsible for making up their beds each day. Meals will be served cafeteria style.
