Grad School Online Open House to be held Aug. 9

MSU's Graduate School will hold an online open house from 2 to 5 p.m. on Thursday, Aug. 9.

The online event will give those interested in continuing their education at MSU an opportunity to chat with Graduate School advisors, and those who attend the event will receive a promotional code to waive the \$30 application fee.

Dr. Susan Maxey, director of graduate programs, says the event will give students a chance to explore all the options available at MSU.

"MSU offers 74 graduate degree programs and 41 graduate level non-degree programs, of those, 25 are totally online. Staff will be available to answer questions about those programs in addition to more information about the graduate assistant qualifications, program admission and credentialing," Maxey said.

According to the National Census Bureau, people with graduate degrees earn an average of 30 percent more than those who only have undergraduate degrees. In addition, earning a graduate degree provides increased opportunities for professional networking, hands-on experience and in-depth learning.

Late MSU professor establishes endowment for Eagle English students

The late Dr. Rose Orlich spent 22 years as a professor of English at Morehead State University. She will continue to add to her legacy of impacting the lives of MSU English students with the establishment of the Dr. Rose Orlich Scholarship Endowment.

"The MSU Foundation is honored that Dr. Orlich chose to support scholarships for MSU students through her estate plans," said Jim Shaw, vice president for University Advancement and CEO of the MSU Foundation. "These scholarships will support students in the English department for generations to come."

A native of Kansas City, Kansas, Orlich taught for more than 42 years at various levels in both the private sector and higher education. She joined MSU in 1970 and taught undergraduate and graduate-level courses in literature and writing, as well as for the MSU Honors Program. She was also an award-winning poet with two published books of poetry. She retired from the University as professor emerita in 1992 with the Distinguished Teacher Award. She passed away in March 2016 at the age of 88.

Orlich's scholarship was agreed upon between the executor to Orlich's estate, Paul Stokes, and the MSU Foundation, Inc. Recipients of the scholarship will be financially eligible, full-time undergraduate students majoring in English who have maintained a cumulative GPA of 3.0 or higher. It is renewable until the recipient's fourth year of undergraduate study if the required GPA and full-time status are maintained.

Kathryn Mincey (73, 74), a former student, graduate assistant and later colleague of Orlich's as a professor of English at MSU, said establishing this scholarship endowment was a gesture that reflected Orlich's heart for MSU and the people the institution serves.

"Her credentials were without question, but it was her moral character," Mincey said. "She was one of the few people that, as I was coming up, was the conscience of the Department of English. Keeping our values where they should be...serving students first."

MSU hosts SpaceTrek

Morehead State University welcomed 23 girls to campus July 6-14 for SpaceTrek, an annual residential summer camp that encourages young women to explore science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) fields.

The camp was open to girls entering their sophomore year of high school with interests in space science and engineering. It is a collaborative effort between MSU's Craft Academy for Excellence in Science and Mathematics, the MSU Space Science Center and the American Association of University Women (AAUW).

Participants in the camp worked in teams to build a small satellite, attach it to a large helium balloon and launch it from the roof of the Space Science Center. They then operated a portable satellite tracking station to collect temperature data being transmitted by the satellite. After the launch the participants interpreted data, made conclusions and presented their findings.

Kentucky Secretary of State Alison Lundergan Grimes visited the camp to participate in an atmospheric mission and launch a weather balloon equipped with a CricketSat to measure the temperature of the atmosphere. She also declared participants in this year's camp Kentucky Ambassadors and made an educational donation of SpaceTrek toolboxes for each camper.

Kentucky House Minority Floor Leader and MSU alumnus Rep. Rocky Adkins visited the camp on Thursday, July 12, and spoke to participants about the importance of STEM education.

Twyman Clements, co-founder and CEO of SpaceTango in Lexington, sponsored the CricketSat mission.

MSU students intern in Canadian Parliament, meet Prime Minister Trudeau

Three Morehead State University Political Science majors, Emily Ball of Morehead, Colby Birkes of Winchester, and Hanna Stettner of Worthington, recently completed internships in the Canadian Parliament in Ottawa, Canada.

Each student was assigned to a Member of Parliament (M.P.) based on their academic policy interests. Ball interned for M.P. Ruby Sahota, a Liberal Party member representing Ontario. Stettner served in the office of M.P. Jenny Kwan, a New Democratic Party member representing British Columbia. Birkes interned for M.P. Judy Sgro, a Liberal Party member from Ontario.

The students lived at the University of Ottawa during their time in Canada and participated in a wide variety of parliamentary activities during their five-week internship. This year, they met the leaders of their M.P.'s political parties, attended House of Commons committee hearings and assisted in the drafting their M.P.s' House of Commons speeches, communications to their constituents and statements to the Canadian press.

The students met Prime Minister Justin Trudeau, other Canadian party leaders and foreign diplomats and dignitaries, including Ambassador Kelly Craft, the U.S. Ambassador to Canada and President Emanuel Macron of France, who was attending the G-7 world economic summit.

The students prepared for their internships by taking POLS 336, North American Politics: United States and Canada. They also wrote research proposals under the mentorship of Dr. William Green, MSU professor of government, who has recruited and prepared 69 MSU students for the Canadian Parliamentary Internship Program since 2000.

While in Canada, the students had a unique undergraduate experience. They used their research proposals to conduct interviews of public officials and collect primary documents. In the Fall 2018 semester they will write papers based on their Canadian research and present them at MSU's 2019 Celebration of Student Scholarship and the Kentucky Political Science Association's 2019 annual meeting.

Neeper, Nelson and Russell take on new roles at MSU

Morehead State University has announced several administrative changes to both the Elmer R. Smith College of Business and Technology and the Caudill College for Arts, Humanities and Social Sciences.

Dr. Greg Russell, formerly the associate dean for the School of Business Administration, will now serve as interim dean for the College of Business and Technology. He has replaced former interim dean Dr. Bob Albert, who succeeded Dr. Steven Ralston to serve as interim provost and vice president for Academic Affairs. Russell's new role comes after he has spent the past 14 years with MSU, where he has specialized in teaching operations management, quality management, management and quantitative methods.

Dr. Johnathan Nelson, formerly assistant professor of management, is the new interim associate dean for the School of Business Administration, succeeding Russell. Nelson had previously served as assistant professor of management at MSU and teaches courses at both the undergraduate and graduate levels on organizational behavior.

Dr. Layne Neeper has been named interim associate dean for the School of English, Communication, Media and Languages. His role prior to this position was as a professor of English, where he taught courses in 19th and 20th century American literature.

RSVP receives CNCS grant

Morehead State's Retired Senior Volunteer Program (RSVP) was recently awarded a federal grant for \$125,000 to expand the program's efforts to combat childhood obesity and the opioid epidemic.

The grant was provided by the Corporation for National and Community Service (CNCS) and funds a three-year project aimed at combating childhood obesity and opioid abuse education and prevention efforts. RSVP is starting its second year of the program.

Teresa Judd, RSVP director, said the funds will be used for training and placement of 100 volunteers in the FIVCO Area Development District, which includes Boyd, Carter, Elliott, Lawrence and Greenup counties.

To combat childhood obesity, RSVP volunteers will work to improve access to nutritious foods by working in food banks and pantries. For the opioid education and prevention component, volunteers will be placed in elementary and middle schools, where they will tutor students and assist in administering evidence-based substance abuse prevention programs. RSVP will train the volunteers and provide them with the tools they need to help administer the curriculum.

"The extra attention RSVP volunteers are able to provide a child can make a huge impact on the child's education," Judd said. "Evidence-based substance abuse prevention programs allow children to learn about making better life choices, as well as provide them with different refusal strategies for avoiding drugs and alcohol. RSVP volunteers receive the satisfaction of knowing they are making a difference in people's lives whether tutoring a child, helping in a food pantry or helping with a substance abuse program."

Six Eagles to be inducted into Halls of Fame at 2018 Homecoming

At MSU Homecoming this fall, six more illustrious Eagle alumni will be inducted into both the Alumni and Athletics Hall of Fame. This year's Alumni Hall of Fame nominees have found success in the medical field, in business and on the basketball court while Athletic Hall of Fame honorees have made their mark in sports like football, men's golf and women's cross country and track and field.

Ronald Cartee (65) is the co-founder and president/CEO of Cartee Land Development. Originally from Greenup County, Cartee's company, co-founded with his wife, Diane, first began building housing subdivisions in 1975 in Portsmouth, Ohio. He went on to build his first Arby's restaurant in 1990, one of 26 Arby's restaurants in Ohio, Kentucky and West Virginia.

Cartee has earned multiple awards from Arby's Inc., including Developer of the Year on two occasions and the President's Award, the most distinguished national award given by Arby's Inc., to honor lifetime achievement and success in the Arby's system worldwide. He and his companies have long been a charitable partner with local communities and have partnered with Arby's Inc. and Big Brothers/Big Sisters and No Child Hungry campaigns, raising over \$500,000 for each.

Julie Riffe (76) is a nurse practitioner with the Huntington Internal Medicine Group and director of Tri-State Medical Missions, both in Huntington, West Virginia. Originally from Barboursville, West Virginia, Riffe has served in the medical field for almost three decades with a focus on women's health.

Riffe has served as team leader for multiple medical mission trips including earthquake relief efforts in Haiti in 2010, Ecuador and tsunami relief efforts in South India in 2005. She has also served as a professional speaker for the March of Dimes on domestic violence and has spoken at numerous events on women's health issues. When Riffe was at MSU from 1974 to 1978, she was the first woman to run women's track and field and was the first woman to qualify for the NCAA track and field championships.

Robert Kelly Wells (95) is the head men's basketball coach at the University of Pikeville in his hometown of Pikeville. He was also recently named the school's Director of Athletics. He is the all-time winningest coach in program history with a 257-96 (.728) overall and 109-55 (.665) Mid-South Conference record. His basketball squad also won the 2010-11 NAIA National Championship and he was honored that same year with the 2010-11 Rawlings NAIA Division I National Coach of the Year. Prior to that, he held positions from 2004 to 2006 at

Hawaii Pacific University in Honolulu as assistant men's basketball coach, assistant director of athletics and head men's basketball coach.

Wells played three years with MSU Men's Basketball from 1992 to 1994, where he scored over 450 points and was named 1993-94 Academic All-OVC Conference. He went on to earn a Bachelor of Business Administration from MSU in 1995 and a Master of Arts in Education in 2001.

Athletic Hall of Fame

Nick Atzinger (03) was a five-time individual tournament champion during his MSU Golf career. He was also a member of the 1999 OVC Championship team and the All-OVC Tournament Team in 2001 and 2002.

Atzinger also placed runner-up at the 2001 OVC Tournament, shooting a tournament total of 208 and finishing just one shot behind the OVC Tournament champion.

David Hyland (09) played defensive back for Morehead State from 2005 to 2008. He is a three-time All-PFL selection (2006, 2007, 2008) and was recognized as a Sports Network Mid-Major All-American and Football Gazette Mid-Major All-American in 2007. Hyland holds the MSU record for career interceptions (21), the school record for longest interception return with 100 yards and, until 2015, held the single-season record for interceptions in a season (8).

Hyland finished his career with 167 tackles and a then FCS-record 61 pass break-ups, as well as 12 receptions for 155 yards on offense. He followed his MSU football career with a stellar career in the Arena Football League, winning ArenaBowl XXVIII with the San Jose Sabercats in 2015 and was named Defensive Player and Player of the Game. Hyland has also earned accolades for giving back off the field, and was named the 2015 A1 Lucas AFL Pulse Hero Award winner for his community service work.

Karen Lutes (04) was a 14-time All-OVC selection in track and field. She was named the OVC Cross Country Runner of the Year in 2001 and the OVC Athlete of the Year in 2000 and 2003 for indoor track. She was named First-Team All-OVC in cross country in 2001 and Second-Team All-OVC in 2000 and 2003.

Lutes helped lead the 2000 MSU Cross Country Team to the OVC title while winning 11 individual OVC Championships in track and field. She was a five-time OVC Runner of the Week winner in 2000 and 2001, as well as earning All-OVC honors in track and field 10 times. Lutes won the 5,000-meter run at the OVC Championships in 2000, 2001 and 2003 in indoor track and the 3,000-meter run in indoor track in 2000 and 2003. She also racked up academic honors and was named to the OVC Commissioner's Honor Roll three times (1999-00, 2002-03, 2003-04).

Inductees into the Alumni and Athletic Halls of Fame – along with the recipient of the 2018 Founders Award for University Service – will be recognized during a banquet on Friday, Oct. 19, at 7 p.m. at the Morehead Conference Center.
