#### MSU among 42 teacher prep programs recognized for national excellence in educator prep

The Council for the Accreditation of Educator Preparation (CAEP) recently announced that Morehead State is one of 42 providers from 23 states and the District of Columbia to receive accreditation for educator preparation programs.

The spring 2019 review by the CAEP <u>Accreditation Council</u> resulted in 42 newly-accredited EPPs, bringing the total to 238 providers approved under the CAEP <u>Teacher Preparation Standards</u> – rigorous, nationally recognized standards that were developed to ensure excellence in educator preparation programs.

"Accreditation is important because it helps the University to meet or exceed the established quality standards for teacher preparation ensuring the best possible preparation for those entering the teaching field. It also helps the institution to be on an equal setting addressing quality standards with other institutions in the state," said Dr. Christopher Miller, dean of the College of Education.

"The accreditation process pushes the educator preparation programs beyond what we might already be doing to focus on new ways of enhancing our programs as well as expanding our partnerships with school districts. The changes that are made based on the accreditation process benefit the students because of the enhancements continually made to the programs to address today's education needs."

"These institutions meet high standards so that their students receive an education that prepares them to succeed in a diverse range of classrooms after they graduate," said CAEP President Dr. Christopher A. Koch. "Seeking CAEP Accreditation is a significant commitment on the part of an educator preparation provider."

CAEP is the sole nationally recognized accrediting body for educator preparation. It was created by the consolidation of the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education (NCATE) and the Teacher Education Accreditation Council (TEAC). It is a unified accreditation system intent on raising the performance of all institutions focused on educator preparation. Approximately, 800 educator preparation providers participate in the CAEP Accreditation system, including some previously accredited through former standards.

Accreditation lasts seven years and MSU's next site visit will be in 2025. MSU was previously accredited through National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education (NCATE,) an accreditation it maintained for more than 20 years.

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### **INSIGHT camp set for June 8-15**

INSIGHT, a postsecondary preparation program for high school students who are blind or visually impaired, will be held on the Morehead State University campus June 8-15.

In its 13th year, the program is a collaboration between MSU, Kentucky Office for the Blind, Kentucky School for the Blind (KSB), Kentucky Education Development Corporation (KEDC) and the KSB Charitable Foundation. Nineteen students are expected to attend the camp this year.

The program is offered to students who have completed the 10th, 11th or 12th grade and is designed to give them a real-world college experience, including living in a residence hall, attending academic classes and practicing orientation and mobility skills in a campus environment.

"Its sponsors have consistently chosen us since the program's inception," said Evangeline Day, MSU disability services coordinator. "The size, terrain and location of our campus are all factors. As a side effect of having a positive experience here, a number of the attendees choose to pursue their education here."

Although several INSIGHT alumni have enrolled at MSU, what students learn through the program are highly transferrable college skills that will support success at any postsecondary institution, and Day said the camp is not a recruitment tool for the University. However, one benefit of hosting the camp is that the University receives suggestions from participants on how physical accessibility on campus can be improved.

Day said she draws a great deal of satisfaction from her work with the INSIGHT Camp.

"INSIGHT's staff and agenda have made it the most personally rewarding program I've been a part of in my role as the disability services coordinator," she said.

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#### MSU welcomes UB students to campus

Morehead State welcomes hundreds of high school students to campus June 5 to July 5 for its 53rd annual Upward Bound (UB) summer programs.

MSU UB has two distinct programs, UB Classic and UB Math and Science, serving more than 225 students in 16 Eastern Kentucky counties including Bath, Boyd, Carter, Elliott, Fleming, Harrison, Johnson, Lawrence, Lewis, Magoffin, Mason, Menifee, Montgomery, Morgan, Nicholas, Robertson and Rowan.

The programs seek to engage low-income and potential first-generation college students and equip them with the skills to prepare them for college.

"The goal is to help these underrepresented students get accepted into and be successful in postsecondary education," said UB executive Director Amanda Lewis. "Currently the Upward Bound programs at MSU have an overall 98% postsecondary education enrollment rate for low income and first-generation college students. Of the 1,000 programs nationwide, the programs at MSU are one of the four largest."

The programs offer instruction in math, laboratory sciences, composition, literature, financial literacy, college and career prep, and foreign languages. Participants also receive information on the college admissions process, scholarships, receive tutoring, counseling, mentoring, cultural enrichment trips, exposure to science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) and internships. Students who are involved in the program spend four weeks on MSU's campus each summer for a residential summer academy where they attend classes, go on college visits, attend cultural events and are exposed to college life.

"It is incredibly important as a first-generation student to learn what to expect or how to navigate higher education," said Shayla Ring, UB academic bridge coordinator. "We simulate the college experience during our Summer Academy and continue throughout the academic year, providing assistance with scholarship and financial aid searches, going on college tours, providing cultural and social trips, and conducting ACT prep. We also have speakers that highlight money and time management, as well as numerous other lessons to support their success in higher education."

In order to qualify for Upward Bound, students must apply to the program, write an admissions essay and be interviewed by UB staff.

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#### Scholarship established in memory of Nelson Phillips

The Morehead State University Foundation has announced the establishment of the Toney Nelson Phillips Geology Scholarship. The fund was established in honor of Toney Nelson Phillips (83), or "Nelson" to his former professor and advisor Charlie Mason (75), as well as his family and friends.

Phillips first graduated from Morehead State University in 1983 with his Bachelor of Arts in Government and a minor in history. Upon completing his degree, he began work as a manager at Pasquales Italian Shop, a popular Italian restaurant on Main Street in Morehead. After working there for some time, he continued his education and enrolled in a geology night class. He enjoyed the course so much that decided to leave his job and become a full-time student again at MSU to pursue a degree in geology. During his time as a geology major, he took every class and opportunity to learn about the field of geology, as well as supplementary courses in math, physics and chemistry. He became a fixture in Lappin Hall.

Phillips was noted to be a very positive person, always encouraging other students to do their best and was well liked by the professors in his department and Lappin Hall. He graduated with his second degree from MSU in 2016, a Bachelor of Science in Earth Systems – Geology with a minor in mathematics and continued to take upper division math and physics courses to better prepare for his graduate work. He accepted a position with Raptor Consulting in Pennsylvania. Before he was able to start his new career and utilize his new degree, he unexpectedly passed away in the fall of 2018. To honor his love for geology, his former professor Charlie Mason, along with his sister Cynthia, created this scholarship in his memory.

"Nelson's positive attitude and love for the field of geology was contagious," said Charlie Mason, professor of geology. "I hope everyone who knew Nelson will make a gift to this fund in his memory. I believe he would be honored to have a geology scholarship awarded in his name every year and I am excited to help make that happen."

Students who have declared geology as their major will be eligible to apply for the scholarship. Preference will be given to nontraditional students from the MSU service region.

#### Board of Regents holds quarterly meeting

The quarterly meeting of the Morehead State University Board of Regents was held Thursday, June 6, at 9:30 a.m., in room 329 of the Adron Doran University Center (ADUC).

Prior to the meeting, there was a meeting of the audit committee at 9 a.m. The committee approved retaining the University's external auditing firm and the minimal scope of the annual audit. The committee also heard a report from internal auditor Joe Hunsucker.

Following the audit committee meeting, the full board meeting took place. President Jay Morgan and the board recognized Dr. Lisa Shannon, associate professor of social work; Barry Cox, HVAC technician; and Andrew Sexton of Clearfield, vice president for campus involvement for the Student Government Association (SGA), for their outstanding leadership, service and dedication to the University. Also recognized were outgoing board members, Faculty Regent Dr. Jonathan Pidluzny, associate professor of government, and Student Regent Brandon Bryer, outgoing Student Government Association president.

The Board of Regents appointed Dr. Jacqueline Graves as secretary and reappointed Teresa Lindgren as treasurer. They voted to approve the University organizational chart and operating budget of approximately \$140 million for the 2019-20 academic year. The regents also approved four faculty promotions to professor as well a one-time employee supplemental compensation.

In other business, the board approved a one-year contract extension for President Joseph A. (Jay) Morgan. His contract will now run through 2023.

The next meeting of the Board of Regents is scheduled for Thursday, August 8, 2019.

### MSU once again hosts Kentucky Governor's Scholars Program

Morehead State University will continue serving as a host campus for the Kentucky Governor's Scholars Program (GSP).

Last year, MSU was awarded a three-year contract (2019-21) to continue serving as a host campus for the program. MSU first hosted GSP in 2006 and this year will be the eighth year the University has hosted GSP. Of the three universities that currently host GSP (others include Bellarmine University and Centre College), MSU is the only public university to host the program.

The 339 scholars arrive on campus Saturday, June 22, with numerous activities planned throughout their five-week stay. GSP will conclude with a closing ceremony on Friday, July 26.

"GSP tries to give students an experience in a region other than where they live every day," said Melisa Patrick, coordinator of GSP and student services and outreach coordinator for the Office of Regional Education and Outreach. "It is a great opportunity to show what is special about Eastern Kentucky – our culture, resources, strengths and challenges – and particularly what Morehead State has to offer."

The Governor's Scholars Program is a residential summer program for outstanding Kentucky students who have completed their junior year in high school. Established in 1983, the program provides academic and personal growth in a challenging, nontraditional environment that balances a strong liberal arts program with a full co-curricular and residential life experience. Students who attend GSP must complete an application and compete with others from across the state. Those selected attend the program free of charge.

"MSU wants to be considered a forward-thinking university. We want to recruit students who will think outside of the box for solutions to regional and global challenges, cutting edge technology, creative arts and cultural diversity," Patrick said. "We hope to attract more students who will be intent on completing their education in a timely manner and who will encourage those around them to do the same. Hosting GSP is an opportunity to connect with those type of students en masse in, what we hope, is, an effective manner."

#### MSN program earns accreditation from CCNE

Morehead State's newest nursing program has earned accreditation from the Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education (CCNE).

MSU's Master of Science in Nursing-Family Nurse Practitioner with a Primary Care focus earned accreditation through CCNE following a site visit and evaluation by CCNE officials on September 24, 2018. The next site visit and evaluation are scheduled for September 2023. The accreditation will remain in effect until June 30, 2024, and the renewal process will occur every ten years. The commission voted to give MSU's MSN program accreditation at its annual meeting in May.

Dr. Lynn Parsons, chair of the MSU Department of Nursing, said the program had to meet four major CCNE standards to receive accreditation: mission and governance, institutional commitment and resources, curriculum and teaching-learning practices and assessment and achievement of program outcomes. Students graduating from accredited advanced practice registered nurse (APRN) programs transition more easily into doctoral degree programs.

"Additional Family Nurse Practitioners (FNP) will augment health providers in the area and help manage ongoing health issues while simultaneously providing health promotion, patient and family education and disease prevention measures," said Parsons. "The MSU APRN program anticipates graduating its first class in December 2019. Citizens of the Eastern Kentucky region will benefit by having additional APRN providers in rural, underserved, low socio-economic areas. Many people in our service region have chronic health issues, such as diabetes and hypertension. Additional FNPs will be a welcome addition to the provision of primary care for our citizens."

### Nepalese student Satyam Shrivastav is making friends while realizing his dreams at MSU

Growing up in the Biratnagar, Province No.1, Nepal, Satyam Shrivastav was intent on succeeding anywhere. But from a very early age, he had specific academic goals that were far away from his home country.

"America is considered the most developed country by Nepalese people. When I was a kid, every time I had gone to get blessings from my grandparents, they would bless me to get an American degree," Satyam said. "I have always wanted to get an American degree since then."

When the time came for Shrivastav to decide on where to pursue his college education, his passion and skills for computer science and mathematics led him to travel from the warm flatlands of Nepal's Terai region to the rolling hills of Appalachia to attend college at Morehead State University.

Shrivastav is a sophomore majoring in computer and information systems with a focus on network security. His childhood aspirations directed him to MSU and its space science program, but he soon realized he wanted to use his talents to benefit his homeland.

"When I was a kid, I wanted to be a space engineer, but later I figured out that computer science was perfect for me when I realized that space engineer doesn't have so much scope and computer science needs a lot of development in Nepal," he said.

Since coming to America and spending his freshman year at MSU, Shrivastav was pleased at the kindness of the campus community and the city of Morehead, whether it was seeing cars yield to pedestrians ("Pedestrians have to yield to cars there," he said.) or random strangers saying "hello." He has encountered incredibly supportive students at the Baptist Campus Ministry (BCM) that took him to nearby Lockegee Rock to go hiking. He also fondly recalls a friend who let her borrow her car so Shrivastav could take his test to get his driver's license and was as enthusiastic for his achievement as he was.

In addition to his American friends, he has also made international connections by joining the International Peer Mentoring Program (IPMP), where he has met other MSU students from China, India, Pakistan and Saudi Arabia.

"Honestly, I was really terrible at making friends back in Nepal," he said. "Now, I have a new friend every couple of days."

On the way to earning his degree from MSU, Shrivastav would ideally like to intern for companies like AT&T and Cisco Systems to gain experience he hopes he can take back to Nepal to improve the security of his

country's networks. In the meantime, he is gaining confidence, responsibility and independence along with his education at a place he has already grown to love.

"Choosing Morehead State University was one of the biggest and best decisions made by me so far," he said.

- Camden-Carroll Library, Bridget Whitt, librarian for distance education and dual credit.

After lunch at the Rocky Adkins Dining Complex, the afternoon featured faculty breakout groups, meetings with school officials from participating high schools and a presentation on plagiarism. Campus tours were offered for those who requested them.

Pace said it was important for teachers to attend the meeting because it helped them learn about curriculum changes within their academic departments, remain up to date on administrative processes and meet other Eagle Scholar teachers from across the state.

"This is the one time each year we ask them to come to Morehead State," Pace said. "It also allows MSU to showcase new programs and facilities and to allow students to demonstrate college level learning by completing college courses."

### **MSU Prestonsburg hosts Kentucky Reading Project**

The Kentucky Reading Project (KRP) held one of its statewide institutes at Morehead State University at Prestonsburg, June 12 through June 20. Nearly 50 local educators participated in the event.

KRP is a professional development initiative of the Collaborative Center for Literacy Development. The yearlong, graduate-level literacy course consists of a two-week intensive summer institute, four follow-up sessions during the year, and at least one coaching visit to each teacher.

Supervising the Prestonsburg training were Dr. Becky Roach, Kentucky Educational Development Corporation associate director; Sarah Kelsey, Greenup County School District third-grade teacher; and Debra Craver, a retired teacher.

Eight Kentucky universities serve as sites for KRP and university literacy faculty serve as directors of KRP. Training specialists from the National Center for Families Learning provide information, resources and support regarding family engagement in literacy.

Participants took part in both Striving Readers Comprehensive Literacy (SRCL), and Kentucky Read to Achieve (KY RTA) programs.

Teachers in both programs attended training where they learned about research-based reading strategies, differentiated instruction, management of the reading classroom, and student conferences. The groups will return for follow-up sessions in September and March and present at a statewide conference in Louisville in April 2020.

During KRP, teachers learn best practices in literacy instruction while participating in a professional learning community that positions them for leadership roles in their school, district and the state. They increase their effectiveness as teachers by expanding their knowledge base and deepening their understanding of best practices in literacy instruction as they develop and implement a Literacy Action Plan in their classrooms.

### MSU students intern at KGS

Two geology students from Morehead State are gaining essential career skills this summer by interning at the Kentucky Geological Survey (KGS).

Ashton Killen, a senior from Proctorville, Ohio, and Russel Rogers, a sophomore from Calais, Maine, are each working on unique projects at KGS.

Killen is working with Matt Crawford, a landslide researcher with KGS, on a federally funded project involving landslides in the Big Sandy Area Development District. She first met Crawford, and KGS Director Bill Haneburg, at last year's annual conference of the American Geological Society. Killen began her work with Crawford in January of this year, using the data she collected in Magoffin County for her senior capstone project. She works in the KGS Digital Earth Analysis Lab (DEAL), where she is working to create digitized maps of landslides in Magoffin County. She said the things she's learning through the internship will be invaluable once she enters the workforce.

"I am learning how to use ArcGIS and ArcMap, which is the future of mapping. It is a program made by Esri and is extremely vital to be fluent in after I graduate. I am also learning how to make different types of maps within ArcMap," she said.

Rogers first started college with aspirations of going to medical school, enrolling at the University of Southern Maine and majoring in biology. Realizing that wasn't the right path for him, Rogers came to MSU and started as an astrophysics major but changed his major to geology and earth systems science because of his fascination with rocks and the formation of the Earth. Killen encouraged Rogers to apply for the internship at KGS. Rogers is now working with KGS Seismologist Seth Carpenter to investigate the causes of seismic waves. His work involves characterizing seismic waves from the instruments in the temporary Eastern Kentucky Microseismic Monitoring Network to determine which recordings are from natural events and which are blasts.

Students collaborated with professionals from Morehead State Public Radio, Morehead State's convergent media program and the MSU student newspaper, The Trail Blazer. Camp participants learned about how to collect news and interview subjects, how to operate cameras and how to edit audio and video, among other skills necessary in the field of journalism.

"Overall, journalism is about facts. Period. If you read it on your phone, your laptop or your watch, the basic tenants of journalism won't change," said John Flavell, MSU instructor of journalism. "I hope the students were encouraged and enlightened that journalism isn't about the derisive politics of our time. It's about storytelling. I wanted them to learn how to keep it simple. Learn how a story should flow."

Participants in the camp worked with Flavell to shoot footage for his upcoming KET documentary featuring Raymond McLain, director of the Kentucky Center for Traditional Music. They also worked with Leeann Akers, news director at Morehead State Public Radio, to produce an audio story for broadcast. The students also collaborated on an article published in the Ashland Daily Independent newspaper.

Retired MSPR News Director Chuck Mraz spoke to the campers about his career as a journalist, and current student and MSPR staffer Chas Jenkins of Morehead taught the students about podcasting.

Dr. Deanna Mascle, director of the MWP and instructor of English at MSU, organized the camp. Mascle said the camp could not have happened without the support of departments and offices across campus.

"We are so lucky at Morehead State to have a really amazing convergent media program - the faculty and staff and students produce outstanding work and we were fortunate to have several people support our camp this week and give our campers a unique experience," she said. "We were also able to make this camp a residential experience thanks to outstanding work from the Office of Conference and Event Services, dining services and housing. It was an intense week, but we could accomplish so much in a short amount of time because we were able to live and eat on campus as a group."

Twelve students attended the camp, and Mascle said some expressed interest in enrolling in MSU's convergent media program.
