# New Student Council Officers Inaugurated in Convocation

Public Ceremony Held This Year For First Time

The newly-elected 1953-54 officers of the Student Council were inaugurated in a special ceremony, the first of its kind in the history of the college, during convocation last Thursday morning. The new officers are Don Sam Thompson, president; Hugh Stumbo, vice president; George Ann Barker, secretary; Betty Rae Maude, treasurer; and Clinton Hickman, reporter.

The program, arranged by Council members, was a candle-lighting ceremony with both incoming and incumbent officers participating. A rostrum, flanked on each side by tall candelabra, was placed in the front center of the stage. This year's officers were seated on the sides of the stage to the audience's left, and the newly-elected officers sat on the other side. The candelabra, which stood on the left held six candles, one lighted.

Among the speaking officers, from resident through reporter, took a candle from the holder, lighted it, and presented it to the audience after charging him with the duties of the office. The incoming officers then placed his candle in the candelabrum on the right.

## Students Now Eligible For Marine OCS

All undergraduate men, including seniors about to graduate, are eligible to apply for one of two Marine Corps officer training programs, according to a recent announcement by the Officer Procurement office in Cincinnati. Marines offer a ROTC plan for freshmen, sophomores, and juniors, or an Officer Candidate course for men who have graduated or are about to complete their college work.

The lowerclassmen can apply now for the Marine Corps Platoon Leaders Class, and upon completion of this program and graduation from college, become eligible for commissioning as second lieutenants.

Men who are graduating from college this spring, and who are subject to service immediately under Selective Training and Service Act, are eligible to apply for the Officer Candidate course which will convene July 10 at the Marine Corps School in Quantico, Va. The course leads to a commission as second lieutenant in the reserve.

Capitals of the most arresting of the types in Mrs. Rabourn's collection is the hand-blown "candle" glass, which consists of several layers of differently colored glass, hand-carved through the layers to reveal patterns in the different colors. Other types of this period included American Art Glass, which was originally created in 1892 for 12 dollars a dozen for lumberjacks, and required not only lead glass in the formula. Intricate lattice patterns which required the utmost in skill and patience and a great deftness in working the hot glass, are to be found in the collection.

Agata, which has shades from raspberry rose to lighter tones in a mottled effect, and which some authorities believe was the result of an accident in the mixing of one "batch," is very rare; there may not have been more than 100 pieces manufactured at one time.

Unusual Types Included. Also included in Mrs. Rabourn's collection are samples of Mother-of-Pearl Satin, an opaque clear glass with three layers blown in molds; Peachblow; Vasa Murina, which has a middle layer of spangled glass; the effect produced by flakes of mica surrounded by clear glass on the outside and white on the inside; enameled glass; and Silver Inlay, which is a multi-layered glass of white ivory with real silver florals which appear to be inlaid.

Mrs. Rabourn, who has been a Carter County resident all her life, who previously taught in elementary schools in the county, was a student this semester in geography at Olive Hill. She previously attended Morehead for two years, and plans to return this summer to complete her major in history or social sciences.

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## Charles Apel Wins Fulbright Award For Study In France

Charles T. Apel, graduating senior, has been awarded a Fulbright scholarship to the University of Grenoble, Grenoble, France. It was announced last week.

The scholarship, first Fulbright to be granted a Merceus student, was one of three awarded to Kentucky students this year. The three award recipients were selected from 181 applications submitted by Kentucky students. Obtained through the Kentucky Committee on Fulbright Scholarships, Mr. Apel's award included travel expenses to and from Grenoble, tuition, books and incidentals, and a separate cash amount for maintenance.

Mr. Apel, a science major at Morehead, will continue work in the same field at Grenoble. Further preparation for his studies he has taken at Morehead.

His work at the University of Grenoble, to commence in October, will be preceded by a month's orientation program in Paris.
