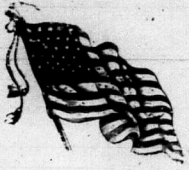

## Enrollment Ai M. S. T. C. Up For Summer

Enrollment of students at Morehead State Teachers College totaled more than at noon Wednesday, and with the closing of registration next Monday according to Dr. William H. Vaughan, president of the college. The total number of students in attendance at Morehead for the first term of the summer quarter will definitely exceed the enrollment of last summer. Dr. Vaughan said, the present term will cover five and one-half weeks and, according to his expectations, the total enrollment will be at least 350 before the closing of registration next Monday. Several classes will continue over the two periods, but most of them can be completed in one five and one-half weeks term. Especially significant in the Wednesday enrollment figures was the fact that a students registering for the summer work are attending to qualify for emergency teaching certificates necessitated by Kentucky's wartime teachers crisis. Morehead State Teachers College is also operating three area workshops in Salsyville, Paintsville, and Greenup, to meet the needs of teachers serving in those vicinities.

As President Roosevelt in his proclamation, declaring June 14 as "Flag Day," said, "it is the duty of the people of the United States to purchase War Bonds and Stamps as a tribute to our flag and as an expression of their devotion to the United States." The National Council of the United States Flag Association is headed by Secretary of War Stimson as Chairman, Secretary of the Treasury Morgenthau and Secretary of the Navy Knox as Co-Chairmen and Walker D. Fuller, of Philadelphia, as Executive Chairman.

All expire June 30. **COFFEE:** Stamp 24 good for 1 pound through June 20. **SUGAR:** Stamp 13 good for 5 pounds and 16 good for 5 pounds of canned sugar, obtainable on or after June 15. Additional stamps for application to Local Board. Those on the other hand who believe in a collective society, whether it be under the rule of the State or of a Dictator - not that I have ever been able to see any distinction - condemn our individualism as chaotic.

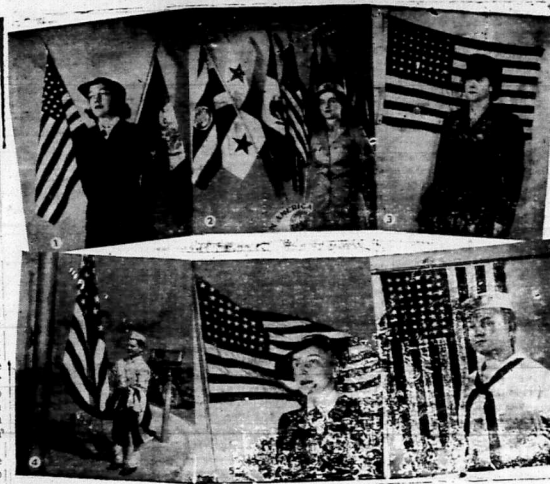
We as individualists will listen to neither critic. We have repudiated our past in the sanctity of the individual. We respect and defend the State because it represents the common convictions of its individual citizens. We believe in the responsibilities as well as the

rights of the individual. We also believe in the responsibility of the State both toward its citizens and toward those States who likewise join in the fellowship of nations.

It is not always easy to be an individualist. There are many times when it would be much simpler to accept the mental rule of State or Dictator, to be told what to think, to have our minds ruled for us. We who have the heritage of free men must, however, do our own thinking day in and day out, in war as well as in peace.

Just now when attempts are being made from every side to push us this way and that, when the full forces of clever propaganda are unleashed upon us, we must be clear and individual.

## Here's How To Display the Flag



The enemy propaganda has one aim in view, to divide and disrupt us - to turn us, from a nation of strong individuals, working side by side without regard for birthplace, work or religious faith, to a collection of small, impotent groups, bickering and warring among ourselves, pushing for personal advantages and allowing prejudice and bias to make us oblivious to the enemy whose aggressive tactics are always aimed first at the minds of those whom it wishes to conquer.

Let us therefore, in this hour of world travail, stand firm in liberties, fighting and working together as one for the good of all. We know that if the rights of one are threatened, the rights of all are in danger, for no great country has ever been defeated from without that was not first defeated from within. Let us who wish to be free men, to maintain our individualism, stand firm on what we believe holding only that all men are created equal and avoiding all generalizations of our neighbor by his class, his creed or his color. Let us at all times preserve that unity of purpose which has made us a nation of individuals and which has given us freedom to live and to pass man on a greater measure of freedom to each succeeding generation.

Continued From Page One direction of state chairmen who will report directly to the Secretary of the Treasury and will be responsible for the continuing sale of War Savings bonds through the voluntary payroll allotment and other regular purchase plans. These state organization is also in charge of War Loan drives and will concentrate on the sale of increasing amounts of bonds to individuals and to corporations. "In order to facilitate the sale

of issues of government securities to commercial banks, mutual savings banks, insurance companies and government bond authorized the Federal reserve banks as fiscal agents of the Treasury to handle sales to these financial institutions separately.

"We arrived at this plan," the Secretary said, "after consultation with the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System, and with the Presidents of the 12 Federal reserve banks. I believe that this new arrangement makes the best possible use of what we learned in the first two War Loan drives."

"One of the chief considerations in setting up this improved plan was to make it possible for everyone to concentrate on the sale of bonds to individuals. We are already making great progress, having sold twice as many bonds to individuals in the second drive as in the first, and having exceeded the quota we set for individuals in the Second War Loan Drive by nearly a billion dollars.

**CANNING QUIZ**

Q. May I give as many quart of home-canned vegetables as I wish if they require no sugar

in canning them? A. No. But each person in your family may give away not more than 50 quart of home-canned fruits and vegetables without collecting ration stamps. If you wish to give away more than that, you must collect ration stamps from the person to whom you give them, although you need not ask for money payment for this food unless you wish.

Q. How many jars of jams and jellies may I give away? A. Jams and preserves are not rationed, and you may give away as many jars as you can spare out of our allowance of five pounds of sugar.

Q. What is the point value of home-canned food? A. Home-canned food has a point value of 8 points per quart and 4 points per pint.

Q. May I sell canned fruits which someone else puts up for me? A. Yes. But you must collect ration stamps at the rate of 8 points per quart for every sale you make, regardless of who does the canning.

Q. I usually can several hundred quarts of vegetables to sell through the local farmer's market. May I continue to do so under rationing? A. Yes, You

may continue to sell home-canned fruits and vegetables, but you must collect 8 ration points for each quart sold.

Q. What do I do with the ration stamps I collect for sales I make of home-canned food? A. You turn the ration stamps in to your local ration board any time during the first ten days of the month following the sale.

Q. How do I get sugar for canning fruit for sales? A. You apply to your local board on OPA Form R-315 for the amount of sugar you will need at the rate of one pound of sugar for every four quarts of finished fruit.

Q. May I also apply for sugar for making jams and jellies for sales? A. No. You may have only enough sugar for preserving fruits for the use of your family; not more than five pounds per person.

Q. May I buy canned fruits and vegetables directly from the local canning factory? A. Yes. But these cans are commercial products, and you must give up the same number of ration points for them as you would if you bought them a tretaill.
