J. Warren Blair To Get Wings Soon

James W. Blair of Morehead, Ky. was impatient to fly. If he hadn't been, he might have received his pilot's wings before now. But as it is, he's scheduled to receive them at Moore Field, Texas, Army Air Forces advanced flying school August 31.

Back in October, 1941, Blair, then 19 years old, went to Windover, Ga., and joined the Royal Canadian Air Force for air crew training. He was in Nova Scotia when Pearl Harbor was raided, and the remoteness of his field may be judged by the time it took for the news of Pearl Harbor to reach there—three days.

After Pearl Harbor, Blair asked for a discharge so that he could join the United States Army. It didn't come through until May 28, 1942, and then he lacked only three months of advanced flying instructions to receive his R. C. A. F. wings. He arrived home on June 2, and was called by his selective service board for induction the next day.

There was a lapse of five months before he was called for aviation cadet training, to begin again where he had started more than a year before.

With primary training at Pine Bluff, Ark., and basic at Coffeyville, Kan., behind him now, Cadet Blair is flying Cleet AT-6's (Texans, made by North American Aviation) and looking forward to the next-odd-student when he hopes to be flying the "big brother" of the Texan, the P-51 Mustang, in combat.

Blair is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Luster E. Blair, 335 Wilson avenue, Morehead. He was graduated from Breckinridge Training School in 1938, and attended the University of Kentucky for two years. He has a brother, Capt. Harold F. Blair, in the Dental Corps stationed at Camp Wallace, Texas.

O.P.A. Discloses Many Have Failed TO Register

The Lexington District Office of OPA has found many persons dealing in the sale, gift or exchange of meats, fats and cheese without proper registration. Those persons not properly registered and accounting for rationing points are in violation of the law and are subject to penalty and punishment for such violations.

As explained by F. P. Fish, District Representative in Charge of the Meat-Fats Program, all persons dealing in meats, fats, canned fish butter and rationed cheese are required to register and account for their transactions in those commodities. Any who have not registered with their Local War Price and Rationing Board are in violation of the OPA regulations. Any person dealing commercially in those commodities by sale, gift or exchange are required to collect rationing points and account for them. Any retailer, grocer, wholesale grocer, commercial slaughterer, restaurant, dairy selling butter or rationed cheese, farmer selling fresh or cured meats, butter or rationed cheese can obtain information from their Local War Price and Rationing Board.

Rules Given For Obtaining Canning Sugar

After filling out form in detail enclose War Ration Book One of each member of family and mail to Local War Ration Board.

1. Amount of sugar purchased with stamp 15 and 16 of War Ration Book One of each family.
2. Number of quarts of fruit canned from sugar purchased on War Ration Books or by certificates issued by Local Boards since Jan. 1st, 1943.
3. Number of pounds of sugar used for preserving from sugar purchased with stamps from Book One.
4. Total number of quarts of fruit to be canned for which application is being made.
5. Name of War Ration Book One enclosed with this application.

Ration Order 5c requires the Ration holder to make identification notations immediately upon receipt of coupons. Notations shall be made on the face of the coupon, instead of on the back as previous instructions.

You May Be Aiding The Black Market

Federal law carries heavy penalties for misuse of ration stamps, certificates and for various other misdeeds in connection with rationing programs. War ration stamps and books in the light of thoughtlessness rather than premeditation. In any event the public is harmed. Misuse of ration stamps makes a direct contribution to black markets with all their resultant evils. In fact, their misuse is responsible in a large degree for the operation of black markets which, by and large, throw the whole plan of equal division of available foods and goods out of the picture. Cause shortages and bring avoidable discomfort to the people.

The most serious violations are:

- (a) Theft and illegal possession.
- (b) Theft and illegal possession.

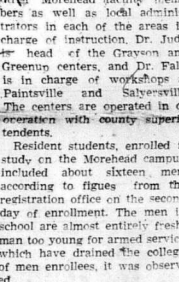

Black Market

- (a) Using ration books, stamps, certificates, etc.
- (b) Using stolen stamps in purchasing food, gasoline or other commodities.
- (c) "Shoplifting" rationed goods without giving up legal stamps.
- (d) Making false statements in applying for ration stamps or certificates.
- (e) Selling or purchasing of rationed goods without the proper certificate or ration stamp.

RATIONING AT A GLANCE

Blue stamps N, P, and Q are good through August 7. Red stamps P and Q are good now; R will be good July 11; S July 18. They expire July 31.

Coffee stamp 21 good through July 21.

Sugar stamp 13 good for 5 pounds through August 15. Sugar stamps 15 and 16 may be used in obtaining canning sugar in amounts of 5 pounds each through October 13. In exceptional cases where consumers require more than this 10 pounds for canning application, for additional allotments may be made at the local ration board. The total that will be given to any person is 25 pounds for the entire season. 15 pounds in addition to the 10 pounds secured by stamps 15 and 16. This will be computed on the basis of 1 pound of sugar to each four quarts of fruit to be preserved. Of this maximum of a total of 25 pounds not more than 5 pounds may be used for jams and jellies.

Applications For Social Security Are Important

Careful attention to preparing applications for social security account numbers will enable new workers to enter war jobs more easily. Elbert M. Bohon, manager of the Ashland, Kentucky field office of the Social Security Board, said today.

During the past several months many applications for numbers have had to be returned to applicants because it was impossible to read them, or because they were not made out in ink or on a typewriter. The Social Security Board photographs each application for an account number in order that a permanent and durable record of the application may be retained in the files. The photographic equipment of the Board does not make clear and legible copies of applications made with lead pencil.

For this reason many people have been unable to enter war jobs until they have completed new applications and had account numbers issued to them. Mr. Bohon said. Also, due to the necessity of having full identifying information, forms have been returned to the applicants in large
