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Cross Country Team Runs In Lexington

43-year-old Black Is "Boy" Wonder

Morehead's first cross country team engaged in its second meet of the season last Saturday morning, but found the competition once more too tough as it finished third in the powerful University of Kentucky and Area College teams at Lexington.

Kentucky, favored to win the championship next weekend, was the first to start last year's champ, the University of Kentucky, in a dual meet last week, won the meet in easy fashion. The final score was Kentucky 17, Berea 39 and Morehead 64. (In cross country the low scoring teams wins.)

Berea, the best college squad in the state last year, had been expected to give the university a much closer battle, but the latter rode roughshod Saturday, placing men in the first, second, third, fifth and sixth positions. The time for the four mile race, run over the Bendone Golf Course, was 21 minutes, 18.3 seconds.

The inexperienced Morehead team showed a tremendous improvement over their first meet, a dual affair with Berea held here during Homecoming Day. Chester Greene was the first man across for Morehead securing a 10th place. His time was a good 24 minutes, 18.3 seconds.

Read was 14th, William Welch 15th, Coburn "Pop" Black 17th, and William Welch on the baseball team who is running cross country for the purpose of conditioning, was 18th.

All of the Morehead boys, accustomed to running over their own very rugged course, found the golf course so much to their liking that each ran the distance four minutes faster, on the average, than he had ever done four miles before.

Coburn Black, Morehead's 43-year-old physical marvel, whose feet put those of others half as to shame, attracted quite a bit of attention from officials, coaches, and competitors Saturday. His time of 25 minutes, 25 seconds, was regarded as phenomenal by all. The various petitioners expressed both the hope and doubt that they could perform as well at his age. Jay Wallace, captain of the Kentucky team, commented on Black with the statement, "I'm only 25 years old, but the boys on my team call me Pop. I'd like to be a cross country man at 43."

Scholarship Tourney Is Scheduled Here

Proceeds To Go For Student Aid

The first annual Scholarship Invitational tournament sponsored by Flemingsburg, Sharpburg, West Liberty of Morgan County and Breckinridge High School will get underway Wednesday, November 19, in the Morehead State College gymnasium. It has been announced by Bob Laughlin, of the Morehead faculty.

Flemingsburg meets Sharpburg in the opening game and West Liberty will play Breckinridge in the nightcap. On Thursday, November 20, the two losers will play the consolation match and the winners of the previous day's games will end the festivities in the championship contest.

The entire proceeds from this tournament will be turned over to the Morehead State College business office. A deserving student from one of the four high schools will use the money to further his education.

Each school has agreed to pay own expenses at the tournament. This type of procedure is unique in that the entire proceeds will go back to the students themselves.

The student selected for the scholarship need not be an outstanding athlete but rather the most deserving selected by the teachers of the four schools involved.

The length of time the student will stay in college at Morehead will depend upon the size of the gate receipts. The admission cost is 75 cents for adults, with students admitted for 50 cents.

Jack Slattery and Irwin Spencer will serve as officials for the tournament.

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
