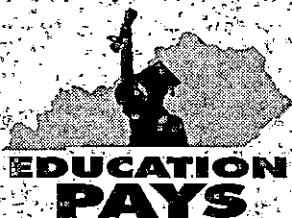

Message From The President:

Morehead State University and hundreds of other colleges and universities are participating in the first-ever National College Week, Nov. 15-19, to send home the message that, with sufficient academic preparation and sound financial planning, Americans can realize their dreams of a college education.

As Kentuckians, we should be proud that our state has become a national leader in improving the quality, affordability and accessibility of postsecondary education through the bold and courageous reform effort led by Gov. Paul Patton. Our governor told us in his first inaugural address that history would brand him as the Commonwealth's "higher education governor" and he already has created that legacy with another term still to serve. And we owe another debt of gratitude to those visionary men and women in the General Assembly who last year established lottery-funded, academically-based scholarships to reinforce the state's commitment to helping families meet the costs of college.

Starting this year, high school graduates with decent grades and good test scores can go to college with as much as \$500 per year in scholarship aid for each year of high school success through the Kentucky Educational Excellence Scholarships (KEES). The program is well named, because solid academic performance is one of the keys to success in college and life.

Continued improvement of the public schools through the KERA reforms of 1990 have resulted, for the most part, in better prepared students applying for college admission. And the current movement to further improve teacher education in Kentucky can only pay more dividends in support of our "college is possible" mission.

Is a college education important? Until the last decade or so, that question was almost always asked by middle school and high school students. Now we hear it frequently from older people who are considering their college options, often for the first time. My response to all age groups is that a college degree creates better career choices, opportunities for personal growth, a healthier lifestyle, and an increased capacity for public and community service.

Considering the variety of public and private institutions in this state and nation, coupled with the broad array of public and private financial aid options, college today is a viable choice for virtually any person capable of learning at that level. And for those who can't leave home, we have distance learning programs to bring college-level instruction to your community or your school or your home. Today more than ever, "college is possible" is more than just a catchy slogan. It is a reality!

College Of Business Participates In Heart Walk

MSU's College of Business continued its long tradition of demonstrating community service by contributing to and participating in the local Heart Walk, on Saturday, October 30, 1999. Preceding the walk, college personnel contributed items for a silent auction fundraiser, earning \$1,000, which was donated to the local chapter of the American Heart Association.

MSU Receives Grant To Target High-Risk Alcohol Consumption

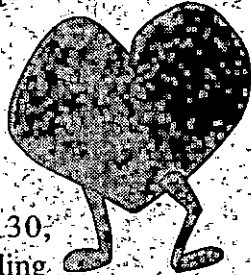
President Eaglin has received funding for a two-year grant titled The Kentucky Network to Reduce High-Risk Drinking Among College Students from the U.S. Department of Education.

The amount of the award is \$249,069, and the project period is Oct. 1, 1999, through Dec. 31, 2001. The main purpose of the grant is to reduce high-risk drinking among college students in Kentucky by utilizing a variety of environmental and science-based strategies.

The three main project parts are to develop or expand campus-

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College Of Business Department Of Information Systems

The new Information Systems Advisory Board met for the first time in March 1999 and again in September. The Advisory Board includes business leaders from the MSU service region and beyond. The mission of the Advisory Board is to provide counsel on information systems issues, trends, and practices relevant to maintaining a high-quality IS program that graduates well-prepared professionals and meets the needs of the service region.

The College of Business Computer Labs, operated by the Department of Information Systems, were re-configured and updated this summer to meet growing enrollments and provide more effective class scheduling. The CIS101 Computers for Learning class alone, required of all freshmen as part of general education requirements, enrolled over 1600 students in the 1998-99 academic year. Enrollments are growing for all CIS classes plus lab use for other business classes is increasing.

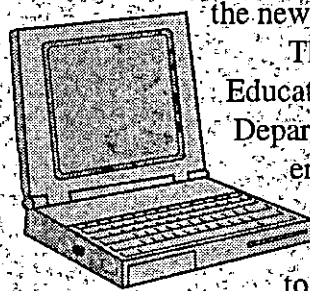
The national headquarters of OSRA, a national research association in organizational and end-user information systems, has been relocated to the College of Business at Morehead State University. The Executive Director for OSRA is Dr. Donna Kizzier, associate professor of information systems. OSRA publishes a quarterly refereed journal on end-user information systems, a newsletter, and the Organizational and End-User Information Systems Model Curriculum, developed by a national task force. It also sponsors an annual international research conference.

The IS Department received renewal for two grants from the Department of Vocational Education and the Work Council in the amount of \$15,000. The department also received an unrestricted grant for \$6,000 from Thompson Publishing, which was used to purchase a ceiling-mounted PC projector for the new CIS101 Computer Lab.

The IS Department has partnered with the College of Education and Behavioral Sciences on a grant from the U. S. Department of Education on Preparing Tomorrow's Teachers to Use Technology. The grant was funded for 1999-2000 in the amount of \$127,000 and MSU is eligible to apply for an additional three years of funding up to \$1.2 million. Project Co-Directors are Dr. Cathy Barlow, dean of the College of Education and Behavioral Sciences, and Dr. Elizabeth A. Regan, chair of the Department of Information Systems.

Fifteen business students took awards at the state Phi Beta Lambda competition and four at the annual national competition in Chicago, July 4-9. Award winners included, first place in parliamentary procedures— Jason Robbins; Second place in business decision making— Susan Arnold, Rob Lymangrover, and Holly Merrell; Sixth Place in Ms. Future Business Teacher — Randi Jo Sturgill; And Tenth Place in Accounting II— Neal Purvis. Ten MSU PBL students were in attendance at the conference, nine of whom competed. The faculty advisor for PBL is Dr. Randall McCoy, assistant professor information systems.

Dr. Elizabeth Regan, associate professor and chair of Dept. of IS, is the Conference Chair of the 19th Annual OSRA International Research Confer-



ence, Toronto, Canada, February 24-26. The program theme is 21st Century Workplaces: Vision to Vitality.

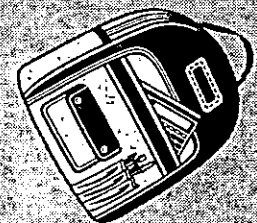

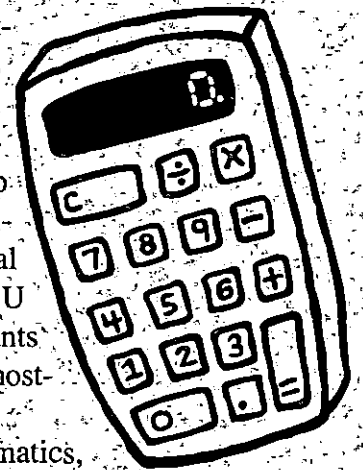
Department Of Mathematical Sciences

•The Departments of Mathematical Sciences, Physical Sciences, and Industrial Education and Technology hosted the Sixth Annual Mathematics, Physics, and Advanced Technology Exploration Day (MPATE Day) on October 6. Over 350 students with 28 of their teachers from 17 of Kentucky's high schools participated. The high schools were Allen Central, Bath County, East Carter, Elkhorn City, Elliott County, Fleming County, Hazard, Ludlow, Magoffin County, Mason County, Montgomery County, Morgan County, Nicholas County, Rowan County, Sheldon Clark, West Carter, and Wolfe County. Nine schools were represented by the 13 students who placed on the top three teams. These students received graphing calculators, and the grand door prize was a statistical software package valued at \$500. Over 70 MSU students served as guides and exploration assistants for the 20 explorations led by 30 faculty from the hosting departments.

•Joyce Saxon, associate professor of mathematics, has been elected President of the Kentucky Association for Developmental Education (KADE). KADE is the state-wide organization for developmental educators from Kentucky's two- and four-year colleges and universities.

Ms. Saxon is also serving on the Steering Committee for Kentucky Middle School Mathematics Academics, a \$300,000 grant funded by the Council on Postsecondary Education. The primary objective of the grant is to build the mathematics knowledge of Kentucky's middle school math teachers. Academy sessions will eventually be available to all middle school teachers across Kentucky through the Kentucky Commonwealth Virtual University (KCVU). Ms. Saxon and Dr. Thomas Klein, associate professor of mathematics, are serving as members of the Regional Professional Development Teams that will develop and run the academies and other professional development activities.

•Dr. Lloyd Jaisingh, Professor of Mathematics, and Dr. Donald Spickler, Assistant Professor of Mathematics, are co-presenting a two-hour workshop entitled, "Using the TI-83 to Construct Understanding of Concepts in Elementary Statistics" at the 12th Annual International Conference on Technology in Collegiate Mathematics in San Francisco, CA on November 5. Additionally, Dr. Thomas Klein, Associate professor of Mathematics, is conducting an individual presentation titled, "Probability Simulations using the TI-73 Calculator" and Dr. Don Spickler is conducting an individual presentation titled, "An Introduction to Computer-Aided Proofs in Calculus."



Caudill College Of Humanities Highlights Department Of Art

1. Development of an outstanding Apple Macintosh Power PC Computer Lab for Computer Art and Graphic Design programs.
2. Eighty-six percent of all graduating students in Graphic Design are employed in their field.
3. Development of a Bronze Casting Foundry in the Sculpture program.
4. Two art students, Jason Banbel and Samantha Griffith, have created four commissioned bronze portrait busts, including one of Rosemary Clooney, for the City of Maysville.
5. Associate Professor Steve Tirone and his sculpture students are assisting in the casting of four life-sized bronze figures. The figure group was designed and sculpted by artist Sam McKinney, and was commissioned by King's Daughters Medical Center in Ashland, Ky. This major bronze sculpture will be a highly visible component of the new main entrance area of King's Daughters Medical Center.
6. The Visual Art Guild student club had 26 members last year and holds an annual exhibition of member's work in the Strider Gallery. The club has gone on special four-day field trips during the last three years to Chicago (15 students and three faculty), Pittsburgh (15 students and two faculty), and Washington, DC (17 students and four faculty).
7. During the last three years, eight graduates of the art program have been accepted into MFA programs in the visual arts (Robert Davis, Northern Illinois University; Jennifer Bell, Ohio University; Michael Ousley, University of Cincinnati; Deven Stone, University of Kentucky; Yanya Yang, Indiana State University; Laura Hamm-Watkins, Ohio University; Robbie Hay, Memphis School of Art; Louann Kelly-Parkansky, University of Kentucky).
8. All graduating students in art who earned teacher certification have public school teaching positions.
9. The Morehead State Chapter of the National Art Education Association (student club which now has 20 members) attended the NAEA Conference during four-day field trips to Chicago in 1998; and to Washington, DC in 1999.
10. During the last three years, seven advanced art students have attended three-day Walter Gropius Masters Workshops with internationally known artists at the Huntington Museum, W.Va.

Geography, Government & History

Students in Professor Susan Eacker's Junior Seminar just learned that the paper they prepared as a culmination of their research and oral histories, "On Higher Ground," the history of the Morehead flood of 1937, has been accepted for presentation at the Appalachian Studies Association annual conference in Nashville. In addition, Dwayne Mynhier, the spokesperson for the study group, has been asked to chair the panel session. The students have also submitted the paper for publication.

Other departmental highlights include:

1. Eighty percent of the Social Studies Area of Concentration graduates in 1998 and 90 percent of the Social Studies Area of Concentration graduates in 1999 have reported to the Department of Geography, Government & History that they have secured teaching positions in either Kentucky, Ohio, Indiana, Florida, or Iowa.
2. Three recent graduates of the Department of Geography, Government & History are enrolled in law schools this year, one at the University of Louisville, one at Chase, and one at Louisiana State University.
