## Athletic Council Sets Standard For Track Awards

The MSC Athletic Council has adopted the following policy with respect to the awarding of letters for participation in track events:

1. One point at the OVC meet, where the scoring is 5 points for first, 4 for second, 3 for third, 2 for fourth, and one for fifth place.

2. Points in dual meets against another conference team. The scoring scheme is 5 points for first, 4 for second, 3 for third, 2 for fourth, and one for fifth place.

3. Points in dual meets against non-conference schools, or against non-conference and conference schools combined. The scoring is the same as in the preceding category.

In categories 2 and 3 the point totals are on a cumulative basis, that is, they represent the total for all dual meets of the season, and not for a single meet.
