

Laughlin Named Basketball Coach; Allen To Assist

Bobby Laughlin and his star pupil, John "Sonny" Allen, have been named Morehead State College basketball coaches. John (Sonny) Allen, his assistant, the school athletic committee announced this week.

Laughlin guided the Eagles on a temporary basis during the past season and Allen coached the Breckinridge High School team. Both were graduates of the college. Laughlin, who coached at Breckinridge in 1937 and Allen in 1950. Laughlin coached Allen at Breckinridge in 1941. He has done additional work toward the doctorate at Indiana University.

Allen, a Morehead native, has taken all his school work at Morehead. Graduating from Breck in 1946, after winning All-State honors as a member of the championship basketball team, he was besieged with college offers all over the nation. He chose to remain at Morehead.

A star from the beginning, Sonny was All-KLAC as a freshman and sophomore and All-OVC as a junior and senior. Although a guard, he scored more than 1,000 points during his four years of college play.

In addition to playing basketball at Morehead, Sonny for a time was under contract to the Brooklyn Dodgers, playing with the Zanesville, O. club.

Laughlin and Allen form the second teacher-pupil coaching combination at Morehead. Head football coach Shorty Jamerson played under assistant coach Sid Frewitt at Barrett High in Henderson, Ky.

Student Travel Ship Program Is Announced

The Council on Student Travel today announces to the general public its eighth annual Student Ship Program for students and teachers. Eligibility is limited to persons traveling for educational purposes. Three main round-trip sailings from New York City and Quebec are scheduled for this summer when low-cost accommodations on regular transportation facilities are overcrowded. One-class fares on all-cabin ships range from \$140 to \$180 each way. East-bound sailings will take place on June 8, June 19 and June 23. West-bound sailings are scheduled for August 11, August 24 and September 3. The Council on Student Travel also offers weekly off-season sailings from mid-April to mid-November. East-bound off-season sailings embark from Quebec. Westbound off-season sailings disembark at New York City and Quebec.

Aboard the main sailings the Council on Student Travel sponsors an educational and recreational program. Participants may plan their daily schedules to include language classes and lectures on European culture, history and problems. Recreational events include illustrated lectures, concerts, movies, folk and social dancing as well as traditional shipboard sports. Similar programs are planned on off-season sailings if demand warrants extension of this service.

The M. S. Seven Seas, (12,500 tons), and the S. S. Arcturion Star, (10,000 tons), have been chartered for both peak-season and off-season sailings. The Council on Student Travel is using in 1958 per cent of the space on the three main round-trip sailings and student groups sponsored by its 33 member organizations. These member organizations are educational and religious groups with planned educational programs in Europe. For them, and for the general public, the Council maintains a year-round Group Travel Information Service.

Science Class Hears Lesson On Vibrations

Something new was added to Dr. Norman Taylor's Physical Science class last week when he began teaching them by using methods that couldn't be seen, felt, or heard. To study sound, the class listened to a record of vibrations which was logical as long as they could hear the vibrations, but when there started to be 20,000 vibrations per second or 21 vibrations per second it didn't seem at all reasonable to listen because nothing could be heard. The vibrations that could be heard, however, were useful in the lesson. The vibrations and the ones that couldn't be heard, who can say?
