Piano Clinic Will Begin On June 21

Dr. Marion Egbert of Chicago and Dr. Richard Werder, director of the Campbell School of Music in Washington, D. C., will conduct the first piano clinic at Morehead State College from June 21-25.

The clinic will offer college credit and is designed directly to stimulate the study of piano in public schools and indirectly to encourage talented students to enroll for private instruction with competent teachers.

Third and fourth grade pupils in the Breckinridge Training School who have had no formal music training will be used in a controlled experiment to show how pupils can be encouraged in music through the piano. Students will be given a chance both to observe and to teach these pupils and will learn what music can do for the child, not what the child can do for music.

Dr. Egbert, who will be in charge during the first three days of the clinic, will emphasize the "response to music and creative thinking" and "musical games," "from note to note," and "use of the piano keyboard as a means of understanding fundamental concepts."

He has had 15 years of experience as a piano teacher and director of school bands, orchestras and choral groups in the state of Illinois, where he was a music supervisor in grade schools.

After World War II, he was director of music activities for Occupation Personnel in Korea. As a pianist and music director, he has presented and been soloist at many recitals and has been a featured soloist at the Baldwin-Wallace conservatory, Berea, Ohio.

The program includes "Asia, Europe, America, Africa, Oceania, Coleridge-Taylor, Schubert's Songs from 'Die Schöne Müllerin' and other fine, but less known pieces."

Burton Garlinghouse, professor at Baldwin-Wallace and a voice teacher, added to the understanding and enjoyment of the selections from the Schubert song cycle by giving short sketches on the texts of the individual selections.

After the program, the tenor, when asked what was your favorite, possibly replied that each song, at the time he was singing it, was his favorite, possibly his perfect answer to the question and the perfect attitude for the artist.

Dr. Werder, who will direct the clinic during the last two days, has been successful in teaching music to both elementary and advanced pupils. He is adjunct director of the National Guild of Music Teachers and made his New York concert debut in Steinway Hall last season.

Dr. Werder will give a concert during his stay at Morehead.
