The Delta Gamma Book Scholarship will support initiated members of the Delta Omicron Chapter in reaching their educational goals. Since establishing the fund, almost \$3,000 has been raised to support this endeavor. The Delta Gamma Book Scholarship Fund will continue to grow through generous contributions from alumni members.

Delta Gamma is a women's fraternity and a member of the National Panhellenic Conference, the umbrella organization of 26 women's fraternities. Founded in 1873

Board of Regents, Audit Committee met March 31

Morehead State University's Board of Regents held its quarterly meeting Thursday, March 31, at 9:30 a.m. in room 329 of the Adron Doran University Center, following a meeting of the Audit Committee.

The Audit Committee accepted the 2020-21 NCAA Agreed Upon Procedures Report and the WMKY audit. The committee also approved the reappointment of the University's auditing firm and the audit price and the scope of the annual fiscal year audit. Committee members also heard a report on the status of current audits from Internal Auditor Joe Hunsucker.

The Board of Regents recognized donors, faculty, staff, and students following the audit committee.

Retirees and long-time MSU supporters Dr. Sue Luckey and her late husband, Dr. George "Mac" Luckey, were recognized for their commitment to MSU and the Morehead community. After Mac's death, Sue created the Dr. George M. Luckey Honors Student Enrichment Endowment for students in the honors program and the Dr. Sue Y. Luckey Scholarship for Business, which provides scholarship support to students studying in the College of Business.

Donors Drs. Kay and Kent Freeland (also a retiree), two lifelong teachers and administrators in public schools and higher education institutions, were recognized for their generosity to MSU. The Freeland Education Scholarship provides an annual award to an aspiring student.

The board also recognized the national award-winning MSU Cheerleading squads. This spring the coed squad won the program's 28th Division I national championship. The all-

girl partner stunt team of Frankie Capilets, Sydney Sturgill, Haley Whitacre and Paige Ernst also won a national championship. The Morehead State cheer program has now won 50 national championships since the first competition in 1988.

Also recognized were faculty, staff and students in MSU's Space Science Center. Later this spring, a satellite, Lunar IceCube, will be launched as a secondary payload on the Artemis I mission. The Lunar IceCube team includes several faculty and staff members of the Space Science Center and more than 50 current and former students at Morehead State.

The board selected Madonna Weathers (Class of 1971, 1972, 1982), a long-time staff member who spent more than four decades serving students at MSU as this year's recipient of the Founders Award for University Service.

A native of Louisville, Weathers came to Morehead State University as a student and completed a Bachelor of Arts in Education in 1971, a Master of Arts in Education in 1972 and a Master of Arts in Higher Education in 1982. She worked at MSU for 44 years, retiring as vice president for student life in 2016.

The board reviewed audit information, approved personnel actions, and faculty tenure promotion. An ad-hoc committee was created to review the board bylaws.

The board voted on several recommendations, including the 2022-23 tuition, mandatory fees and housing rates, acceptance of the second quarter financial report and ratification of the amended operating budget. The board also approved employee compensation, extension of the University's banking services contract with US Bank, delegation of the University's optional retirement plan, and demolition of a residential structure.

University President Dr. Jay Morgan presented a legislative update and a report on the University's 100/135-year celebration. Vice President for Fiscal Services Mary Fister-Tucker gave a presentation on University debt refinancing and Vice President for University Advancement Rick Hesterberg gave a report on the University website redesign project

The board also re-elected Eric Howard to a second term as chair and Sanford Holbrook as vice-chair. Jane Fitzpatrick will serve as secretary and Mary Fister-Tucker was appointed treasurer.

The next quarterly Board of Regents meeting is Thursday, June 16.

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MSU Rock Ensemble presents Neil Young tribute concert

The Morehead State University Rock Ensemble will present "Journey Through the Past: The Music of Neil Young" at 7 p.m. Monday, April 11, at the Morehead Conference Center. Doors open at 5:30 p.m.

Tickets are \$10 for general admission and \$5 with MSU student ID. Seating is limited. Tickets can be purchased online at eventbrite.com or in-person with check or cash at CoffeeTree Books or Sawstone Brewing Co. in Morehead.

Under the direction of Glenn Ginn, associate professor of music, the MSU Commercial Music Ensemble will showcase legendary singer-songwriter Neil Young's most iconic songs, along with notable guest regional artists and MSU faculty.

"Neil Young is one of the most significant and prolific singer-songwriters of the 20th century. His career spans over 50 years and has released over 40 albums under his own name," Ginn said. "His music tends to affect people on a deeply emotional level rarely duplicated by other artists. For our students who are wanting to be singer-songwriters, there cannot be any better example for them to study."

Featured guests include the band Bedford, comprised of four former members of the MSU Commercial Music Ensemble. Other performers are Cincinnati singer-songwriter John Ford, Morehead-based guitarist and singer Clark Gordon, and other musical artists from the region, including country music singer Tony Pence and Americana performers Baylee Morgan and David Austin. Ginn said this event, now in its sixth year, is an excellent opportunity for MSU music students.

"The students benefit from learning and studying classic rock/pop music that they may not otherwise be familiar with, but as professional musicians and performers need to be familiar with. They also benefit from the experience of working together as a group and performing in front of a live audience," he said.

This year's concert is co-produced by Music With A Mission, LLC. (MWAM), an organization founded by Glenn Ginn's wife Lisa Ginn to promote live music events that get a large segment of a community together to plan and promote the event. The concert's sponsors include The City of Morehead, Downtown Morehead Inc., Giovanni's, Morehead Tourism, Otis Eastern Service LLC, Sawstone Brewing Co., and St. Claire HealthCare. Lisa Ginn is also partnering with the MSU Music Industry Club student organization to help sponsor and promote this event.

"Journey Through the Past: The Music of Neil Young' is being sponsored through multiple businesses, organizations and individuals in the Morehead community. Together, the community is making this event possible," Ginn said.

Artist and professor Jolene Powell lectures at MSU April 6

Jolene Powell, McCoy Professor of Art and director of Gallery 310 at Marietta College in Marietta, Ohio, will be visiting Morehead State University's Department of Art and Design on Wednesday and Thursday, April 6 and 7. Powell's visit is sponsored by the Buckner and Sally S. Hinkle Endowment for the Humanities and the Department of Art and Design.

During Powell's visit, she will be giving a public lecture titled "Experience and Play" to share her insights on being a working artist and arts professional. Her lecture will be at 2 p.m. Wednesday, April 6, in Room 111 of the Claypool-Young Art Building. It is free and open to the public.

Powell is a painter, arts educator and curator. Although she lives in the Midwest, she has spent several summers painting the coast of Maine and completed her fall 2016 sabbatical at Nes International Artist Residency in Iceland. Powell received Marietta College's Innovative Teaching Award in 2021, the Edward G. Harness Outstanding Educator Award in 2018 and Marietta College's highest honor, the McCoy Teaching Excellence Professorship, in 2007.

Powell earned a Master of Fine Arts (MFA) from Boston University and has exhibited her work in museums and galleries across New England, the East Coast and the Midwest. She has a solo exhibition, "Peaks and Pinnacles," on display at Brandt-Roberts Galleries in Columbus, Ohio.

"Professor Powell's lecture and interactions with MSU students, faculty and staff will provide insight on her experiences as a working artist, arts educator, and gallerist that students and community members alike will find valuable as they, too, navigate their own paths as creative professionals and/or arts advocates," said Robyn Moore, associate professor of photography at MSU.

Lecture on reproductive rights is April 12

Morehead State's Gender Studies Program is bringing Dr. Ophra Leyser-Whalen, associate professor of sociology and anthropology at the University of Texas at El Paso, to campus for a lecture on reproductive rights Tuesday, April 12, from 4 to 6 p.m. in Breckinridge Hall room 002.

Leyser-Whalen's talk is titled "Reproductive Rights in Texas and Beyond: What's the Future for Kentucky?" She will outline the erosion of reproductive health access over the past 10 years in Texas and discuss these effects from the lens of Texas abortion funds. She will conclude with general projections for what the near future of reproductive access will look like in Texas, Kentucky, and the United States.

"Gender Studies is proud to host Dr. Leyser-Whalen to discuss the timely topic of reproductive rights. As general assemblies across the nation seek to restrict girls' and women's bodily autonomy, the Gender Studies program at MSU offers the opportunity for attendees to better understand the issues at stake," said Dr. Bernadette Barton, MSU professor of sociology and Gender Studies program coordinator.

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KFAC reopens with 'Fine Folk' exhibit

After being closed for nearly two years by the COVID-19 pandemic, the Kentucky Folk Art Center (KFAC) is reopening to the public with the exhibit "Fine Folk: Works by Rebecca Miller Campell, Ron Gevedon, Sam McKinney, Pam Oldfield Meade, and Kopana Terry," running through June 1. The show features photography, sculpture, painting, and textile arts and more than 100 works will be on display.

Julia Finch, professor of art and interim director of KFAC, said the artists featured in the show expressed interest in doing a group show before the COVID-19 shutdown in 2020.

"We decided to title the show 'Fine Folk' because their work straddles the line between fine art and folk art. Specifically, the group of artists and I are interested in what happens when we suspend the conflict between 'fine' and 'folk' art and create a space where trained and self-taught artists and their work are presented and celebrated equally."

An artists' reception for the exhibit will be held Tuesday, May 3, from 5-7 p.m. Refreshments will be served, and visitors will have a chance to meet the artists featured in the exhibit. The event is free and open to the public.

"We are so thrilled to welcome new visitors and old friends back to Kentucky Folk Art Center. People should come to see Fine Folk because these artists are local community arts leaders with connections to Rowan and Morgan Counties. You may see someone or something you recognize in the works," Finch said.

Items from the center's permanent collection are also on display on the first floor and the gift shop will be open. There are also two mini exhibitions on display. In the Jimmie Ruth Auditorium, there is work by MSU alumna Kaylee Thornsberry, whose reworked photographs draw upon her family's history in the region. In the space near the elevator, there is art by Kentucky folk artist Jo Neace Krause, who passed away in March 2022.

Fehr wins three awards at Kentucky Science Fair

Kiera Fehr, a junior at the Craft Academy for Excellence in Science and Mathematics from Lexington, recently won awards for creating an eco-friendly product at the Kentucky Science Fair, placing third overall in the competition.

Fehr earned two awards for her project titled "A Sustainable Approach to Compostable Package Identification," the Ricoh Americas Corporation Sustainable Development Award and the Office of Naval Research – Navy-Marine Corp Excellence in Research Award. The Ricoh Americas Corporation award recognizes principles and technical innovations that help grow environmentally friendly and socially responsible businesses. Fehr competed in the environmental sciences category. Fehr created a plant-based ink that can be used to print corrugated cardboard shipping boxes.

"I became interested in conducting research in this area when COVID-19 caused my family to accumulate lots of corrugated shipping boxes," Fehr said. "As an avid recycler, I began to put these extra boxes in my composter and vermicompost. When I was researching what else I could do with this excess of cardboard, and I began Googling other ways to use it, I stumbled upon a surprising fact: less than 40% of materials in cardboard bags and boxes labeled as recyclable are made of recyclable material. This inspired me to create a new method to be implemented into the packaging industry in the future."

Fehr's primary mentor on the project was Dr. Lokendra Pal, an associate professor in the Department of Forest Biomaterials at North Carolina State University.

The Craft Academy for Excellence in Science and Mathematics is a dual-credit academy for academically exceptional Kentucky students. Craft Academy provides

students with a postsecondary residential experience to complete their junior and senior years of high school by enrolling in college courses. The Craft Academy's purpose is to meet the unique educational needs of academically gifted and talented high school juniors and seniors in the Commonwealth. The academic rigor of the Craft Academy challenges students to excel at their highest level through project-based STEM+X courses and hands-on learning experiences, with emphasis on innovation, design and creativity, and civic and regional engagement.

Former MSU faculty member, department chair Dr. Ron Dobler dies at 88

The Morehead State University family mourns the passing of former MSU faculty member and department chair Dr. Ron Dobler, who died Thursday, March 24, 2022.

Born in Poughkeepsie, New York, Dobler earned a bachelor's degree in English in 1957 and a master's degree in English in 1959 from Western Reserve University (later renamed Case Western Reserve University) in Cleveland, Ohio. He later earned a Doctorate in English from the University of Iowa in 1973.

Dobler began an extensive career in education after earning his master's degree. He started teaching English at Mentor High School in Mentor, Ohio, and accepted his first position working in higher education at Parsons College in Fairfield, Iowa.

Dobler and his family relocated to Morehead in 1972 after he accepted a position at MSU with the Department of English. He was a professor of English throughout his career at MSU, starting in 1977. He was chair of the Department of English, Foreign Languages, and Philosophy from 1985 to 1989, assistant to the chair from 1989 to 1992, and interim chair from 1992 to 1993. Dobler retired from MSU two years later in 1995.

Dobler was an avid lover of folklore and folk music. He played banjo, dulcimer and jaw harp and frequently appeared as a singer and folktale teller at regional festivals and workshops. He even came back to work part-time for MSU from October 2012 to February 2013 as an outreach storyteller.

"Ron Dobler was a wonderful friend and colleague in the Department of English, Foreign Languages, and Philosophy. In addition, he was a helpful and supportive mentor for many of us in the department in his role as department chair," said Dr. Ron Morrison, professor of English at MSU. "Ron kept in touch with his old friends by telephone in his later years, and he never failed to ask about MSU. He will be greatly missed."

Dobler was preceded in death by his late wife, Jeanne Dobler, in 2021. He is survived by two daughters: Susan Pierce (Class of 1981) of Louisville; Stacey Dobler (Class of 1984) of Cincinnati, Ohio; two sons, Scott Dobler of Bowling Green and Steve Dobler of Louisville; and six grandchildren.

A memorial service will be held at Northcutt & Son Home for Funerals in Morehead. A joint visitation for Ron and Jeanne is at 10 a.m. Saturday, April 16, with a prayer service and eulogy at 11 a.m. Burial is at St. Edward Cemetery in Louisville.

MSU art students, alumni and faculty featured in Horse Mania 2022

Morehead State University's Department of Art and Design is getting to trot out some of its creative work in Lexington.

Horse Mania, a popular art initiative in Lexington, selected the designs of Professor of Art Gary Mesa-Gaido, Kayle Thornsberry (Class of 2021) and Haley Younce (Class of 2019) for Horse Mania 2022.

The display features uniquely painted and designed life-sized horse sculptures across the city from April through November. LexArts is sponsoring the project, and it will coincide with the 2022 Breeder's Cup Championships, which take place Nov. 4 and 5 at Keeneland and bring in around 50,000 visitors to Lexington for the event.

Mesa-Gaido is a faculty member in the Department of Art and Design. He teaches courses in digital art, animation, painting, foundations and advanced studios. He has been an active artist for more than two decades and has displayed his work nationally and internationally.

Thornsberry is from West Liberty and earned a Bachelor of Fine Arts (BFA) in Art and Arts Teaching P-12, Bachelor of Arts with certification in December 2021. She currently has murals on display in Morehead, and the Pikeville Main Street program is displaying her artistic bears in downtown Pikeville.

Younce is from Salyersville and earned a Bachelor of Arts in Studio Art with a teaching certification (K-12) in 2019 and anticipates earning a Master of Arts in Art with a concentration in studio art in December 2022. She found out about Lexington's Horse Mania through a professor within the Department of Art and Design in the fall semester of 2021.

"Any opportunity that is presented to me as an artist is always an opportunity to get my work out there, and my ideology when applying for these projects is that the worst thing that could happen is them telling me no," she said.

After submitting three designs, Horse Mania chose her design titled "Big Blue." According to Younce, "Big Lex," the horse that turned blue from grazing in Kentucky's bluegrass pasture, inspired the design.

"When I found out my design was selected out of the 400 submissions, I was honestly in shock considering the amount of artwork they had to choose from, but I was so grateful for the opportunity to participate in such a beloved public art project," she said. "Also, knowing that my work was chosen alongside my professors that I look up to and learn from shows me that I am taking my artwork and career in the right direction."

Sara and Lee Busick went from MSU art students to creative entrepreneurs

Considering that Sara (Class of 2003) and Lee Busick (Class of 2003) are owner-designers of Made to Remember design company, it seems fitting what initially brought the two of them together was a design.

"We met at college freshman orientation thanks to a T-shirt. Lee had his Kentucky Governor's School for the Arts T-shirt on, and I immediately recognized him," Sara said, adding that the two attended the Governor's School of the Arts in high school in 1998. "We went on our first date two days later."

At Made to Remember, the Busicks put their artistic touch on items like T-shirts, postcards and art prints that tend to have a warm, rustic aesthetic and express their passion for nature and Kentucky's culture and history. These can come in the form of a quilt pattern on a shirt or a print featuring quotes on the Bluegrass State from the likes of author Ralph Waldo Emerson or President Abraham Lincoln.

Before they created and ran their own business, Sara and Lee came together and found their artistic potential at MSU.

Before deciding to attend college to study art, Sara and Lee both expressed interest in the creative arts.

"I showed an early interest in drawing and was encouraged by my parents, grandparents and multiple teachers to develop this skill," Lee said. "Over time, my creative interests expanded, but I never lost sight of my goal to one day become a professional artist."

"My love for creativity spanned visual art, music, drama, interior design, architecture – you name it," Sara added.

They met at a private liberal arts college but wanted a more extensive college experience, so they transferred to MSU. Their decision was based on scholarships, art programs, school size and opportunities.

Both Sara and Lee would eventually go on to major in art. Sara earned a Bachelor of Arts in Art with a concentration in photography and a minor in business administration. Lee graduated with a Bachelor of Arts in Art with a concentration in graphic design.

On the way to graduating together in 2003, Sara said she felt like she and Lee were able to thrive because of the inspiring community of artists.

"The after-hours environment of Claypool-Young Art Building was particularly vibrant," the couple said, noting they took in many sunrises through the building's windows. "Amid music and laughter, you could always find another student willing to offer feedback and encouragement. It's been a pleasure watching so many from our cohort excel in various creative fields over the past two decades."

Their fellow MSU art students made them feel encouraged. Sara said the faculty they encountered had the most significant positive impact.

"Our classroom experiences were great, but after 19 years, we mostly remember the faculty and staff that went beyond their teaching responsibilities and invested in us as mentors and advocates," they said.

While Sara and Lee were MSU students, they were doing work as artists that would lay the groundwork for their future business together. Sara was doing freelance photography while Lee was doing portrait commissions, murals and taking his first paid graphic design projects. Shortly after marrying in 2003, the two decided to collaborate and take on projects together.

"By combining our skills, we could offer potential clients a greater range of creative services. This set the stage for how we would end up working together later in our careers," Sara said.

Sara and Lee lived in Ohio and Indiana after college. During that time, they furthered their education, with Sara earning a Master of Arts in Cultural Policy and Arts Administration from The Ohio State University and Lee earning a Master of Fine Arts (Printmaking) from Indiana University. While pursuing collegiate teaching and developing multiple nonprofit programs for teenagers, they remained committed to their goal of building a business together.

After returning to Kentucky and moving to Midway in 2015, the couple adopted the name 15 United, an homage to Kentucky being the 15th state and a nod to a unified approach. This eventually led to the launch of Made to Remember in December 2020 and a catalog of products in their online store and retail partnerships with the Kentucky Artisan Center, the Speed Art Museum and the Kentucky Historical Society. Made to Remember also garnered award recognition for its work, receiving a 2018 Addy Silver

Award in Sales Promotion (Creative Direction & Photography) for their restaurant menu design for acclaimed chef and restauranteur Ouita Michel's Honeywood restaurant in Lexington.

"Since we started working together, we have always been most passionate about print-based design, so Made to Remember, our product-based business, has allowed us to fully channel our love for various printing processes," the couple said. "We are both interested in bringing ideas to life. Whether developing our products or working with clients, we find great satisfaction in identifying a problem and creating a beautiful and thoughtful solution."

Sara and Lee continue to grow their business with authenticity, passion and purpose. The couple said their MSU experience played a huge part in their development as artists and business owners.

"Our liberal arts education prepared us to explore possibilities and not be intimidated by them. It taught us the value of constantly learning and growing," they said. "Our degrees in studio art helped us see that a good idea is never enough – you must be committed to executing the idea. Creative work can sometimes feel relentless, but there is nothing more satisfying than bringing an idea to life."

MSU Concert Choir and Chamber Singers present 'My Spirit Soars' concert

The Morehead State University Concert Choir and Chamber Singers will present a concert at 7:30 p.m. Thursday, April 21, at First Baptist Church at 123 East Main Street in Morehead. The show is the culmination of a three-day tour of Kentucky towns and cities. Admission is free and open to the public.

"Choir tour is my favorite activity of the school year," said Dr. Greg Detweiler, MSU music education professor and director of choral studies. "We have waited a long time to resume touring and I am looking forward to enjoying every minute of it."

Detweiler conducts the 40-voice Concert Choir and 13-voice Chamber Singers. The concert, entitled "My Spirit Soars," is a collection of pieces capturing images of flight, stars, the heavens and rejoicing. It begins with the Kentucky Appalachian folk song, "Bright Morning Star," and concludes with "We Can Mend the Sky" by Jake Runestad. The vocalists will also perform "Awake, My Soul," "Song of Triumph," "Come Let's Rejoice" and "I Don' Feel No Ways Tired" in the show. The evening includes a beautiful arrangement by Daniel Elder of the famous childhood poem "Twinkle, Twinkle, Little Star" and the well-known pop song "All Star" set in madrigal style.

The program was initially designed for a May tour of Peru and contains Appalachian tunes such as "Every Night When the Sun Goes Down" by Gwyneth Walker and compositions using Spanish texts. These include "Dios Te Salve Maria (Ave Maria)" by Kentucky composer Richard Burchard, "Poema de la Duda" by the Ecuadorian composer Juan Carlos Urrutia Palacio, "Esto Les Digo" by Kinley Lange and "Sliliza" by Jim Papouis. Dr. Eric Brown, MSU assistant professor of voice, will join the choir to sing the baritone solo in "Every Night" and three MSU percussion majors will provide the percussion accompaniments for the Spanish pieces: Taylor Pfaff (junior from Columbus, Ohio), Tanner Prewitt (sophomore from Mt. Sterling), and Zach Smith (junior from

Shelbyville). Additional vocal soloists in the program include Jocelyn Goldy (sophomore from Morehead), Britney Hopkins (junior from Pikeville), Summer Lighthall (junior from Burlington), Emily McCreary (sophomore from Catlettsburg), Tania Sempertegui (graduate student from Guayaquil, Ecuador) and Katie Webb (a junior from Mt. Sterling).

Chamber Singers will also present a set of three short pieces using German texts. Included are "Die Harmonie in der Ehe (Harmony in Marriage)" by Franz Joseph Haydn and two of Johannes Brahms' "Liebeslieder Walzer (Love Waltzes)." Joining the choir for these will be staff accompanist William Murphy and graduate student Tania Sempertegui.

Concert Choir and Chamber Singers represent the University on regional, national and international tours. Recent trips have included tours to Spain, Italy, Ireland, Hungary/Austria and Costa Rica. Chamber Singers won two gold medals at the Musica Eterna Roma International Choir Festival in Rome in 2016. During the 2014 Ireland tour, the choirs competed in the Mayo International Choral Festival. Concert Choir won first place in the Sacred Division and Chamber Singers won the festival's grand prize. In 2012, the MSU Chamber Singers also won their division with the gold diploma at the World Choir Games in Cincinnati.

The idea of expanding to include local and regional news translations was brought up earlier this year at a meeting of the radio station's Community Advisory Board. Hitchcock reached out to Louise Mason, coordinator of service-learning at MSU, who then reached out to Professor of Spanish, Dr. Itza Zavala-Garrett. The three discussed ways to make MSPR news more accessible to Spanish speakers and decided to have students in Zavala-Garrett's Advanced Grammar and Literature class do the translations. Students who translated the stories were:

Paola Basaldúa from Somerset, a senior double majoring in biomedical science and Spanish.

Larkin Danis from Mt. Sterling, a senior double majoring in Spanish and marketing.

Holly Hendrix, a sophomore from Hebron with a double major in Spanish and global studies.

The course is part of MSU's Level UP program, ensuring students have the opportunity to engage in high-impact experiences like undergraduate research, education abroad, service-learning, or an internship through courses that build students' communication, professionalism, critical thinking, and teamwork skills.

"MSPR is very excited to partner with MSU's Service Learning and Level UP programs. We're honored to provide this educational tool for the students who have worked diligently in translating the stories," Hitchcock said. "I'm extremely grateful for the support from MSPR's Community Advisory Board and the leadership of Dr. Itza Zavala-Garrett and Louise Mason. We're proud to offer this extension of MSPR's continued service to the community and region, especially the Hispanic and Latino community."

The story translations are posted along with the English versions on MSPR's website and are archived at https://www.wmky.org/noticias-en-espanol. Hitchcock said he'd like to see MSPR offer more Spanish language news in the future, such as a weekly Spanish-language newscast comprised of local and regional news, additional public service announcements in Spanish, and a regular Hispanic/Latino music program hosted by MSU students or members of the local Hispanic/Latino community.

Zavala-Garrett said the project serves the dual purpose of giving the students practical, real-world experience while providing a needed service for the area's growing Latino community.

"It seems the Latino community is growing each year in Morehead, and the new generation is becoming bilingual," she said. "Some sawmill workers are temporarily here by themselves or with their families. Many attend bilingual religious services; they prefer reading the news and listening to the radio in their mother tongue. Having bilingual resources for them is a positive way to welcome them and make them feel part of this amazing community."

Joe Grubb is having his 'dreams come true' as Blizzard Entertainment's principal game designer

Some households may discourage an overwhelming passion for playing video games as a kid. In Joe Grubb's (Class of 2006) home, that wasn't the case.

"I've got a photo somewhere from when I was about two years old sitting on my dad's lap playing the Intellivision (gaming console). I was fortunate that my parents leaned into it and supported my interests in games," Grubb said. "I would look forward to the weekends when my parents would take me to Movie Warehouse to rent a new game."

Grubb spent much of his formative years growing up in Morehead playing video games, whether it was "Space Quest" or "King's Quest" from floppy disks on the PC or graduating to popular Blizzard Entertainment video game franchises like "World of Warcraft" and "Diablo."

Now, Grubb isn't just playing Blizzard Entertainment games. He oversees their popular games as the company's principal game designer.

"10-year-old me would flip out to know that he'd grow up to design video games," Grubb said.

When the time finally came for Grubb to go to college, he decided to attend Morehead State University. He followed in the footsteps of his mother, Debbie Abell (Class of 1977), professor emeritus and former associate provost and dean of graduate and undergraduate programs, and his father, Jeff Grubb (Class of 1977). While his goal to design video games for a living was clear, he admittedly did not have a clear-cut way to get him to the next level.

"I just didn't know how to go about it," he said. "I was always decent as an artist growing up, so I figured I'd try to use art as my way into the industry."

Along the way, Grubb received invaluable guidance and experience thanks to the faculty in MSU's Department of Art and Design. Even though MSU did not offer courses in digital 3D design, he took multiple independent studies under art professor Gary Mesa-Gaido. Through that experience, Grubb completed certificate training from the Academy of Art to get started in 3D and later continued on another 1:1 independent study with Mesa-Gaido to create multiple fully 3D projects from initial sketching to final 3D video. Also, in an industry where players appreciate the most minute visual touches, he immediately thinks back to classes with the late art professor Deeno Golding where he learned about graphic design and attention to detail.

"I have never been so careful when cutting a mat than I was in Deeno's classes," Grubb said. "Every. Detail. Mattered."

After attending MSU and earning a bachelor's degree in art with a concentration in art in 2006, he attended Carnegie Melon University (CMU), taking classes in its Entertainment Technology Center and transitioning from art and design to game design.

"It was great to combine what I learned from MSU with what I was learning at CMU," Grubb said. "I had the art knowledge, so communicating with artists was easy because we had a common language. I also had a solid foundation in graphic design, which helped immensely with user experience design."

After graduating with a Master's in Entertainment Technology from CMU in 2008, Grubb got his foot in the door with a video game design company, Cheyenne World Entertainment, in Arizona. He would work as a designer for various gaming companies across the country, including Gazillion Entertainment, Tencent Boston, Inc. and Kabam. As principal designer for Kabam, he worked on "Star Wars: Uprising," a game accepted as official "Star Wars" canon.

"It's kind of wild to know that I've created part of the 'Star Wars' story," he said.

In 2015, Grubb went on to make a digital collectible card game (CCG) with Dire Wolf Digital. From 2018 to 2021, he took on the role as lead designer for Big Huge Games, where he had a key role in the design of the "DomiNations" combat strategy game. This eventually led to Grubb obtaining his current job with Blizzard Entertainment in May 2021.

As principal game designer for games like "Diablo Immortal," Grubb said instead of designing the tiniest details himself as a design team member, his primary role is to "hold the 10,000-foot vision and empower your design team to execute against that vision."

Grubb said that whether it was communication skills, attention to detail, a tough skin for criticism or a strong work ethic, the lessons learned and relationships formed at MSU helped him in achieving what might be his dream job.

"I've been a huge fan of Blizzard games for a long time. Even back when they made games for the SNES (Super Nintendo Entertainment System)," he said. "There's a lot of great studios that are making awesome games. But, yeah...Blizzard was my personal 'I made my dreams come true.""

MSU holds ribbon-cutting ceremony for Little Bell Tower's new bells

Morehead State University is now hearing new and improved sounds from a familiar campus landmark.

In February, MSU finished installing four new bronze bells in the Little Bell Tower. The University will hold a ribbon-cutting ceremony at the Little Bell Tower commemorating the new bells at 5 p.m. Wednesday, April 27.

Built in 1997, the Little Bell Tower was a gift from the late Lucille Caudill Little. The four-story bell tower previously featured an electronic carillon controlled by a computer in the Camden-Carroll Library. MSU named the tower in honor of Lucille, a former faculty member, and her husband, the late W. Paul Little, both long-time Lexington philanthropists.

Due to disrepair, there hasn't been bell sounds coming from the tower in over 10 years. Kim Oatman, assistant vice president for facilities and operations, said they received lots of questions about why the bell tower did not have real bells. The Student Government Association (SGA) leaders asked what it would take to get bells in the bell tower.

"Through our research, we found an opportunity to purchase a set of used bells from an existing church that was being torn down," Oatman said. "Funding was worked out and we took advantage of the opportunity to get the used, low-cost bells for a fraction of what new bells would cost."

"Considering that the Bell Tower is one of the main landmarks of MSU's campus, the SGA felt that it was only right that the bell tower should toll again," said Emily Wiley, a senior from London and president of SGA. "SGA has been entertaining the idea for years but finally took the opportunity to do so."

SGA initiated the project in 2021. It was financed primarily through MSU's surplus COVID-19 funds for approximately \$55,000. The oldest bell foundry in the country, McShane Bell Company, partnered with MSU to acquire three bells cast by the Meneely Bell Company in 1929 and a McShane bell cast in 1940.

Oatman said the biggest challenge was making sure the structure could hold the heavy bells. The bells range from 18 inches to 29 inches in diameter and weigh between 400 and 2,000 pounds. It resulted in MSU hiring a structural engineer to assess the structure and design a frame that could safely hold the bells, which were placed and mounted with the help of a crane and a lift. The bells also feature an electronic control panel that causes electromagnetic strikers to ring the bells that play four-bell peals, strikes every hour and simple tunes. The largest bell features the inscription "Student Government Association 2021."

"The feedback we have received has been positive. Our campus community likes the added functionality of the bells," Oatman said.

"Bringing the bells back to campus has been long overdue for quite some time now, and SGA is grateful to have had the opportunity to have a hand in improving the MSU experience for students, employees and alumni alike," Wiley said.

MSU's Level UP Program provides valuable service-learning opportunities

Morehead State University's Level UP Program offers valuable and unique hands-on learning experiences. It also provides service-learning opportunities for students in various majors.

In Assistant Music Professor Ryan McGillicuddy's Music and Microcomputers course, students work in teams learn to listen to music recordings with missing instrument parts and use software to transcribe the missing parts. The class is a way to address the issue MSU jazz music ensembles have found when many music pieces they would like to perform live have one or more parts missing. The Level UP class improved transcription skills in the students and provided them with valuable skills for their future careers.

"Through teamwork, Ryan McGillicuddy and his students are involved in a project that will increase MSU students' jazz music repertoire. In this situation, everyone wins," said Sandra Mason, coordinator of service learning. "The students get some good experience, the MSU Department of Music, Theatre and Dance gets more complete sets of sheet music, and the community gets to hear some music that hasn't been played here for a while."

Students in the Family Law course taught by Laken Albrink, assistant professor of legal studies, are working at Legal Aid of the Bluegrass' (LAB) Pro Se Divorce Clinic. Clients go through LAB's intake process and if they meet specific criteria, students help them with the paperwork to complete their no-cost divorce.

"The Pro Se Divorce Clinic provides legal studies students with the opportunity to engage with clients, develop and practice skills in professionalism and oral communication, and provide an opportunity for students to think critically about the relationship between poverty and access to critical legal services," Albrink said.

As a form of outreach to MSU's 22-county service region, Dr. Janet Ratliff, associate professor of management and entrepreneurship, reaches out to middle school teachers. She trains them to teach their students to compile a business plan. MSU students get in on the act in her Business Plan Development course when they serve as judges when middle school students from the service region enter a "Shark Tank"-style Business Pitch Competition.

"MSU's service region has long suffered from 'brain drain,' students leaving the region to make a living," Mason said. "Dr. Ratliff and her students are making a difference by promoting the skills Eastern Kentucky students can use to start their own businesses, thereby staying in and enriching our state."

Associate Professor of Mathematics Dr. Mike Dobranski's Level UP course Math in Business, Industry and Government (a.k.a. BIG Math) is a service-learning class that allows students to work with clients and organizations to solve problems in Kentucky.

This semester, his students are working with Dr. Laurie Couch, associate provost for undergraduate education and student success, and Courtney Andrews, director of institutional research and analysis. The goal is to understand the relationship between grade point average (GPA), college admission test scores and other demographic and socioeconomic data and how they correlate to MSU students' retention and graduation rates. The math students work in teams of nine and analyze data to understand better what factors correlate with success.

"Working with clients has helped my students make the connection between the academic concepts we study in class and real-world applications," Dobranski said.

Level UP is an initiative to ensure students can engage in experiences to prepare them for success, including undergraduate research, education abroad, service learning and internships. It includes courses that build students' communication, professionalism, critical thinking and teamwork skills. Level UP further focuses on training students to convey evidence of these career skills that are highly desirable to employers across disciplines.
