providing these essential services to the students.
No greater need has this institution or any other, than that of a Student Union Building. Such a building should include facilities for parties, banquets, cafeteria, bookstore, dance, lounge, plays and drama, (little theatre), games (cards, billiards, ping pong, checkers, etc.). This need has become a great and pressing one and should be met during the next fiscal year, beginning July 1, 1935.

Apartments For Married Students

The third great need is for facilities for married students who are enrolled or who desire to enroll at M. S. C. The apartments in Veterans Village are rapidly deteriorating beyond profitable repair. We now have 105 married students who are enrolled for June. A larger number would enroll if living conditions were available.

Classroom Building

There is a present need which is destined to become more acute, for additional adequate classrooms. The English department is housed in the basement of Thompson Hall in improvised rooms which were never intended to be used for classes. The Commerce department is housed in the basement of the Administration building which quarters are too small for this purpose. The Art department is housed in the Library and needs room for expansion. The Social Science department is housed on the second floor of the Administration Building which it has outgrown.

As the College continues to grow, we anticipate other needs for additional building facilities, but these are listed in view of immediate needs.

age rainfall of the area and how it is distributed month by month. Various government agencies have made use of the records in getting Rowan County put in the drought area so the farmers could receive government benefits.

The average rainfall here is 46.07 inches per year. The wettest year was in 1950 when 68.54 inches fell and the driest year was 1933 when only 30.59 inches were recorded. In January 1950, the gauge recorded 15.69 inches while in February of 1947 only 3.93 inches deficit. The following table gives some interesting averages:

Normal rainfall for the area is 46.07 inches.
1950—68.54 inches. Excess 22.47 inches.
1951—51.36 inches. Excess 5.29 inches.
1952—39.17 inches. Deficit 6.90 inches.
1953—30.59 inches. Deficit 15.48 inches.
1954—36.67 inches. Deficit 9.4 inches.

The total deficit for the three previous years measured 31.84 inches or the normal amount we should have received for the first seven months of a year's supply.

In 1954, we had 108 rains but 69 of these were under .5 inch for any one rain. Eighty-eight of these rains were far less than .5 inch each. There was little volume of water in these rains but it kept the surface moist many days while the ground water supply became less and less. On September 20 and 21 we had a 2.73 inch rain. We had seven rains of one-inch or more.

January 1955 recorded 2.63 inches which was still 1.57 inch deficit. February proved to be a lifesaver as 6.13 inches fell. The total for these two months gave us an excess rainfall of 1.26 inches. This is the first excess rainfall we have recorded since 1950.

During the year of 1954 approximately 30.99 inches of snow fell. If the winter of 1954 and 1955 so far is considered, 27.07 inches of snow has been recorded. It takes about 10 inches of snow to make one inch of rainfall.

Ed. Note: Two small floods have occurred in Morehead since this was written. From Friday noon until Saturday about 7 p. m., 3.9 inches of rain fell. Friday night, 1.5 inches fell in an hour, flooding Railroad Street and forcing the evacuation of about 50 families. Saturday afternoon, .85 of an inch fell in 15 minutes.

seconds at a time.

Let's talk about classes. I got a few of them things — rotten inconvenience but you've got to put up with them. Try to bluff through them the way I got it figured, you don't have to spend more than half an hour a week preparing for your classes. Lots of people, especially instructors I suppose, are gonna think this column is real dirty for setting such a bad example for the students. I'd talk about good study habits if I thought it would do any good, but you know and I know that it wouldn't.

Here's the procedure for getting through a class on the least possible effort:
Have a heart to heart talk with your instructor before class someday and tell him how hard the course is for you. If you can let a few tears roll softly down your cheek, so much the better.
