MSU launches new Master of Arts in Education program

Morehead State University is launching a new convenient program to help professional educators advance their careers. The Ernst and Sara Lane Volgenau College of Education will offer a Master of Arts in Education (MAE) program beginning in Fall 2023.

The MAE program aims to help educators better contextualize education, design quality learning experiences, and teach and lead in educational settings for PreK-12. The online MAE program will support and enhance knowledge and skills for elementary, middle or secondary educators.

Each program has multiple concentrations, such as math, English, STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Mathematics), gifted, and many more, to allow for the depth of study based on an education professional's interests. There is also dual-credit teaching qualification available in math, English and biology. An alternative concentration is also available for students to design a specialization.

The learning objectives of the MAE program include:

- Contextual factors, such as social, historical, philosophical and psychological factors, and applying those when making decisions.
- Professional dispositions and professional standards appropriate to their discipline.
- Data literacy and research.
- Assessment literacy and research.

The MAE program also has features uniquely beneficial for students:

- Courses intertwined with classroom practice.
- Courses are offered online during the fall and spring semesters and both summer sessions.

- The ability to complete the 30-hour program in as little as 15-18 months.
- Affordable graduate tuition- Kentucky residents can take 600-level education courses at the undergraduate tuition cost of around \$385 per credit hour. View tuition info at moreheadstate.edu/admissions/tuition.

Dr. Tim Simpson, associate dean in the Volgenau College of Education, says the combination of affordability, convenience and embedding coursework in the classroom of education professionals makes the MAE program an ideal choice for educators and a benefit to classrooms across Kentucky.

"This program will impact our region by enhancing the capacity of our teachers to educate better the next generation of leaders and citizens," Simpson said.

MSU wraps up March for Service Initiative

In March, Morehead State University students in all majors learned the importance and impact of civic engagement through MSU's March for Service Initiative.

MSU faculty designed community and civic engagement volunteer projects throughout March to increase MSU students' civic engagement while incorporating skills developed within their respective majors. Students participated while reflecting on what they learned and the overall value of their experience.

On Saturday and Sunday, March 25-26, MSU nursing students developed leadership skills and engaged with the community of Morehead in discipline-related service. They participated in a community-wide baby shower and instrument showcase.

Over 60 families attended and were excited to learn how to best care for their children and the possibility of receiving one of several door prizes donated by various organizations in the area. Nursing students researched and presented topics including the Heimlich maneuver for babies and infants, gestational diabetes, maintaining parental identities, the value of exercise in pregnancy, and more.

"This community-wide baby shower event first started through St. Claire in collaboration with AHEC (Area Health Education Center). It was developed in response to the needs of young families in the area requiring additional support by connecting them with educational and healthcare resources to aid with prenatal care and raising young children," said Dr. Lisa Wallace, assistant professor of nursing and coordinator of Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) program. "Restoring trust in healthcare is vital in a seemingly post-COVID world, especially in young families who deal with issues related to mental health, substance abuse, and vaccination status."

Dr. Teresa Ellett, professor of nursing and coordinator of the Associate of Science in Nursing (ASN) program, said, "This wouldn't have been a success without the work of our community partners and nursing students from both the associate's and bachelor's programs. Over 70 students presented on essential topics through evidence-based posters, developing the crucial career skills of communication, critical thinking, teamwork, and professionalism."

Nursing students participating in the baby shower event also networked with community-based agencies, such as DOVES of Gateway, Kentucky's HANDS (Health Access Nurturing Development Services) program, Hope Pregnancy Center, St. Claire, UK Healthcare, Godspeed Maternity Home, and others for future employment opportunities.

Nearly a dozen MSU orchestra students showed off a variety of instruments to children in attendance. They also visited a "hands-on" table where they could play drums, maracas, glockenspiels, and other percussion instruments. Afterward, they received free entry into the Cave Run Symphony Orchestra's concert, "Out of This World."

"Exposing young children to orchestral instruments and musical literature is essential to creating life-long audiences of symphonic music," said Dr. Michele Paynter Paise, assistant professor of music education. "Our community is fortunate to have the Cave Run Symphony in Eastern Kentucky. Partnering with them at this event will have lasting effects on not only the children who attended but also their children's children. Sharing a love of music is one of the most important ways we can connect as human beings, a skill that will become increasingly more important as our world continues to become more technology driven."

Coordinator of Service Learning Andrew Sexton said, "We are proud of events like these in which students can develop a love of serving others through their interests. Whether it be healthcare or music, MSU students can use their major to positively impact the needs of those around them."

The March to Service Initiative stems from the Council on Postsecondary Education's Kentucky Graduate Profile. This endeavor ensures that students graduating from Kentucky colleges will develop 10 skills to prepare them for life, including communication, cultural competency and civic engagement.

Most recently, she collaborated with Jackson County Native Mike Norris, with her carvings used to illustrate his books, "Mommy Goose: Rhymes from the Mountains," "Sonny the Monkey," and "Ring Around the Moon."

Morehead State University has announced the student speakers for the 2023 Spring Commencement. The ceremonies take place at 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. Saturday, May 13, at the Academic-Athletic Center (AAC).

Keenan Conley of Salyersville will represent the College of Science and is the son of Lora (Class of 2022) and Matthew Sellers and Rhonda Conley. He will graduate with a Bachelor of Science in Biomedical Science.

As an undergraduate student, Conley earned a 4.0 GPA and was on the Dean's List for seven consecutive semesters.

Conley is a member of the MSU Chemistry Club, the MSU Pre-Med Club, and the Herron Leadership Program and served as service chair and biology tutor of the Tri-Beta Club. He is also a Delta Tau Delta Fraternity member, serving in roles including Southern Division Conference delegate, Karnea delegate, new member class president, secretary, alum coordinator, FAAR coordinator and vice president of communications. He is also a two-time recipient of the Delta Tau Delta Zeta Zeta Academic Scholarship.

Conley has participated in the Undergraduate Research Fellowship program since August 2020 under the mentorship of Professor of Biology Dr. Darrin DeMoss. He designed and performed experiments using state-of-the-art methods to screen through yeast colonies to look for novel mutations within the telomerase RNA gene. Conley also performed data analysis using DNA sequence alignment software and Microsoft Excel. Conley and others presented their findings at the 2022 Celebration of Student Scholarship, where he received an award of merit based on his group's poster presentation. He also shared his research through a virtual talk at the Southeast Regional Yeast Meeting as one of the few undergraduate students to participate.

Conley works as a Be You Medical Spa patient care coordinator in Prestonsburg.

While at MSU, Conley completed the Rural Physician Leadership Program Bootcamp. He was one of five students awarded automatic conditional acceptance into the University of Kentucky (UK) College of Medicine through its Early Assurance Program. Conley is enrolling in the UK College of Medicine's Rural Physician Leadership Program as an M.D. candidate.

"I feel like I truly belong, and that feeling is something I believe is unique about MSU. I want to remind my class of this feeling," Conley said. "I want them to reflect on the last four years and think about their own experiences and on what MSU means to them. I want to empower them and leave them with motivation as they prepare to begin the next journey of their lives. Being an Eagle is special, and no matter where our lives take us after graduation, we will always have a home here at Morehead State University."

Kelton Crank of Pikeville is the commencement speaker representing the Elmer R. Smith College of Business & Technology. He is the son of Johnna Stafford. He will graduate with a Bachelor of Business Administration (BBA) in Healthcare Management.

As an undergraduate student, Crank earned a 4.0 GPA and was on the Dean's List. He also was accepted into the AHEC (Area Health Education Center) Scholars Program, a program to strengthen skills for healthcare professionals.

Crank's extracurricular activities included serving on the Student Government Association (SGA) as vice president, commuter representative, and chief of staff. From grants to social work graduates, Dr. Lisa Shannon impacts lives in and out of the classroom

Dr. Lisa Shannon has dedicated the last 13 years to using her social work expertise to make a positive impact at Morehead State University and the region the University serves.

Shannon is a professor of social work at MSU who also uses her skill as an evaluator to assist agencies with obtaining government funding for vital services and resources. In the past year, she was honored by the Ohio Valley Conference (OVC) with an Outstanding Faculty - Commitment to Student Success award and MSU as the Distinguished Researcher. Today, Shannon continues using her knowledge of the grant and evaluation to help Kentuckians affected by mental health issues, substance use disorders, and the COVID-19 pandemic.

"Over the last couple of years, I've seen more grant opportunities focused on mental health and substance use," she said. "That was something COVID impacted very dramatically for many people."

Shannon said she focuses most on developing the grant evaluation component, which is crucial to getting approval and receiving funding. Currently, one agency she works with is Mountain Comprehensive Care Center, a behavioral health agency based in Prestonsburg with facilities across Kentucky. In addition to helping obtain grants for mental health and substance use issues, she has helped with grant evaluations related to individuals re-entering communities from jails/prisons.

During and after the pandemic, Shannon primarily taught courses in research methods and data analysis sequences at MSU at Prestonsburg. She said while most people think of social work as going out into the field to deal with individuals and families in Kentucky, she has witnessed an increased interest in the research side of social work

from her students. In the last two years, she had two Undergraduate Research Fellows under her mentorship and two practicum students who gained experience as part of her evaluation team

"I think that what I'm teaching has kind of just emerged as a growing area of social work probably in the last two years," she said. "It's just because of all of what we experienced with COVID, all of the associated federal funding; it's just becoming more recognized as an emerging field of social work."

For Shannon, based on her work in the field and the education she is giving her students, she believes the next generation of social workers will utilize even more research/evaluation to make a difference in the lives of Kentucky families.

"Being able to show what social workers are doing is effective; it's kind of the best of both worlds." she said.
