Student film showcase is May 4

Morehead State's Convergent Media program will host its annual Student Film Showcase Thursday, May 4, in the Adron Doran University Center (ADUC) Theater. Seven films created by students for classes and other faculty-led opportunities this semester will be screened at the event.

"This is a chance for us to show off the fantastic work our students are doing for our community," said Dr. Nettie Brock, assistant professor of communication.

The films that will be screened include:

"Permanence:" Two roommates, Alex and Morgan, navigate a post-apocalyptic world overrun by brain-infecting parasites after the death of their mutual best friend Ben. Tensions arise as they forage for supplies, try to contact other survivors, and attempt to repair the broken bond of friendship they once shared.

"Til the Cows Come Home:" In a post-apocalyptic world, a new virus develops in cows. The virus makes all dairy and beef poisonous to humans.

"The Quest for the Holy Cheese:" A group of three adventurers is on a quest to obtain the holy cheese from an evil wizard named Mr. Chester. The holy cheese is wanted because it will cure the zombies. The adventurers will have a unique encounter with Mr. Chester.

"The 1000-Year Flood: The 1000-Year Flood" is a historical still image documentary that chronicles the devastating floods that struck eastern Kentucky in July of 2022. Through a combination of news footage, first-hand accounts, and expert interviews, the film explores the causes and consequences of the disaster that left thousands of families homeless and entire communities destroyed.

"Women in Appalachian Traditional Music: Standing by Herself, Not Her Man." This documentary is about the history of women in traditional music and the modern experiences of women who practice this art form.

"Passerby:" A coming-of-age, brutally honest drama following our main character after she hits an all-time low. Throughout four installments, a college student begins to find solace in the peculiar counsel of her childhood friend to reinvigorate her life and navigate the spring semester. Ep. 01 – "Breathe In:" After hitting rock bottom, an art student is saved by her longtime friend.

"The Love of Yarn:" The piece centers on Kentucky weaver Martha Richard as she talks about her experience running a textile production studio, her introduction to the craft, and the history of the state's cottage fiber arts industry.

Doors and red carpet open at 7 p.m., and the screening will start at 7:30 p.m. A brief Q&A period will be held following the screening. The event is expected to last about 90 minutes and is free and open to the public.

Justice's involvement with the center started from an MSUTeach course that required students to engage in educational field experience. This short-term engagement turned into a long-term partnership as the center's board appointed Justice due to her interest in and support of their mission. Their multi-pronged project was part of the Appalachian Teaching Project "Building for the Exchange," funded by a \$5,000 grant from the Appalachian Regional Commission. Under Ratliff's guidance, these student leaders paved the way for entrepreneurship and business development in the City of Morehead. They researched and completed a business plan for Fresh Start, LLC, to offer healthy food options through partnerships with local farmers. Barcus, Cooper, Deaton, Dodrill, and Graziani represented MSU in Washington, D.C., to present their research on the project. They also spoke with the board members of Downtown Morehead, Inc. This team of students earned recognition for their collaboration with one another and entrepreneurial engagement with the City of Morehead.

MSU faculty selected for CPE Academic Leadership Academy

The Kentucky Council on Postsecondary Education (CPE) has selected three Morehead State University faculty members to participate in a leadership group.

Dr. Kenneth Andries, department chair for agricultural sciences, Dr. Jon Musgrave, assistant professor of management, and Dr. Kimberlee Sharp, professor of middle grades and secondary education, are participating in Bluegrass Tomorrow's Academic Leadership Academy (ALA). They are among 65 faculty and staff representing 18 colleges and universities across Kentucky.

As ALA fellows, Andries, Musgrave, and Sharp will receive professional development training and mentorship from statewide institutional leadership, preparing them for career paths in higher education. ALA is a project of CPE and the Bluegrass Higher Education Consortium, a partnership of 12 colleges and universities in the Central Kentucky region managed by Bluegrass Tomorrow. The academy expanded statewide in 2019.

Dr. Kenneth Andries became department chair for agricultural sciences in July 2022. He previously served at Kentucky State University for over 17 years in various roles, including associate dean of the College of Agriculture, Communities and the Environment.

Andries said he hopes to gain a better understanding of the university budgeting process and managing budgets related to educational programs. He also wants to learn more about the process of administration in higher education and how to strike a balance among the needs of students, university employees and potential student employers.

"My plan to use this information is in managing the Department of Agricultural Sciences to improve the program areas and help me mentor others in the program to be able to move up into administration successfully," Andries said. "I'm hoping the information I gather through this training will allow me to build the program to meet the needs of the students and faculty while demonstrating best management practices for faculty and staff that wish to advance into administration positions."

Dr. Jon Musgraves has been an assistant professor of management in the School of Business Administration since 2020. He previously served at Indiana State University as a part-time lecturer and instructor for the Department of Human Resource Development and Performance Technologies.

"By furthering my knowledge of leadership and the various aspects of academic leadership discussed in the first session, I intend to incorporate what I have learned about academic leadership into my business school courses," Musgrave said.

Dr. Kimberlee Sharp is a professor of middle grades and secondary education who has been with MSU since 2005. She was promoted to professor in 2019.

"I hope that my participation will help to inspire others within my college to be actively involved in student success and boosting student retention between their undergraduate degree completion and graduate enrollment," Sharp said.

"My brothers and I are very proud of our Kentucky heritage and especially our MSU legacy," Mary Combs Cunningham said. "My parents worked very hard to ensure my brothers and I received a college education. MSU was the perfect fit for us. We are proud to be MSU Eagles and are excited to be able to help future generations receive their education."

The scholarship supports first-year students from Bell County, where Rosemary resides. If there's not a student from Bell County who qualifies, a student from one of the

surrounding counties of Knox, Whitley, Clay, Leslie, or Harlan counties may be considered.

Mason and Rosemary's dedication to their children started what is now a multigenerational MSU legacy. A graduate of The Citadel, Jack served on The Citadel Brigadier Foundation Board and has seen the impact of privately funded scholarships firsthand through this experience.

"I wanted to do something special to honor my wife and her parents," Jack said. "I feel fortunate to be able to assist with the creation of this endowment. The gift of education is something that will make a difference for years to come and offering this scholarship to students from Bell County will honor the family's rich history in southeast Kentucky."

Craft students continue project at Hazel Green Academy

Students from the Craft Academy for Excellence in Science and Mathematics are continuing their work to revitalize a community learning center in Eastern Kentucky.

The project at the Hazel Green Academy (HGA) is two-fold: students worked to find funding for the project and performed hands-on work at the HGA. Craft Academy students have worked to help the property owners secure grant funding to revitalize the site as a community educational outreach center. Members of the project's senior leadership team located a \$4,000 grant from the Wolfe County Tourism Center and wrote the grant proposal. The funds will be used for a 9-week programming series at the site called Music on the Green, scheduled to begin later this year. Planned activities include live music, open mic nights, food trucks, and outdoor field activities. Last year, Craft Academy students helped the owners secure a \$5,000 grant from the Mountain Rural Telephone Cooperative for the project. Students also helped the property owners by researching how they could acquire LLC status, which would open the door for potential state funding for the restoration efforts.

Dr. Rachel Rogers, visiting assistant professor of research/QEP at the Craft Academy, said most of the campus is on the National Register of Historic Places.

In addition, students have participated in service-learning at the HGA, helping clean up the property, painting, doing yard work and helping in a used clothing store housed in one of the buildings.

Craft Academy students began the project in 2021 with three strategic goals:

The development of an educational outreach utilizing the administration building.

The creation of a community engagement venue for the auditorium called "Music on the Green."

The addition of those HGA campus buildings not already registered to the National Register of Historic Places.

Founded in 1880, the HGA was a residential academy where students learned about STEM, art, history and religion. At its peak, the academy was accredited by the Kentucky Board of Education and focused on science and mathematics, like the Craft Academy. The HGA closed in 1983, and the remaining buildings have fallen into disrepair. The Craft Academy project aims to restore the buildings to create a community educational outreach center.

Craft Academy student Josie Traver from Somerset is a member of the project's junior leadership team. She said she looks forward to seeing how the project helps the community.

"This opportunity delineates the impact of community service and has allowed me to exercise my passion for volunteerism. Collaborating with my fellow team members to bring our vision to life has been an absolute pleasure. With enough support, I'm eager to see the community of Hazel Green flourish into something incredible."

Jennifer Nguyen from Grayson, another member of the junior leadership team, said the project holds a special meaning for her.

"As an Eastern Kentucky native, I have grown up in an area similar to Hazel Green. Having the opportunity to plan service-learning trips, construct grant proposals, and much more as a part of the team has been a wonderful experience that I am excited to continue."

MSU alum Olyvia Neal earns scholarship to pursue her passion for media

Olyvia Neal (Class of 2023) is taking the extensive experience she acquired at Morehead State University and continuing her education in the nation's capital.

Neal, who earned a Bachelor of Arts in Convergent Media and a Bachelor of Arts in Convergent Media, received a competitive scholarship to enroll in the Publishing Master of Professional Studies (MPS) program at George Washington University in Washington, D.C.

"When I was accepted into this program, I was incredibly excited, but when I heard that I had earned their competitive scholarship as well, that was one of the happiest and gratifying moments of my life," Neal said. "Everything I have done in my undergraduate career at MSU led me towards George Washington University's Publishing Master of Professional Studies program."

The Monticello native grew up loving writing and literature, reading at all hours and filling her notebooks with stories. After experiencing the campus through the Governor's Scholars Program, she decided to attend MSU and earned acceptance into the George M. Luckey Jr. Academic Honors Program.

"I just absolutely fell in love with the program and the amazing opportunities and resources it provided for its students. I applied, was thankfully accepted, and received their full-ride scholarship. MSU and the Honors Program definitely changed my life," she said.

Neal's time at MSU fostered an interest in media and publishing, and her love of writing and editing led her to pursue degrees in both English and convergent media. While studying English and developing her writing skills was familiar territory, the convergent media program pushed her out of her comfort zone in an effective way. "I pursued convergent media as well because I wanted to learn how to tell the stories of others and give a voice to those in my community through journalistic writing as well. My eyes were quickly opened through convergent media as to the many ways in which stories can be told beyond words," Neal said. "Before college, I had never picked up a camera in my life, but I quickly fell in love with photojournalism and learned how to not only produce multimedia from video to audio features but to edit them as well. Telling stories through all forms of media is now a huge part of my life, and I would not have discovered it if it weren't for both of my majors."

Neal was proactive in gaining practical experience in media outside of the classroom. At MSU, she served as editor-in-chief of the Honors Program's newsletter, The Unorthodox, MSU's arts and literary journal, Inscape, and the student newspaper, The Trail Blazer. Through her Undergraduate Research Fellowship, she was an editorial assistant for The Kentucky Philological Review throughout her undergraduate career.

"Olyvia is an outstanding example of a student taking full advantage of the numerous opportunities provided across campus," said Professor of Art Lisa Mesa-Gaido. "Her experiences writing, editing, and curating are an ideal combination that made her a sought-after candidate for George Washington University's graduate program in Fall 2023."

Neal also earned multiple honors for her work in writing and media, including First Place in Creative Nonfiction for Inscape in 2022 and 2023 and First Place for Best General News Picture for the Kentucky Press Association in 2021. She also earned the Caudill College of Arts, Humanities and Social Sciences Outstanding Student in English Award.

Neal said the news project that was the most impactful for her was completing education abroad in Europe in 2022. During her overseas internship, she was a travel writer and photographer for Southeast Kentucky Magazine, documenting her experience through journaling and photojournalism. The final product was a two-part magazine series called "The European Experience," including written articles and photo essays.

"I was so incredibly proud of myself because I had never left the country before and had such life-changing experiences during my travels, but I had also never published my own story before, which was the greatest challenge I had ever experienced," Neal said. "It was incredibly difficult and vulnerable for me to write from my own perspective, but through the help of my mentors like Professor (John) Flavell (instructor of communication) and Dr. (Philip) Krummrich (director of the Academic Honors Program), I published pieces that I became proudest of creating."

After completing the George Washington University graduate program, Neal hopes to become a professional editor and published author. She knows wherever her career takes her in media, she has not just gained invaluable experience at MSU but an elevated sense of responsibility and purpose as she pursues her passion.

"One thing I have learned and appreciated is that as a member of the world of media, your words have meaning, and your voice has an impact," Neal said. "I have been asked by so many people why I would pursue a career in the media when there is so much division and animosity today, but my love for media stems from its necessity, importance, and relevance in society. The stories of others and the current happenings of the world both need and deserve to be told to their communities and without those courageous enough to go out and tell them, we would be lost. I hope to continue to use my voice in a positive way and continue this pursuit."

"MSPR is very excited to finally have the necessary equipment to extend and improve WMKY's service to the region throughout eastern Kentucky," MSPR General Manager Paul Hitchcock said. "The installation of new equipment will replace equipment purchased more than 20 years ago, equipment which has served well beyond its intended use."
